Remembering a Special Teacher

With the passing of Mr. Orlando Martinez, a teacher at Prairie Vista Middle School, the Hawthorne School District suddenly, recently, and tragically lost a member of its family. While supporting students and staff at the school the day after the unfortunate event, I was approached by a young man, Sergio Morales, who recognized me as the superintendent. He quickly said, "Your next School News article should be a tribute to Mr. Martinez." I agreed and suggested that he should help me write the article. He quickly agreed and the following is a result of that short conversation on that very sad day:

Sometimes it's one person, other times, it's ten, maybe twenty, but in this case, it's a whole school and district that is recovering from a great loss. On Wednesday, March 2, 2016, Mr. Orlando Martinez said; "I'll be back on Friday and we will start making a quilt." What nobody knew, was that he would be back that Friday... in heaven. The bell rang for second lunch, and he said a simple "bye". And so it was.

I didn't know it. None of us knew that the simple, "bye" he said was actually a farewell, because that day would be the last day he would be in his classroom. On March 4th, I recall seeing how many people were heartbroken over the news. One girl only knew him for a short one and a half months, but while she did, she truly liked how he taught during first period. While some managed to hold it together that day, most were in tears. Many of my friends reacted as if a family member was gone; because a family member was gone.

When he entered Prairie Vista Middle School as an 8th grade teacher, I came in as a 6th grade student. He was there for us, and in his short time here, he shared a lot of things with us, mainly how great life can be. He will be remembered by all of us as a friend, teacher, and family member.

Recordando a un Maestro Especial

Con el repentino fallecimiento del Sr. Orlando Martinez, maestro de la Escuela Secundaria Prairie Vista, recientemente y trágicamente el Distrito Escolar de Hawthorne perdió a un miembro de su familia. Mientras les brindaba apoyo a los estudiantes y al personal de la escuela el día después del evento desafortunado, se acercó a mí un joven, Sergio Morales, quien me reconoció como la superintendente. Rápidamente me dijo, "Su próximo artículo del boletín de noticias escolares" debería ser un homenaje al Sr. Martinez." Estuve de acuerdo y le sugerí que me debería ayudar a escribir el artículo. Rápidamente él estuvo de acuerdo y lo siguiente es el resultado de una breve conversación de ese triste día:

A veces es una persona, otras veces, son diez, quizás veinte, pero en este caso, es toda una escuela y el distrito que se está recuperando de una gran pérdida. El miércoles 2 de marzo de 2016, el Sr. Orlando Martinez dijo; "Regresaré el viernes y comenzaremos a hacer un montaje de tela (quilt)." Lo que nadie sabía, fue que volvería ese viernes... al cielo. La campana del segundo almuerzo sonó, y él nos dijo un simple "adiós." Y así fue.

Yo no sabía. Ninguno de nosotros sabía que ese simple, "adiós" que él dijo en realidad era una despedida, porque ese día sería el último día que él estaría en su salón de clase. En marzo 4, recuerdo ver como mucha gente se encontraban desconsolados por la noticia. Una chica lo conoció sólo por un tiempo corto de mes y medio, pero en ese tiempo, a ella realmente le gustó como enseñaba durante el primer periodo. Aunque algunos lograron mantener su postura ese día, la mayoría estaban llorando. Muchos de mis amigos reaccionaron como si un miembro de la familia se hubiera ido; porque un miembro de nuestra familia se nos había ido.

Cuando él entró a la Escuela Secundaria Prairie Vista como maestro de 8o grado, yo llegué como estudiante de 6o grado. Él estaba allí para apoyarnos, y en su corto tiempo aquí, compartió muchísimas cosas con nosotros, principalmente lo grandiosa que puede ser la vida. Él será recordado por todos nosotros como un amigo, maestro, y miembro de la familia.

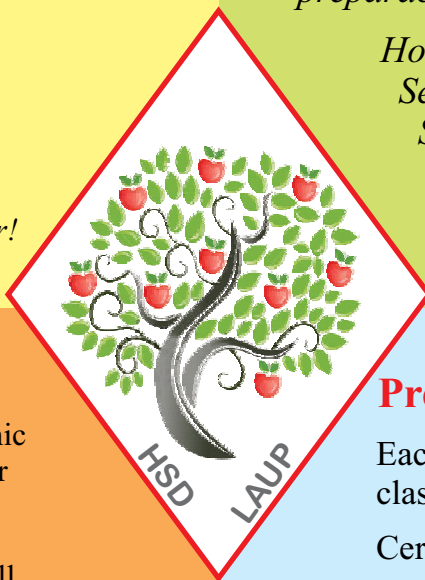

The Hawthorne School District and community should take pride in their achievements, as these students are as much a product of HMSA as they are product of their elementary and middle schools, families, and communities.

