AP DIPLOMA CANDIDATES:

1. Earn 24 credits with a "C" or better in all classes in which enrolled as a high school student.
2. Take four years of mathematics, including 1.0 math credit during the senior year.
3. Take at least six AP courses throughout the four years of high school.
4. Remain in the AP Academy.

AP CAPSTONE DIPLOMA CANDIDATES:

1. Earn 24 credits with a "C" or better in all classes in which enrolled as a high school student.
2. Take four years of mathematics, including 1.0 math credit during the senior year.
3. Take at least six AP courses throughout the four years of high school.
4. Take AP Seminar and score 3 or higher, AP Research and score 3 or higher, take 4 additional AP Exams earning a score of 3 or higher on each exam.
5. Remain in the AP Academy.

SPECIAL PROGRAMS

- **ADVANCED PLACEMENT** – All AP grades are weighted on a 5.0 G.P.A. scale. The Advanced Placement (AP) Program is a program of credit by examination for college level studies pursued in high school. AP is a nationwide program administered by the College Board. 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- **Pre-AP CLASSES**

- **DUAL CREDIT**

Dual credit courses are offered on the high school campus during the student's regularly scheduled day. These courses are tuition free, but students may be required to purchase textbooks and other resource materials. A 3.00 credit semester college course is equivalent to .5 high school credits. SAT FEE WAIVERS

Students who demonstrate financial need are eligible to receive up to two fee waivers for the SAT Reasoning Test. Generally, students who qualify for free or reduced lunch qualify for these waivers. Students who receive test fee waivers are

subsequently eligible for up to four Request for Waiver of College Application Fee forms. Contact your ACT/SAT test coordinator in the School Counseling Office to obtain College Application fee waivers.

FINANCING YOUR EDUCATION

College costs can be covered through scholarships, grants, and loans.

SCHOLARSHIPS - Awarded to students by Universities, Colleges, organizations, businesses and individuals.

To apply through BMHS,

- 1) Pick up the BMHS Scholarship Newsletter the first week of each month from the School Counseling Office.
- 2) The BMHS Scholarship Newsletter can also be found @ <http://hs.humboldtunified.com/>

- 3) Look at the eligibility requirements; if you find that you may qualify for a scholarship, pick up the hard copy of the application in the black 3-drawer cabinet located in the School Counseling Office; some applications are to be done online through the donor's website.
- 4) Note deadlines carefully and SEND YOUR APPLICATION TO THE RIGHT PLACE IN A TIMELY MANNER: the application may need to be sent electronically; it may be a postmark deadline; or it may indicate the date in which it is to be received. You are responsible for meeting these deadlines.

Letters of recommendation

- Ask for at least two letters of recommendation early in your senior year from adults who know you well, such as core class teachers, coach/club sponsor, job manager, church official.
- Request letters at least two weeks in advance.
- Give a copy of your resume and brag sheet to the persons you are asking for a recommendation.

Transcripts

Request your transcript through *Parchment* by creating an account @ <http://hs.humboldtunified.com/> → →Students→Order My Transcript→New/Existing Learner Account→Complete Information→Pay Online Fee
Ask your school registrar or your school counselor for an informal copy of your transcript at the start of each semester; you need to know your exact GPA and class rank for your college and scholarship applications.

GRANTS – Are typically awarded automatically through your future college once you have been admitted, and are based on financial need.

LOANS – A loan is money that you borrow from the federal government, and available strictly by filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) online at www.fafsa.gov; or from a private lender such as a bank at a specific interest rate, which varies from loan to loan.

There are two types of federal student loans:

- **Subsidized Loans** – Available to students with demonstrated financial need as determined by the information in the FAFSA. Interest does not start accruing until you are required to start paying the loan back, which is after you have graduated OR left the educational institution.
- **Unsubsidized Loans** – Available to all students, regardless of financial need. Students are responsible for all the interest, which begins to accrue immediately. You may receive both subsidized and unsubsidized loans at the same time. There is a limit to the amount you may borrow through the Stafford Loan Program.

- September - apply for a social security card if you don't have one for financial aid/college admission.
- September – check out FAFSA4caster to see how Federal Student Aid can help you pay for college. Go to www.fafsa.gov home page – click on “Estimate your federal aid using FAFSA4caster” button.
- Fill out FAFSA October 1st
- Male students must register with the Selective Service @ www.sss.gov in order to apply for federal/state aid.

MILITARY OPPORTUNITIES

Bradshaw Mountain High School JROTC

JROTC or Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps Program is an opportunity to be involved in the community, learn what it means to be a leader, and helps motivate young people to become better citizens. BMHS offers this program to students in 9-12 grade.

Military Colleges/Academies

The United States Military academies offer a wonderful opportunity to receive a completely funded four-year college education. To apply, the first step is to obtain a nomination from a United States Senator or Representative (a.k.a. - Congressional Nomination). Interested students should begin a file with their state official in their junior year. Some of the academies require a pre-candidate questionnaire to be filed at the same time as you file with your Congressman or Senator. The United States Military has five academies/colleges.
