

The ParaPro Assessment

About the ParaPro Assessment

The ParaPro Assessment is a general aptitude test for prospective and practicing paraprofessionals that measures your:

- skills and knowledge in reading, writing and math
- · ability to apply them when assisting in classroom instruction

It is required for certification in many states.

ParaPro Test Content

Computer delivered and administered in English, the ParaPro Assessment measures your knowledge in reading, writing and math. The test takes 2 1/2 hours to complete and has ninety (90) multiple-choice questions:

- Approximately two-thirds focus on basic skills and knowledge.
- The remaining one-third focus on applying skills in the classroom.

Why does the test measure these subjects?

ETS's ParaPro Assessment was designed to satisfy the requirements of the No Child Left Behind Act. Its replacement, the Every Student Succeeds Act, leaves these requirements in place. The law requires paraprofessionals serving in an instructional capacity to do one of the following:

- hold an associate of arts degree
- complete sixty (60) college credit hours
- demonstrate, through a state or local academic assessment, that they are knowledgeable in reading, writing and math and capable of assisting in classroom instruction

The ParaPro Assessment was developed with the assistance of an advisory committee composed of paraprofessionals and the teachers who work with them. A thorough job analysis was conducted to determine what knowledge and skills in the areas of reading, writing and mathematics, and in assisting in instruction in these areas, are important for paraprofessionals.

ParaPro Registration

The ParaPro Assessment is computer delivered continuously throughout the year at home (in some states) and in test centers throughout the country.

ParaPro Scores

Your ParaPro scores demonstrate that you are knowledgeable in reading, writing and math and capable of assisting in classroom instructions.

Classified Staff Professional Growth Opportunities

Classroom Monitors or Classified staff who decide to take and pass the ParaPro test are eligible to become Paraprofessionals/Instructional Assistants with a starting salary of \$16.00 per hour. In addition, the district will also reimburse the staff member for the test fee of a passing ParaPro score.

Business Services

I sincerely hope and pray the week of Spring Break without student laptops, provided time for students to enjoy fresh air and human interaction without being tied to electronics the entire time.

The month of April is focused on assessments that the students will be taking. I want to take a moment to sympathize with the students. In the business office, we are tested regularly, only in the business world, they call the tests "audits," "fiscal monitoring," "reviews," or "inspections." Your public school districts in Arizona are held to GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles) standards, GASB (Government Accounting Standards Board of the FAF, Financial Accounting Foundation) standards, and USFR (Uniform System of Financial Records) standards. We are audited annually by a third-party neutral auditor in order to meet requirements set forth by these standards. We are also audited by the AZ Dept of Health and Nutrition for both our food service, as well as our procurement (purchasing processes and records). We are audited by the AZ Dept of Education's Grants Management Enterprise where they audit our federal and state grants' records and procurement. We are also audited by the AZ Auditor General for compliance on our financial

records, our records management system, our procurement processes and records, our staffing records and processes, our food service records, processes and procurement, our transportation processes and records. Public school districts in Arizona also are inspected by the local Fire Marshall, and by the Health Department who inspects food preparation and service spaces, bathrooms to students ratios, upkeep and standards (certain heights for certain ages), as well as other reviews.

I do not share this to bore you, but rather to share with you and the students that we "feel your pain" regarding what might feel like endless testing and assessments. But, to learn to handle testing and assessments while young, puts you miles ahead of the pack, as once you are "free" of school, you not only lose your summer vacations (sigh), but you gain career-related professional testing in the form of audits and reviews. So, take pride in your ability to take assessments, get comfortable with the discomfort. It is not a "right" or "wrong" situation. It is a "WOW! You seriously excel here!" And sometimes a "Whoa... let's take a second look at this here." Life is a wonderful cycle of learning opportunities with moments of fantastic victory, and moments of marvelous revelation. Embrace it all!

We support you best striving for excellence in the testing we face each season, to ensure the district continues to test faithful and responsible to be given more resources to ensure you are provided the best possible educational resources.

Child Find

Child Find, a component of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA), enables states to locate, identify, and evaluate all children with disabilities, aged birth through 21, who need early intervention or special education services. Special education services are available for children of any age (birth through 21 years). Wilson School District is responsible for locating, identifying, evaluating, and serving all children with disabilities (ages 3-21) and referring children ages 0-3 to AzEIP for evaluation and appropriate services. AzEIP is the Arizona Early Intervention Program for infants and toddlers. Wilson provides free and appropriate public education that includes special education and related services to children at public expense, under public supervision and direction without charge to parents. For all school-age students who are new to the district, the classroom teacher will complete screening activities within 45 days of enrollment. If any concerns are noted, the child will be referred for help. Parents who have concerns regarding their child's education may contact the Special Education Department at Wilson, (602) 683-2400, ext. 4205.

McKinney-Vento

Are you currently experiencing temporary living arrangements due to eviction, job loss or a traumatic event? Wilson School District offers services to families through the McKinney-Vento Assistance Act. Services such as enrollment and immunization assistance, uniforms or school supplies, community referrals and in some cases, transportation can be available. Your family may qualify due to living with another family or friend due to financial hardship or living in a shelter, transitional housing, or motel.
