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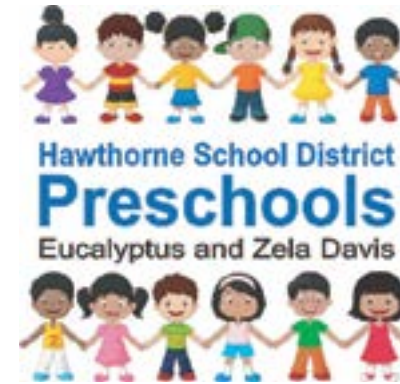

Aviators Receive Free Eyeglasses

Over one-fourth of our HMSA Aviators recently received free eyeglasses thanks to the coordinated efforts of Vision to Learn, our local Rotary Clubs, and the Hawthorne School District.

Under the leadership of health clerk Rindy Mahoney, our HMSA students participated in vision screenings last December in order to determine who needed follow-up eye exams. Throughout January

and February, Vision to Learn staff members visited our campus and tested over 250 students to confirm their need for eyeglasses.

On March 21, 162 of our students met with the Rotarians and Vision to Learn staff, listened to a presentation about proper eyeglass care, and then consulted with opticians to adjust their frames.

"Rotary loves partnering with Vision to Learn and the schools to bring free eye exams and glasses to every student that needs them," said Nora MacLellan, outreach coordinator for Vision to Learn. "If a child can't see, how can they learn?"

Why is attendance so important? Chronic absence—missing 10 percent of school

annually—is a leading cause of low academic achievement. Chronically absent children in TK, kindergarten and first grade are much less likely to read at grade level by third grade. By high school, poor attendance becomes a significant predictor of not graduating.

Jefferson emphasizes good attendance from TK through fifth grade. Let's strive to reach our goals of getting students to school on time daily and do our best to plan appointments after school hours. 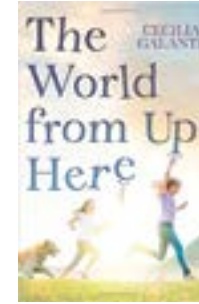
