Preparing & Empowering Multilingual Students Through the English Language Development Program

School District 197 values our vibrant and diverse student population, representing a rich tapestry of cultures and languages. With over 40 languages spoken, our commitment is to provide exceptional educational opportunities for students learning English as an additional language, known as English Learners (ELs) or multilingual learners (MLs), and equip them with skills and support to acquire English proficiency while meeting state academic standards. We prepare all students, including English Learners, to succeed in an interconnected, multicultural, and multilingual world.

Supporting English Learners

Led by Andrea Sáenz, English Learner Program Coordinator, the English Language Development (ELD) program helps students who speak home languages other than English gain the necessary skills and proficiency to succeed in the academic English of school.

"The EL program helps students to access the language of content classes—also known as mainstream classes, like algebra or social studies—and gives them the support to be successful in school," shares Andrea. "We aim to leverage a student's home language to create as much access to grade-level content standards as possible by explicitly teaching the language functions and features of those particular content areas." Andrea shares that the ultimate goal is for students to exit the program and continue their educational journey in mainstream content classes independently.

That educational journey and support can look different for each student based on several factors. "For newcomer students specifically, or those that are new to the country, there is often trauma involved in making the transition to a new school system in a new country with a new language," shares Andrea. "A student who arrives in a U.S. school with a strong academic background from a stable educational system has different needs than one whose family fled war or government instability and who may have interrupted schooling."

A Growing Program

Since 2021, the EL population in School District 197 has increased by nearly 25 percent, with the largest population of EL students attending Two Rivers High School. Teachers licensed in English as a Second Language work closely with classroom teachers to provide a well-rounded education for EL students, bridging classroom content with academic English language instruction.

Andrea highlights, "Students from other countries come here with many skills and abilities; they just may not know how to communicate those ideas in English. That's why our EL teachers are essential in providing a linguistic and cultural bridge until the students reach a level of English proficiency that allows them to access and succeed in the curriculum independently."

Successes and Highlights

School District 197 celebrates the achievements of our EL students, with a record number of seniors pursuing higher education and a record number of ELs or former ELs achieving Bilingual Seals certification. These accomplishments stand as a testament to the hard work of our students and the effectiveness of our EL program—which fosters a sense of connection, community, and welcoming environments that nurture academic and personal growth.

Our dedicated EL teachers (in close collaboration with content teachers, counselors, cultural liaisons, interpreters, and administrators) are vital in creating a warm and inclusive environment for new EL students. Recognizing the significance of fostering a sense of belonging, they invest considerable effort into building strong academic support and a culturally sustaining atmosphere.

Middle School Career Fair

Warrior Alum Profile

Mason Young

Mason Young, an alum of School District 197, has come full circle in his educational journey—returning as a teacher and wrestling coach in the district that helped shape him.

Meet Mason Young, the At-Promise Coordinator at Heritage E-STEM Magnet School and wrestling coach at Two Rivers High School.

During his time as a student in School District 197, Mason attended Somerset Elementary and Heritage E-STEM Magnet School before graduating from Henry Sibley (now Two Rivers). Reflecting on his high school experience, Mason remembers the invaluable guidance of the teachers—many of whom continue to impact students' lives positively today. He attributes his success to the connections he forged through sports, which instilled valuable life lessons and propelled him toward his current achievements.

Now as a staff member at Heritage, Mason serves as the At-Promise Coordinator—a role that allows him to work closely with students facing academic or behavioral challenges. As an advocate for these students, he provides guidance and support, empowering them to overcome obstacles and thrive in their education.

Many teachers still working in the district today helped me through high school. I truly believe all the connections I've made through sports and the lessons they taught is why I was successful."

What makes our district great is the people who work in it. Heritage is a great example of that. My coworkers always consider the student's best interests above all else."

One of Mason's ideas that have found success at Heritage is Power Hour—a before-school program at Heritage that offers students a safe space to release stress and energy while engaging in sports and weight room basics. Since its start in the 2022-2023 school year, Power Hour has experienced growth and popularity among students. Starting with just five participants in the first two weeks, the program quickly gained traction and attracted more students. By December, Power Hour had reached its maximum capacity with 32 participants.

The impact of Power Hour on students has been significant, Mason shares. "While some students utilize the program to get a workout in, for many, it serves as a valuable social outlet and motivation to arrive at school on time. Power Hour allows students to connect with their peers. It fosters a sense of belonging, contributing to a positive school culture."

As Power Hour continues to evolve and impact students' lives, it serves as a testament to Mason's dedication and commitment to students and the school community. Through Mason's work, students are empowered to embrace physical activity, explore their passions, and build a foundation for a healthy and successful future.







Energy Efficient and Healthy Schools Award

On June 28, School District 197 was recognized as a 2023 Energy Efficient and Healthy Schools award winner by the Department of Energy, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the Department of Education. The award recognizes schools and districts for planning efforts and for outstanding implementation of solutions to improve energy efficiency, reduce carbon emissions, and support healthy learning environments.

Here are a few examples of our district sustainability platform in action:

- Implemented energy-efficient solutions as part of recent bond projects, achieving top 5% energy efficiency amongst schools nationwide—from installing high-efficiency condensing boilers and automated HVAC systems to completely offsetting our electric use through on-site and community solar generation.
- Installed solar panels on five school buildings and one solar thermal on top of the Aquatic Center that generates the primary heat source for the pool.
- Partnered with Great River Greening to plant more native grasses and wildflowers across the district. This year, more than 5,000 native plant plugs were planted at Two Rivers and Garlough with their help.
- Runs LiveGreen, the district's sustainability program that promotes energy saving, recycling, and
 other green initiatives. Each school in the district has a LiveGreen team that consists of students
 and a teacher. These teams help support low-cost or no-cost energy efficiency strategies to
 reduce energy, promote recycling and composting, and focus on conserving resources.

In this issue, we're highlighting our general fund expenses. Basically, how we spend money.


From instructional materials and technology advancements to faculty salaries and facility maintenance, how a school district spends money directly impacts the quality of education and overall student experiences. Here's a look at our general fund expenses by program type:
