Performance





 I often worked my independent study into other blocks. I had independent study during A block and worked into my seminar period during B block.


 I helped students during math class. When they needed help they'd ask, and I'd be there to help them while Ms. Creedon was helping other students.

Students feel comfortable when they feel connected to their teachers. Make the classroom a safe space for your students to be who they want to be.



why?


I had Mrs. Barnes in 8th grade and always loved her class. I am so grateful I was able to come back to be an intern.

During My Internship I Learned...

- How to positively add to an educational space by using the knowledge I already have
- The importance of organization and routine in a classroom
 - A written daily agenda on the white board
 - A section of the white board that displays the week's homework (and time to review it every class)
 - Starting the class the same way everyday with a DOL warm up (Daily Oral Language warm up, that I led and went through with the students daily)
 - Each week students would look forward to playing a game on Friday ("Friday Fun")
 - The importance of asking questions to learn as much as I can!



During My Internship I Learned...



Skills I learned


- How to best display student's work around the classroom (ex. through engaging bulletin board displays)
- How to use different features on a printer and how to make different types of copies
- How to lead a group discussion about close reading

I also got to display my problem solving, organization, and creativity skills through different aspects of this internship. I got to plan a few lessons where I significantly got to use these skills while I strengthened other ones that I was just learning how to display through tasks.

am so grateful for all of the experiences and opportunities I had during my internship. It was so interesting to experience a class from this viewpoint, and I found it so beneficial when deciding if this is the career path I want to follow. I enjoyed getting to know the students and seeing the different ways that Mrs. Barnes would teach them the material. Each student learns differently and it is important to acknowledge that when planning engaging lessons that addresses each style of learning (i.e. visual, observational, auditory, or kinesthetic learning). I was constantly learning as I observed both Mrs. Barnes and the students. I took note of the ways she would keep the class engaged and interested in the lessons. She created and planned interesting lessons that I would love to recreate in my future classroom one day.

Internship Highlights

from entries in my internship journal

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pre winter break activities

Prior to the week before winter break, Mrs. Barnes suggested that I pick activities for the students to do in the class before the vacation week. I printed pages of "winter themed" activities like "name that holiday song" and led that day of class, as they enthusiastically completed the activities in their table groups.

friday fun

Every Friday class, Mrs. Barnes devotes the last 15 minutes of class to "Friday Fun" where we led the students in a game. Their favorite is to play the game "last word" where they compete against each other to come up with words that start with an assigned ter, that fit a category like "foods that start with the letter m."





daily dol

Every class there are two sentences on the board that are grammatically incorrect. Students' names are drawn from popsicle sticks and they correct that day's sentences. When completed, I review them with the class, take suggestions, and make the necessary changes until they're correct.

dol notebooks/ student work

Each student is responsible for writing the correct sentences in their DOL notebooks. Each month I went through and assisted Mrs. Barnes with grading them. It was interesting to see the student's work and progress.

Reflecting On My Performance And Experience As An Intern

my performance

In the beginning, the idea of adding an internship into my schedule was a little out of my comfort zone but I am so grateful for the experiences and connections that I made by doing it. Mrs. Barnes was so welcoming, as I took on the role of being an intern student in her classroom. Being in front of a class took time and practice to get used to but my growth was apparent and I got to try out many different tasks that a teacher has to do to maintain a successful classroom. This experience helped me confirm and feel confident that this is the career path I want to follow.

reflection

This experience was so different than anything I have ever done before, and I always looked forward to learning as much as I could from Mrs. Barnes. I admire her love for the job and you can see just how much she cares about the students. She is passionate about the books and material she is teaching, and I aspire to display these traits in my own classroom one day. I always pushed myself to ask questions and to offer help to students and would often walk around the room as they completed assignments. I completed each task with attentiveness, interest, and just overall appreciation for all the teachers who show up with a smile on their face daily.