Genesis S. (Class of 2017) has been awarded a paid internship with the Constitutional Rights Foundation (CRF). CRF's

Expanding Horizons Internship gives students the opportunity to work in a professional setting, gain confidence, and interact with other high school students, while training them to become well-rounded leaders in their school and community.

Linda M. (Class of 2017), with the assistance of her AP Environmental Science teacher Crystal Davis, was able to obtain an EarthWatch Institute scholarship to work with scientists in Arizona to study flammulated owls this summer. Earth Watch's mission is "to engage people worldwide in scientific field research and education to promote the understanding and action necessary for a sustainable environment."

Isaac G. and Johann W. (Class of 2016) have both been selected to move onto the second phase of the Gates Millennium Scholars selection process. Final award recipients will be notified in late April, but no matter what the final outcome, they both should be congratulated on this achievement which also happens to be a milestone in HMSA school history.

A student team – Kevin L., Mina B., Ahmed M., Yvan S. Osvaldo V., Kris M., Cristian R., and Vanessa V., with the guidance of AP Physics teacher Charlie Flint – competed against seven local area high schools and won first place in the eighth-annual Northrop Grumman High School Innovation Challenge. The student team worked for three months under the mentorship of an engineer to design and build a hovercraft. Students were required to write a report, present their design to company judges, and complete a challenge with their engineering solution.

Project L.E.A.D.

Washington School is proud to be a participant in the “Legal Enrichment and Decision Making” program. Project L.E.A.D. is an effective law-related education program established by the Los Angeles County District Attorney’s Office in 1993.

The program has been taught at Washington School for the past three school years. It is directed at the fifth grade, and each year a different class is selected to participate. The 20-week curriculum teaches fifth-grade students about the criminal justice system and the importance of making good decisions.

Volunteers from within the District Attorney’s Office are instructors for the program, and serve as role models in the classroom.

The attorney-volunteers arrive at Washington each Tuesday at lunch. The students eat their lunch in the classroom and remain in class for recess. This allows the attorneys more time to present the information.

Included in the curriculum are two field trips. The trips include the Museum of Tolerance and the LAX courthouse. At the courthouse the students perform a scripted mock trial, putting into practice what they have learned about the criminal justice system.

This year our class also had a special presentation from the Hawthorne Police Department. Project L.E.A.D. also teaches students techniques for resolving conflict and resisting peer pressure. Other lessons promote tolerance and respect for diversity. Another lesson demonstrates the role of education in achieving economic stability and acquaints students with basic household budgeting.

This important program teaches children that the choices they make today can affect their lives forever. We at Washington realize that partnerships are essential to the success of our students.

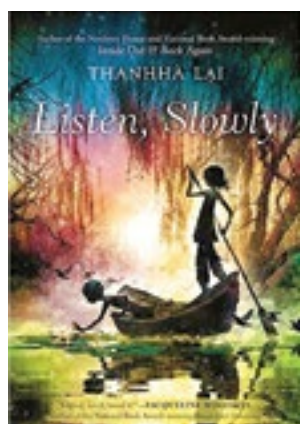
Listen, Slowly

One fine day—and in her world, every day contains something fine—children's singer/songwriter Frances England packed up her family and drove around San Francisco, her home town, to play a game that involved counting everyone looking down at their mobile devices instead of up and around at the neighborhoods. Unsurprisingly, the players lost count.

But there was a winner—it's this collection of original songs about looking and seeing, hearing and listening, and feeling in every literal sense. *Explorer of the World* is an invitation, perhaps even a dare, to connect in a real way to the real world. It's also a template to do your own projects with children in your life—there's a book available at frances.England.com.

The collection is a commingling of sounds England “found” after two years of street and sidewalk searching; sprightly, catchy melody lines; and instrumentation from the expected to the uncommon, like bucket drums and melodicas. Know what a beatboxer is? If you've seen people on the sidewalk looking like they're lip-synching to a percussion ensemble and it turns out that the sounds are actually coming from their own lips and larynges, you'll know and will appreciate England's “Ballad for a Beatboxer,” backed up by rhythms from her friend and accomplished beatboxer Carlos Aguirre. “All the Things I've Found” describes the wonder of familiarity in cast-off objects like bottle caps and shopping lists; “Street Life” sings of the less-tangible things.

Ever wish for wonder in your own world? It's there for you. First, put down the phone.
