SCHOOL DISTRICT HIGHLIGHTS: Middle School Ms. Chelsea Jones Mr. McCall introduced Ms. Chelsea Jones a fifth year teacher at the school who also serves as the Student Council sponsor and as an assistant volleyball coach at the school that is currently undefeated. Ms. Jones has been recognized as a highly-effective teacher over the past two years. Ms. Jones accredits her success to the overwhelming instructional coaching and feedback she has received from the Trousdale County school district administration which she did not receive from the district by which she was formerly employed. She stated that although she has struggled with classroom management in past years, she has learned that she can be assertive and that students will still like and respect you.

4. PRINCIPALS' REPORT:

- **4.A.** Trousdale County Elementary School Ms. Badru updated the Board about the construction progress taking place at the school, noting how the improvements have changed the culture of the school. She stated that there is a new feeling of safety and security at the school due to the new doors and thumb locks. Ms. Badru said that the staff are very grateful of the improvements and that they are trying to take good care of the painting and upgrades so they will last for many years to come. She informed the Board of upcoming events at the school that includes the annual Veteran's Day program on November 11 and the most recent Grandparents' Day at which the cafeteria fed 1,100 students and visitors. Ms. Badru stated that the school enrollment is increasing every day with parents stating that the number one reason of relocation is due to the quality of our school district. Ms. Badru concluded by discussing the success of the school's K-2 teachers that participated in the portfolio growth model noting that every teacher received the highest Level 5 score for 2018-19.
- 4.B. Jim Satterfield Middle School Mr. McCall highlighted the instructional leader

professional developments which principals and assistants are presently receiving through video analysis and feedback provided by Instruction Partners. He stated that parents have received their student's first mid-nine week grade reports noting that that our first parent-teacher conference would be in just three weeks. He stated that some of the teacher professional development time had been used for the development of nine-week benchmark assessments that begin at the end of the month. Mr. McCall added that the new Amplify Science curriculum is being well received by both students and teachers. Mr. McCall concluded by discussing the process and findings of the most recent school safety assessment which was very helpful in reflecting on school security practices each year.

4.C. Trousdale County High School – Ms. Dickerson stated that the most recent September 13 professional development was very productive where teachers participated in "Thinking Through the Lesson" exercise that required teachers to analyze a sample curriculum lesson plan and evaluate the corresponding assessment through a TNReady lens. Ms. Dickerson updated the Board about progress with Stage 1 (first year) or new teacher evaluation observations that includes a pre-observation conference, a complete classroom observation followed by a post-observation conference of each new teacher. Ms. Dickerson informed the Board about the school's college preparation efforts that included 17 student registrations with Cumberland University and with Tennessee Tech coming on September 29 to provide registration assistance with all the senior students. Ms. Dickerson stated that the 9th grade health screening went better than any in the previous years. She concluded her report describing her professional development experiences as well as the school's most recent safety assessment and the school's safety protocols.

- 5.B. Academic and Goal Updates Dr. Satterfield provided the Board with a Powerpoint presentation for the Board highlighting how every school was designated as a Reward School for 2019 and how the school district was named one of twenty school districts that received the highest Exemplary School District designation. Dr. Satterfield emphasized that the district's 98.4% graduation rate, 53.6% ready graduate rate, and chronic absenteeism rate of 9.0% for which each indicator received the highest accountability score rating. Dr. Satterfield noted that out of 146 school districts in Tennessee, Trousdale County Schools rated #12 in grades 3-8 ELA, #13 in grades 3-8 Math, #13 in English I, and #2 in Integrated Math I, II, and III.
- 5.C. Project Updates Dr. Satterfield informed the Board that he is pursing liquidated damages from FTM for not completing the installation of the elementary school doors and windows by July 20. Presently, he is working with Cope Architecture and FTM to complete the elementary school projects. He concluded that the elementary gym floor would be refinished during the fall break.



Instruction Partners Proposal Trousdale County Schools September 10, 2019

Overview:

At Instruction Partners, we know that challenging, supportive daily instruction is the key to increasing learning and preparing students for meaningful options beyond school. We partner with schools and districts to support instructional improvement and growth in academic learning.

Context:

Trousdale County School has requested information on continuing with the Science pilot for the 2019-20 school year.

Context on Goals:

For any partnership we enter, we set clear goals. Inspired by the work of Thomas Guskey, we set goals across different levels of district change. During the first years of a partnership, we focus on leading indicators of student learning that are ultimately about seeing changes happen in daily instruction. These indicators include satisfaction, instructional change and changes in quality of student work. We also measure changes in student growth, as measured both on interim assessments and summative state assessments. However, we do not set specific student growth goals, as we view these as lagging indicators of student learning that will begin to change after instructional improvement.

Context on Costs:

We are a non-profit organization, so our pricing reflects costs - driven by time. Pricing in any given proposal is based on the depth and frequency of the engagement, calculated using the number of schools, the number of subjects, the frequency of walkthroughs, and the number of additional on-site support days. With each of these factors, there is a combination of on-site days, virtual days, and prep time to ensure quality work.
