3. SCHOOL DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS:

4. PRINCIPALS' REPORTS:

4.A. Trousdale County Elementary School - Ms. Badru reported that the school's staff is really stretched thin due to tons of staff sickness and very few substitutes to fill in for them. She noted that she has had to combine classrooms and serve as substitute herself on several occasions just to keep schools open for in person instruction. Ms. Badru stated that illnesses were largely due to elementary students being unable to receive a vaccination and the school can no longer maintain six-foot physical distancing. She stated that most parents do not have an alternative plan in the event of a school transition to distance learning while outlining the school's contingency plan in place in the event of a temporary school closure which includes the utilization of instructional reading and math videos with electronic submissions of assignments through Google Classroom. She noted the challenges of instructional technologies in the early grades while stating that the upper grades are more experienced in the use of educational technology.

Ms. Badru informed the Board about the most recent mid-nine week grade report, some disciplinary challenges with students who were not in school last year, and the new high-dose, low-ratio reading and math tutoring that is being utilized at the school. She concluded by responding to questions about student and staff illness noting the exemplary role school nurses play in keeping schools open.

- **4.B.** Jim Satterfield Middle School Mr. McCall reported few COVID staff related issues. He outlined the school's protocols to lessen COVID transmissions that included physical distancing where possible, cohorting, establishing traffic patterns, and quarantining. Mr. McCall provided the Board with the school's plan for transitioning to remote instruction in case of a school closure. He stated that the school's plan is to adhere to the same daily schedule for simplicity so that student learning will not be interrupted. Mr. McCall discussed how he is anticipating utilizing data from the upcoming nine-week benchmark assessments, the 2020-21 TCAP results, and TVAAS projections to provide targeted instruction for students this school year. Mr. McCall concluded by reporting on the progress of this year's volleyball and football teams.
- **4.C. Trousdale County High School** Ms. Dickerson reported no staff quarantines at the present time with (37) students in quarantine. She stated that more quarantined students are starting to choose to come to school wearing a protective mask at all times while indoors. Ms. Dickerson explained the school's temporary closure plan noting the school would continue its A/B daily schedule and would provide live, synchronous, classroom instruction for every class in the event of a school closure. She noted that mid-nine week grade reports were sent out last week and parents can and should be monitoring student grades and attendance through the PowerSchool Parent Portal. She informed the Board that Q1 benchmark assessments will begin on September 27 and that teachers will be working on building those assessments tomorrow during Power Friday. Ms. Dickerson discussed the senior mentoring planning where a teacher is paired with 2-3 students to provide postsecondary counseling including FAFSA filing, completing college applications, and career planning. Ms. Dickerson stated that (60) students have already signed up for the ACT Retake on October 5. Dr. Satterfield and Ms. Dickerson also informed the Board that the district will again be serving as an ACT testing site on Saturday December 11 for all eligible students.
- **4.D. Student School Board Representative** Phillip Zarichansky informed the Board about the Senior ACT retake that will be held on October 5. He highlighted key upcoming student events that included the football game vs Westmoreland on September 17, Senior pictures on September 21 and 22, Homecoming on Oct. 1, and the Yellow Jacket Band Invitational on Oct. 25.

5.B. Academic and Goal Updates - Dr. Satterfield noted that present student enrollment is up (106) students from last year. He said that the elementary school has (11) fewer students than last month. He discussed the school district's objective to keep schools open for in person learning, emphasizing the need for teamwork from students, parents, staff, and the community to follow health protocols in order to keep schools open. Dr. Satterfield outlined the district's blended learning plan that is flexible for either in-person or remote learning.

Dr. Satterfield explained the new waiver option for temporary remote instruction that has been recently provided by the State Department. The option can only be utilized for (7) instructional days and all extracurricular programing shall be suspended for each school that exercises the waiver option. Dr. Satterfield reminded the Board that the waiver option prevents schools from exhausting stockpile or "snow days" for which the district has (10) days reserved.

Dr. Satterfield concluded by outlining the district's plan for addressing learning loss due to the effects of the COVID pandemic. He stressed the primary importance of teacher and student attendance, high-quality curriculum, instructional practice, instructional coaching, and the use of student data to make informed decisions to positively impact student learning.

5.C. Project Updates - Dr. Satterfield updated the Board about the middle school window replacement project for which the starting date has been moved back to December due to a holdup with the aluminum frame production. He stated that the entire project will be paid from ESSER 2.0 funds. He stated that the elementary school roof repairs were still on schedule to begin in late fall. He concluded by updating the Board about the football stadium project stating that the oxidized aluminum planks on the visitor's side will be replaced either in October or after the football season is completed.