The Students	I have seen the importance of acknowledging the fact that students are growing humans that have emotions and hard days and that it's ok to adjust a lesson plan for them, like taking a break outside. This can help them refocus and it increases their productivity. Each student is unique and I have loved getting to know this group of students.
My Experiences	I remember being their age and in the same class. Certain projects/ books were very memorable and I was able to think back to those. I used that to assist and connect with them while going through all the units. Since 8th grade, I've learned so much academically and from other teachers that I was able to apply during this internship.
Our Growth	So much can happen in a year and looking back to September, I am much more comfortable now in this space and position. I pushed myself out of my comfort zone to get the most experience out of this internship. The students academic growth has been so interesting to observe, just as I am learning beside them and from them daily.


Why I chose this as my internship:




- In this internship, I helped both the Librarian, Ms. Idman, and the Physical Education teacher, Mr. De La Vega.





Why this internship?


I'm considering becoming an art teacher, and I thought this would be a good way to see how the occupation works. Additionally, I enjoy working with children. Seeing their work and processes is always interesting to me. It's also nice to help them out, as middle school can be a lot for kids.



- Lack of motivation: Kids will ask Mr. Newby if what they have is "good." Often times, they already will know that it isn't their best work. What they're really asking is if it will get a passing grade in an attempt to take the easiest way out.
- Not drawing exactly what they see: As opposed to actually looking at the reference, students will assume they know what they're drawing and create symbols to represent what is actually there.



- TRITE: the notorious "trite" elements
 (symbols overused to the point where they lose their meaning) can be rampant and hard for students to conquer
- Lack of motivation: Often times, kids would walk up to Mr. Newby and ask if their work was good. In reality, they just want to know what grade they get and if it will be passing; striving for the bare minimum
- It just takes 1: All it takes to disrupt the order of the class is one disruptive student.



You Can Lead a Horse To Water...

- Commonly, Mr. Newby would have to repeat the same piece of advice multiple times before students would actually apply it to their own projects.
- Leaders are a crucial part to success in the classroom; it is very obvious and chaotic when there are no leaders present.
- Ideally, the students will gain confidence in their abilities after they complete assignments and see the fruits of their labor; however, there seems to be a fear of failure that keeps many students from trying.



At the beginning of the internship, I was somewhat intimidated by the students and the responsibilities that come with them. But overtime and through observing Mr. Newby's methods, I was able to interact and sometimes even help the students with their projects.






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
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

What I Learned



Reflections




- I loved taking care of the turtles and answering questions about them when some of the students would ask.



Highlights

- I developed skills on how to teach students while also being able to connect to the student on a more


entertaining learning level.

- I learned from Mrs. Donovan how to adjust my approach to student engagement.




What I Did


Growth as a "Professional"

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Introduction

Coming into my internship, I was not completely sure what I was looking for exactly. I knew that I hoped to complete my Gold Award through the job, and that I was looking to be in the Harwich Elementary School somewhere where I might be able to integrate art. At the start of the school year, I was able to get connected with a guidance counselor at HES, Jill Malinowski. She agreed to support my project, and I grew excited as I began to learn more about her and her job. My Gold Award project needed students to work frequently on personal art journals that would be used to interpret thoughts and emotions. In the guidance office, these were integrated into the 3-for-3 partnerships, where I was meeting with a couple of students three times a week as a major part of the internship. Being in the guidance office, I would be working with students who needed the prompts the most, requiring special time to relax, reflect, and engage.



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3-for-3's

I met regularly with certain students multiple times a week through a program called 3-for-3. Often during our meetings, the students and I would work on responding to the prompts in their art journals being used for my Gold Award. The prompts asked students questions that helped them reflect, focus, and relax. These would also often be centered around students' thoughts, opinions, and feelings. These prompts were ones that I created in response to the curriculum within the guidance office. My mentor guided me on what prompts to create and helped me understand how to best approach each student. In addition to the journals, students and I also walked together to meet on days where there was less time, read books that often related to future prompts, and worked on ongoing projects.

