The Hawthorne School District is pleased to announce that Mr. Steve Tabor, Associate Superintendent - Pupil Personnel Services, was recently named Pupil Personnel Administrator of the Year by Region 14 of the Association of California School Administrators (ACSA). Mr. Tabor was recognized in front of a crowd of nearly 200 attendees at a regional awards banquet held in Long Beach on April 27th.

Founded in 1971, ACSA is the largest umbrella organization for school leaders in the United States, serving more than 17,000 California educators. Region 14 covers an extensive area, including every school district from Beverly Hills to Long Beach.

Each year, ACSA recognizes a select group of individuals in up to twenty categories for their significant contributions to public education. Nominations are submitted by local charters and are then reviewed by a regional awards committee.

Mr. Tabor was selected as the regional awardee for his 37 years of dedicated service to the Hawthorne School District and because of his reputation as a recognized expert in the area of pupil personnel services. He has tackled a wide range of issues during his career and he has always focused on building strong and lasting bonds with staff, students, and families.

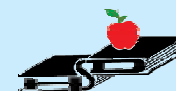

STEM Parent Workshop

We had a great turnout at our Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) Parent Workshop on April 28! Parents had the opportunity to participate in a STEM lesson just like ones taught to their students.

With the help of some of her students, Ms. Shintani presented an interactive lesson about reaction time. Parents were paired up and conducted an experiment that measured their reaction times when trying to catch a yard stick. This activity covered concepts such as time, stimulus, measurement, and average. Parents measured how far the yard stick dropped before they were able to catch it. They then recorded, graphed, and compared the data. Ms. Shintani added information about the nervous system and its relationship to reaction time. She also provided Web sites for parents to explore these concepts further.

Our parents loved the lesson and had a great time!

Gold Ribbon School

This program integrates science, technology and engineering problem-based experiences to prepare students to successfully solve real-world problems. Zela Davis' courses are aligned with Common Core State Standards in math and English language arts as well as Next Generation Science Standards.



Zela Davis' STEM program started five years ago and has grown dramatically. Currently, all of our students visit the STEM Lab on a monthly basis and participate in grade-level lessons. Zela Davis is in year two of Project Lead the Way (PLTW) implementation in 12 K-fifth-grade classrooms; all students participate in Curiosity Machine Design Challenges and have the opportunity to participate in STEM Enrichment classes focusing on technology and engaging girls in engineering.

Honoring Our Teachers

On May 11, educators around the state marked the 34th anniversary of California's Day of the Teacher.

California's Day of the Teacher is patterned after the celebration of the traditional El Dia del Maestro, which is observed in Mexico and other Latin American countries.

It arose out of legislation authored by Sen. Joseph Montoya and co-sponsored by the California Teachers Association and the Association of Mexican American Educators in 1982.

At the Los Angeles County Office of Education, we honored our teachers who work very hard to instill in our students an appreciation of our society's cultural diversity, a love of learning, and the skills to pursue productive lives.

I started my career in education as a teacher, and the occasion reminded me why I became one. I became a teacher because I had amazing teachers who were able to shine a light of hope and inspiration in my young life.

Most of us remember the special teachers who touched our lives. We recall the way they made us feel and how they encouraged and challenged us. They helped us become who we are today.

Teachers care for their students well after the school day ends. They put in long hours finding new ways to make lessons come alive. They work hard to build relationships with students' families to make sure the students have the support that they need at home.

These are just a few examples of how teachers go above and beyond the call of duty to make a difference in their students' lives.

As one of our past Los Angeles County Teachers of the Year, Rebecca Mieliwocki, who went on to become the 2012 National Teacher of the Year, said: "A schoolteacher is the best tax-dollar bargain you will ever get. If you want to see tax dollars hard at work. Come into a classroom and see what's going on."

Arturo Delgado, Ed.D., was appointed superintendent of the Los Angeles County Office of Education in July of 2011. With headquarters in Downey, the Office is the nation's largest regional educational agency, providing a range of programs and services to support the county's 80 public school districts and 2 million preschool and school-age children.

The idea of sustainability coupled with eating a healthy diet has been gaining steady momentum in communities across the country. The concept is becoming part of the curriculum of an increasing number of elementary schools. Community gardens and rooftop beekeeping have been established in cities, and it's not uncommon to find classes and entire schools planting gardens on campus.

Earthworm Ensemble, a group of family musicians, integrates this lifestyle into their new collection, *Backyard Garden*. The CD is a sprightly collection of country-rock tunes with a narrative of growth for both plants and youngsters.

Everything our planet needs has a tribute on the CD, be it ladybugs, wind and compost or compassion and responsibility. The title tune expresses the joy of growing, harvesting, cooking and eating and getting dirty in the process. "Bees Make Honey" arranges strings and lyrics to create a worthy hymn to the busy workers and also includes essential vocabulary for young people: *cross-pollination, drone, worker bees*. "Chicken Coop" informs listeners that backyard chickens are free range and quite content, and it would be lovely if all poultry were raised this way. "Reduce Reuse Recycle" turns an omnipresent motto into a steel-guitar-embroidered song of hope for the planet and its young residents.

Summer's here, and it's time to tend the garden, whether it's a rural, suburban or urban one. *Backyard Garden* is a brisk and bouncy accompaniment to a favorable combination of Mother Nature and human nature.
