3. PRINCIPALS' REPORTS:

- **3.A. Trousdale County Elementary School** Ms. Badru informed the Board about preparations for the opening of school which begins on July 29. She highlighted the successes of the recent Summer Learning Camp and the two-week Early Literacy teacher trainings in which almost all teachers participated. Ms. Badru announced that the school will host an open house from 6:00 to 7:00 pm. on July 27 for grades K-2 and on July 28 for grades 3-5. She informed the Board about the new high-dose math tutoring that will begin this fall naming the three teachers that will be providing math tutoring within the school day for students in grades 3, 4 and 5. Ms. Badru also noted ongoing professional developments that the school instructional coordinator and she are presently participating such as the TEAM evaluation training, TNTP intellectual curriculum preparation training, and the instructional supervisor academy. Ms. Badru emphasized the importance of student data analysis, curriculum planning, foundational skills, high quality instruction and curriculum to address learning loss brought about by the COVID pandemic.
- 3.B. Jim Satterfield Middle School Mr. McCall highlighted the success of the Summer Learning Camp and the culminating field trip to the Nashville Zoo. He updated the Board about school facility improvements including new classroom ceiling tiles, new carpet, and additional security cameras. He discussed the advantages of the new online student registration process and his work on developing a new master schedule noting that early information indicates that enrollment will be up from last year. He noted that he had four new teachers, seven counting three new teachers from last year, but looks at it as a challenge. He announced Landon Gulley had recently been hired as the school's new Instructional Coordinator for which he is excited to work with to accelerate the effectiveness of the new teachers. He stated that a key focus beginning this year is to expand career exploration opportunities for middle school students. Mr. McCall concluded that the school would be spending a lot of time improving student engagement in an effort to address learning loss from the pandemic.
- **3.C. Trousdale County High School** Ms. Dickerson informed the Board about the school's Credit Recovery summer programing noting a larger than normal participation rate due to the negative effects of the COVID pandemic. She stated that students were also able to work from

home on their school provided one-to-one device. She stated that the school is excited to return to 5-day, in person instruction for the fall. Ms. Dickerson informed the Board about summer teacher trainings in preparation for addressing learning loss as students return to in person learning. She stated that she has four new teachers for the 2021-22 school year. She discussed the new online student registration process stating that she already had 400 students registered which is up from last year. Ms. Dickerson highlighted the new elective course, Senior Seminar where the school will implement programing that will help eliminate barriers to postsecondary educational opportunities such as FAFSA completion, TN Promise, ACT preparation, and completing college applications. She also noted the addition of Principals of Farm and Agribusiness Management for juniors. Presently, we have six agriculture majors. Ms. Dickerson concluded by thanking the Board for the new carpet and library furniture.

4.B. Academic and Goal Updates - Dr. Satterfield praised the successes of the new Summer Learning Camp and the positive impacts on student learning heading into the new 2021-22 school year, emphasizing the effective leadership of Ms. Kellie Porter and Mr. Landon Gulley who served as the camp principals and the high attendance rates of both staff and students. He outlined the philosophy behind the "instructional reset" that focuses on high-quality curriculum, tier one instruction, building the instructional capacity of both district and school level leadership, and strategically purposing ESSER 3.0 funds to accelerate learning especially in content areas of reading and mathematics.

Dr. Satterfield highlighted the efforts and challenges of reopening schools moving from the hybrid model back to traditional 5-day schedule and praised the work of the principals and administrators to ensure an effective fast start to the new school year. He discussed his interest in applying for the Tennessee ALL Corps programing in an effort to stretch ESSER tutoring funds.

4.C. Project Updates - Dr. Satterfield noted a lot of projects were presently taking placing as he is in the process of making the final payment for the middle school roof, noting that it has a 20-year warranty. He listed projects; middle school ceiling tile replacement, installation of water filling stations, electric hand dryers and security cameras, painting of the high school exit doors, elementary school roof repairs, and updates on the football stadium renovation. He noted that they were trying to get the stadium ready by August 13 in time for the jamboree but that there is not a guarantee on that date at this time. He noted that the goal is to have the stadium ready for the first home game on August 27.

- The homebound instruction program is for students who because of a medical condition are unable to 1 2
 - attend the regular instructional program.¹ The homebound instruction program shall consist of three (3)
- hours of instruction per week while school is in session for a period of time determined, on a case-by-3
- 4 case basis, by the district.
- Homebound instruction is designed for short-term illnesses or injuries and is not intended to replace 5
- regular instructional programs. To qualify for this program, a student shall have a medical condition 6
- that will require the student to be absent for a minimum of ten (10) consecutive instructional days, or 7
- for an aggregate of at least ten (10) instructional days for a student who has a chronic medical 8
- condition. The student shall be certified by his/her treating physician as having a medical condition 9
- that prevents him/her from attending regular classes. The services provided to the homebound student 10
- shall reflect the student's capabilities and be determined by the homebound instructor, after 11
- consultation with appropriate professional staff of the student's assigned school. 12
- Recertification shall be obtained after the expiration of each period of homebound instruction if the 13
- student's treating physician certifies, in writing, that the student has a medical condition that prevents 14
- 15 him/her from returning to regular classes.

COVID-19 QUARANTINE² 16

- Students on homebound instruction who are temporarily quarantined due to a positive COVID-19 test 17
- result or possible exposure to COVID-19 may participate in remote instruction during the period of 18
- 19 quarantine only.