What one day's journal entry looks like

Magic 8 Ball Breathing

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
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Today, and I worked on drawing what we were feeling before and after practicing our breathing. When we started, he said he felt excited and energized, and drew a smiley face to represent this. Then, he took a couple deep breaths by tracing the magic 8 ball pictures. I asked him how he was feeling now. He said he felt more conscious. I showed him my picture, where I felt calmer and lighter after breathing. He agreed and drew birds to show that lightness.



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What one day's journal entry looks like

3-for-3 Day 10: Yellow Zone Prompt

Today and I started off talking about her recent trip to the aguarium. She had mentioned the other week how she had wanted to go to one, so it was cool to hear that she did. For today's prompt, was introduced to the vellow zone. When asked when she has felt she was in the vellow zone. cruise, since when she found out, she was very excited, but also gets nervous and anxious about it too. When excited, feels she is bouncing off the walls, sometimes to the point of a stomach ache. When she feels nervous or anxious about the trip though, it is usually about something going wrong on the plane or boat. She told me about a voutube video she watched about a cruise ship sinking. and a person in a plane that's engine broke that she learned about. She has been worried that the same might happen to her and her family. For the prompt, said that it feels like a bouncy ball is bouncing around inside of her. She drew this bouncy ball to represent her anxiety, and said she wanted to do it in her least favorite colors to show that it is a negative feeling to her.

How do I feel when I'm in the yellow zone?



Part way through the internship, reading groups were introduced. These groups met Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays. They were made up of first graders, all experiencing some language barriers and still learning English, along with a group of fourth graders. It was the fourth graders' job to help the first grade students learn to read. Each fourth grader was paired with a first grader. While teaching the younger group to read, the fourth graders worked on following what they were reading with their finger, pointing out pictures, and taking pauses to ask questions. On days where I was at my internship during the time that reading groups took place, I helped by rotating through groups to support students while reading and later typing up evaluations on how some of the groups did.

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While I was at my internship I also got to work on a number of creative projects. Many of these were posters associated with each month to go up outside of the guidance office on the bulletin board. I worked on coming up with ideas on how to organize the boards according to the celebration of the month and then putting them together. Prior to all of this, I also often conducted research on that month's celebration to help with a slideshow that would act as a resource to go alongside the board. In addition, I worked during this time on a big project with one of the students that I was working with for my 3-for-3. On our first day together, she talked about how she loves to play outside. I brought up fairies and making fairy houses in response and found out that this student loves fairies. This was where I got the idea to begin consistently working on a fairy house collage together.

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
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What I learned

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A B C I learned through a mix of observation, watching and understanding what Jill would do with her students, and from instruction and her guiding me to recognize how to best approach each student. I soon realized that every student was different than another: some louder, some quieter, some having a hard time staying focused, some anxious. This was not something that had been nearly as transparent to me as a student myself, but in the position my internship placed me in, I was better able to distinguish this. Because each student was different, many appeared to need different things or had things that required more focus than others. While working with students who got distracted easily, getting caught up in conversation or wanting to play instead of work, it was my goal to keep them focused and productive. Alternatively, for students who may have been shy at first, it was my goal to make them feel comfortable and encouraged.

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Performance

During my time at my internship, it was important to me that I performed to the best of my abilities. I made sure to manage my time accordingly, coming in on time and letting my mentor know the days I knew I would not be available, trying my best to keep those minimal. Collaboration was an important part of the job, and I worked together with my mentor, my students, and others at HES on a daily basis. I was able to apply innovation to my work in the guidance department, adding my own touch through the prompts and posters I created. While working with students, my level of empathy and care for student experiences and attitudes was important. I spoke to students softly and calmly, also knowing when it was appropriate to have fun and laugh together. I often took time outside of my internship to remain caught up with the work I was doing. I created all of the prompts at home, and in an effort to fit in as much time with students as I could while I was there, often finished writing evaluations for the meetings with students later outside of the building.

