Year two

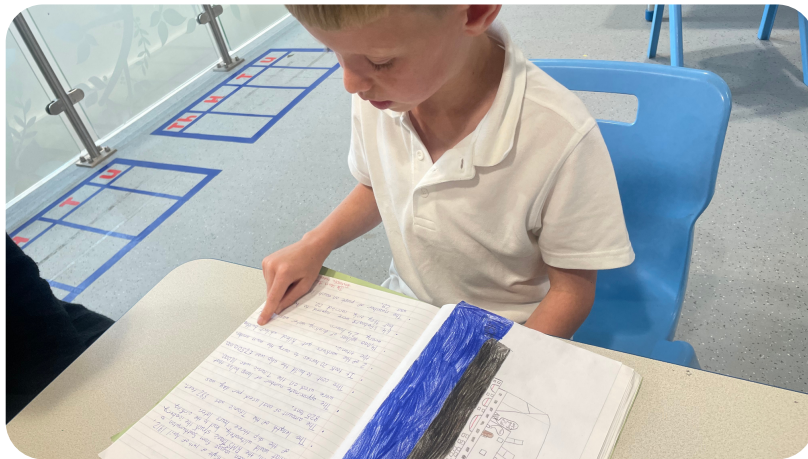


We found a mysterious box!
