

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MOLDING MINDS

On Thursday, May 11th Jacob Huwer eagerly bagged the results of science club's latest experiment: soap!

Four weeks prior, Huwer guided the members of the Miller Place High School science club through the process of making soap. The soap that the science club made consisted of the reactants sodium hydroxide and glycerol trioleate. In this reaction, the hydroxide ion breaks the glycerol backbone off the glycerol trioleate and bonds with it to form glycerol. Then, the sodium ion bonds to each of the three oleate molecules to form sodium oleate. These two compounds formed the soap. After this reaction finished, the students added cacao powder and lavender oil to the sodium acetate, and poured the mixtures into flower molds. After the molds had four weeks to cure, Huwer carefully popped them out and bagged the soap for distribution.

While accompanied by Nailah Rahman, one of science club's public relations managers, Huwer handed out soap to Mrs. Annicelli, Dr. Skolnick, Mrs. Matura, and Ms. Contursi. After witnessing this incredible demonstration of teamwork from his students, Dr. Skolnick, science club's advisor, is contemplating the idea of doing a soap fundraiser for next year.

Florida Rejects History

Florida Governor Ron DeSantis is making big strides towards influencing what is taught in state schools by replacing current social studies textbooks. On Tuesday, May 9th, 2023, The Florida Department of Education approved 66 out of the 101 submissions for new textbooks. Due to "inaccurate material, errors and other information that was not aligned with Florida Law", only 19 books were initially approved, but after textbook publishers made some heavy alterations to their textbooks the remaining 47 textbooks passed the state's test. These "great" changes included the elimination of references to George Floyd's murder and the Black lives matter movement. Included among the rejected textbooks were books on Psychology, U.S. History, and the Holocaust.

DeSantis has received mixed feedback on the changes he's made. Manny Diaz Jr., a Florida Education Commissioner, thanks DeSantis for shifting the educational focus back to textbooks "free from inaccuracies or ideological rhetoric".

However, DeSantis received some backlash from Florida Representative Debbie Wasserman Shultz, who stated that DeSantis is "bent on dumbing down America's education system and silencing Black voices". Publishers that disagree with the state's ruling have been given the opportunity to appeal their rejections. Florida Public Schools can purchase any of the approved textbooks.

Big Apple Covered in Smoke

GUARDIANS OF THE GALAXY VOL 3:



The third and final film of James Gunn's Guardians of the Galaxy trilogy was an absolute highlight of this cinematic year: The Guardians find themselves having to travel across the galaxy yet again to save an injured Rocket Raccoon. By doing this, they not only have to face Rocket's megalomaniacal creator and his army of eugenic freaks and devoted underlings, but they also have to face the heavy trauma of their pasts.

I'd like to preface this by saying that I'm not an avid fan of comic book movies. I feel the medium has become oversaturated and has even started to run itself into the ground. The Guardians films, however, have always been highlights among the series of Marvel films. Gunn's signature style of well crafted and dynamic storytelling, well mixed blend of visceral action, and heartfelt and sarcastic humor make for great experiences all around.

This last movie in particular was not only what I feel is one of his best films, but a natural and fitting conclusion to the characters and the story.

I enjoyed the various alien locations and fun set pieces, which were mostly done practically. For a studio like Marvel, you'd think they'd just throw the actors on a greenscreen and act like they're in some crazy setting, but Guardians puts them "there", in all its intrinsic details.

A standout performance to me was Chukwudi Iwuji as the menacing High Evolutionary. His diabolical actions throughout the film make him absolutely and irredeemably unlikeable, yet it's his commanding presence that makes you relish every frame he's on screen for.

This film also contains some somber and gut wrenching moments towards its climax, regarding animal cruelty... so watch at your own risk.



SKINAMARINK

Skinamarink, one of the smaller movies that released earlier this year, and certainly one of the most terrifying, Skinamarink is an independent film directed by Kyle Edward Ball it follows a pretty rudimentary story of a pair of children waking up in the middle of the night to find their parents missing and the doors and windows have disappeared. It's been described as "If David Lynch directed Poltergeist" which means for the uninitiated: nightmare fuel.

This film was truly one of the most uncomfortable theater experiences for me of all time. It was playing one night only at Coram Movieland. The entire place was completely silent, and I was one of maybe four or five other people.

Now to be honest, this film is very divisive among moviegoers. Some like me consider it a terrifying art film, while others claim that nothing happens the whole time and that it's boring.

The film lingers on grainy, staticky shots of doorways, corners of rooms, and other places around the house. Although simple, it's effective in how it plays with your sense of reality.

The visual noise can cause you to believe that there's something lurking in the darkness, and leaves you questioning if it's just your imagination because objects move gradually over time.

Oppenheimer

(Directed by Christoher Nolan, July 21st 2023)

The real life story alone is intriguing enough, but seeing Oppenheimer brought to life through the soon to be Oscar nominated Cillian Murphy, most well known for his role as Thomas Shelby on the TV show Peaky Blinders



Nolan is well known for his immense sense of scale and use of the best visual effects money can buy, best utilized in his films Interstellar (2014) and Inception (2012), and by knowing his impressive track record, it is nothing short of exciting to see how he pulls off an Atomic explosion sequence on film.



Barbie

(Directed by Greta Gerwig, July 21st 2023)

This film has been highly anticipated since the moment of its announcement, especially with the announcement of Margot Robbie in the titular role of Barbie and Ryan Gosling as Ken. Barbie (2023) tells the story of Barbie and how she leaves Barbieland to go to the real world and to find a new meaning in life. Now what makes me personally interested in this film is that I believe it to be deeper than it looks on the surface level. Greta Gerwig, director of Lady Bird (2017) and Little Women (2019), is known for making contemplative character studies, so a film of this panache is wildly out of the ordinary looking at her previous work.

This leads me to the conclusion that Barbie (2023) may not just be bombastic and bubbly, but could be hiding a deeper narrative under the pink and pretty surface, one that could serve as a greater representation of the expectations for women in society. Barbie could be ostracized out of Barbieland for not conforming to the greater idea of what a Barbie (a woman) should be, and she sets off on her own (Ken tagging along) to find within herself an identity, not one assigned to her, in the end becoming what she feels she needs to be in the world.

At the end of the day however, I guarantee the film will be an extremely fun and enjoyable time all around. The question is, which one will you see in theaters on July 21st? Oppenheimer or Barbie?



Transfer Portal: Help or Hurt? Now



The world of college athletics set up the opportunity for athletes to leave a university if they desire to go somewhere else and they have been using it to their advantage. The effects of using the transfer portal has pros and cons, and has been a topic of many discussions.

Some would agree that if an athlete has found themselves in a poor situation whether being treated wrongly, home sick or even that their talents could be used somewhere else they should be given the right to take a new path immediately. Others would say by having very little restrictions (especially midseason abandonment) within the infamous transfer portal we are teaching student-athletes to flee when things get tough, not to build resilience and it is ok to not commit. The policies associated to college athletic transferring needs to be evaluated as the focus of most sports was founded on TEAM not individual. There are no guarantees that the next stop on a player's collegiate journey will be the right one and if a coach picks up a player from the transfer portal that they will be that missing piece for their team.

Ultimately, the transfer portal can be a good thing for some and is why it was set-up, but if misused like in many cases it can be detrimental.