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The whole internship itself was a highlight for me. If I was ever having a dreary day, I always knew that getting to come into HES would cheer me up. Although, one of my favorite things was being able to watch the connections and trust that formed between me and my students. It was exciting to see them happy to see me and to be able to get along well, having our own jokes and things that we would frequently talk about. Seeing the ways that students who had been shy at first slowly opened up to me felt gratifying and special. I also especially enjoyed when I was at my internship on certain days that therapy dogs came in. I enjoyed getting to help out with this, moving between classrooms with the dogs. It was fun to see students' reactions to the animals and the way their faces would light up. I was also happy that I worked on many creative projects during my time there, as that had been been a hope for me initially. I got to work on creating examples for the journal prompts, making posters for the board, and more small projects along the way.

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What Made it Real

My time at HES felt like more than just an internship. I felt connected to what I was doing in guidance. This was not only important to the internship but also, it was important to me. Because of this, it easily brightened my day and encouraged me to continue to work hard at the job and give it my all. I was able to learn more about myself, like how I liked working with kids. Additionally, it encouraged growth in positive characteristics for me. I could feel myself grow through my work and the effort that I was putting in. It was so formative an experience that it influenced me to consider looking further into education combined with art therapy in the future, as some of the practices I worked with students on could fall into such a category. I am entering college undecided within the arts, so I hope to further explore this there. Significantly, the internship also allowed me to make an impact in some way through my efforts within my Gold Award. Success with this felt rewarding and made me even more grateful for the experience.



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Sustainability

As a part of the Gold Award, it was especially important for my work with the students to be sustained. I was able to continue my collaboration with the guidance office at HES through a number of additional prompts that I created during my time at the internship in addition to the ones I was creating to use presently. These prompts were created independently but inspired by ideas that I came to understand often come up with students at guidance that are important to teach. When I was leaving my internship, I gave Jill these prompts so that they could continue to be used in the guidance office. She sustained the project by continuing to use the prompts with her students and with the students who her other intern works with as well.

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
Sustainability Prompt Examples

Growth

Materials: crayons, colored pencils, pen/pencil, markers

Instructions:

- Look at the two hands on the page. The big hand is your hand right now, the little hand is your hand when you were younger.
- For the younger hand, write one word inside to describe yourself when you were younger.
- 3. Draw a picture of this along with it!
- For your hand right now, write one word to describe yourself now.
- 5. Draw a picture of this!
- 6. Note the differences between your smaller hand and your bigger hand. These show how you may have grown or changed over time!



The Weather Inside of you

Materials: colored pencils, crayons, markers

Instructions:

- You've seen how the weather changes outside every day. Sometimes, it's bright and sunny, sometimes it's dark and cloudy, it snows, it rains, it can get windy! Today you will compare a type of weather to something you feel inside.
- Sometimes sunny weather is used to show happiness, and rainy weather portrays sadness, but you can use whatever weather you see fit for your emotion!
- 3. First, come up with some emotions you might be feeling. What might these emotions look like if they were turned into a type of weather?
- Draw that type of weather to represent those emotions inside of the body on the page.
- What emotions did you feel while creating this? Do you think you feel this kind of weather often?

The Ways I Like to Show and Recieve Love

Materials: colored pencils, crayons, markers

Instructions:

- There are many ways to show love! Some people like physical touch (ex. hugs, holinghands), some like quality time (ex. watching a movie together, taking a walk together), some like words of affirmation (ex. Thve you.", special cards), some like gifts (ex. something made for someone, flowers), and some like acts of service (ex. helping with a chore, teaching someone something).
- Knowing what kinds of love you like can help you understand how you would like to be treated! Additionally, seeing how the people around you like to receive love can help you express that you care about them!

- Draw something that you think of when you think of that love langage on your page in your journal.

Reflections

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




Senior Year Internship

Making it Real



Thank you for everything you have done for me Mrs. Oliver!! I couldn't have accomplished any of what I have this year without you.






WHAT I DID

OBSERVED


I spent time observing Mrs. Hemeon while she taught lessons. I had had her for class before, but in my internship I focused my attention on how she taught further than learning.

GROWTH AS A PROFESSIONAL


I learned to work on and create a resume, as well as keep track of my hours and meet deadlines. This will allow me to be better prepared for my job applications in the future.


WHAT MADE IT REAL






What I Learned
