### Equitable Access and Opportunity to Instruction

#### Virtual/Remote Learning Procedures

#### Attendance

- The Carlstadt Board of Education in compliance with state law, requires that the pupils of this district be present for instruction and attend all classes.
- Students will be required to complete their attendance log daily whether in school or at home. Failure to do so will result in a student being marked absent.
- Home streaming sessions (using Google Meet or Zoom) are NOT Vacation Days and count towards class attendance.
- Students are expected to log onto their Chromebook and be present for all virtual sessions, during school hours.
- Oversleeping and not logging onto their assigned Zoom session will be treated as cutting class.
- Students will be marked as absent if they fail to log into virtual sessions. Teachers will mark attendance in Genesis.
- Students must log-on prior to 8:41. Any student who logs on after that time will be marked tardy.
- Parents will be called and/or emailed in the event their child is tardy or absent.
- All assignments must be submitted through Classtag and/or Google Classroom.

We strongly encourage parents to establish a DAILY routine of having their child(ren) up, dressed and finished with breakfast BEFORE the start of class. Help your child(ren) understand they are still in school 5 Days A Week. Virtual learning days are NOT vacation days. We recommend that your child has a specified learning area in your home where they can set up a work space in order to get optimal learning done.

<p>Technology and Connectivity</p>	<p>Chrome books have become an important part of a student’s education. 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Special Education Needs	
IDEA	<p>Carlstadt will continue to meet our obligations under the Federal Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and the New Jersey State special education regulations for students with disabilities to the greatest extent possible. CPS special education department will utilize a hybrid of in-person and remote learning, including supplemental instruction and self guided activities, to meet students instructional and related service needs.</p>
Project Child Find	<p>The Carlstadt Public School district recognizes the importance of providing services to children with special needs through its <i>Project Child Find</i> efforts. CPS annually seeks to identify children residing in the Borough of Carlstadt, from the ages of 3 through 21, who may be at risk for learning disabilities. Children in this age group who exhibit developmental delays in language, cognition, physical and/or emotional development, may be eligible for services from the public school. If your child is determined to be potentially eligible for services, the local public school district will evaluate your child. The evaluation is available to preschoolers; to highly mobile students with disabilities, such as migrant and homeless students; and to all students who may have a disability. Children found to be eligible for special education and related services are entitled to free and appropriate special education programming and related services. Parents should contact the district, if they have concerns, when their child is 2 years six months of age or older. If you suspect that your child has a disabling condition or you would like further information on the referral</p>

Provision of Accommodations and Modifications	Alternate methods of instruction are available for assignments which may include one-to-one support with a Paraprofessional or teacher or consultation with the ESL teacher(s). Sheltered Instruction strategies are included in all lesson plans. All staff members are trained yearly in Sheltered Instruction practices, culturally responsive teaching, SEL strategies and trauma informed teaching. Additional professional development opportunities are available for staff who need additional support.

Ensuring the Continuity of Services	
General Services	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The district has identified certain needs that will be funded by the CRRSA-ESSER II grant that will provide a continuation of services for students impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The district is planning to provide therapeutic care for identified students who have experienced isolation, trauma, depression and anxiety. This therapeutic care will include individual and family counseling to support students' academic success and mental health needs. We will do this through a combination of support with our BCBA and guidance counselors.</li> <li>• The district is also planning to improve elementary science and STEAM, English Language Arts and Visual and Performing Arts through learning academies throughout the year. A STEAM lab is being created in part of the media center to afford students the opportunity to participate in clubs and explore the field of Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics. An analysis of student growth will be used to determine areas in need of support to increase student success, with structures that accelerate, rather than remediate, learning.</li> <li>• The district is also budgeting to work with an instructional coach that will assist teachers in learning how to increase students' success in a variety of content areas after the disruption of learning following the pandemic.</li> <li>• Social-emotional learning will also be a key factor in student success. The district budgeted for SEL training for professional staff to</li> </ul>







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	<p>strengthen SEL, promote SEL for students, and to develop a plan for addressing the emotional fallout of the trauma of COVID-19. SEL opportunities are available for staff and students throughout the year.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The district will also increase work with the BCBA from two days a week to three. The district will also continue to support any PPE and building supplies needed to continue to offer the level of care needed to support the health and safety of our staff and students.</li> </ul>
Accelerated Learning Opportunities and Title 1 Programs	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Weekly after school instructions are available for all students from 3:00-3:30, Monday-Thursday.</li> <li>• Participation in the After School Learning Academy will be available for students in need of additional support. Students will be determined eligible by the I&amp;RS committee.</li> <li>• The Summer Learning Academy will be available for all students in July 2024.</li> <li>• RTI instruction is available during the school day for students in need of support. 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### Safe Delivery of Meals

Eligible Students	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>All students who are eligible will be provided with a free or reduced price meal each day they are in school which will include items consistent with the National School Lunch Program.</li> <li>In the event the district needs to switch to a fully virtual learning program, eligible students will be afforded the opportunity to pick up, grab and go breakfast and lunch meals on Wednesday afternoons at the cafeteria entrance. Meals will be enough for 7 days.</li> <li>Eligibility will be determined through the Lunch Application submitted to the Main Office.</li> </ol>
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### Facilities Plan

Cleaning, Disinfection, and Airflow	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Clean and disinfect surfaces and objects that are touched often; such as desks, countertops, doorknobs, computer keyboards, hands-on learning items, faucet handles, phones, and toys at least daily.</li> <li>Improve airflow to the extent possible to increase circulation of outdoor air, increase the delivery of clean air, and dilute potential contaminants.</li> <li>Custodial dept. follows the cleaning schedule which includes regular cleaning/disinfecting as well as rotational “deep cleaning” of high touch/high traffic areas. We use Bioesque products from the EPA’s acceptable list. We maintain an adequate inventory of cleaning supplies. Staff disinfects frequently during the day for touchpoints, classrooms, isolation areas, lunch tables, and nurses’ offices including shared student items. Disinfectant is used throughout the building at the end of each day using an electrostatic sprayer. All outside damper units regularly circulate in outside air at a minimum of 10%. The HVAC system is controlled remotely to ensure proper ventilation. We have installed 6 Bipolar Ionization units in the HVAC system for added</li> </ul>
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	<p>filtration and improved air quality. We replaced the HVAC electronic control system this summer. All units are serviced/monitored. We replace air filters frequently. Water bottle filling stations have been installed to reduce the spread of germs.</p>
