LETTER FROM SUPERINTENDENT



Where did the school year go? I think we all ask that every year at this time. It seems like we were just preparing for the start of the year and now we are already in the last 30 days of the school year. As I write this newsletter it almost feels like summer with 80-degree temperatures. Hopefully, by the time you are reading this newsletter, the temperatures are about the same and Mother Nature has not turned us back to colder temps.

Spring brings with it a lot of activity and excitement. We see spring concerts, field trips, spring athletic events, Prom, High School Graduation, planning for summer school, many other activities, and of course, kids getting excited about summer break. While there are many students in our district doing great things all the time, I wanted to take a moment to recognize a few groups who, throughout the

late winter and into the spring, were able to show off their talents as qualified for the state music competitions, state FBLA competitions, and the World Robotics competition. This just goes to show that hard work and dedication pay off for these students. Congratulations!

As we head through the spring and head into summer, we are working very hard at looking at what our future looks like. As you all know, we went to a referendum in the spring to exceed the revenue cap which would have authorized the District to levy additional taxes for operations. Even though a successful referendum would have seen property taxes go down, the referendum was not successful. With the referendum not being successful, we are now looking for myriad ways to reduce our expenditures. We will have to look at everything: transportation costs, building maintenance delays, academic programs, extracurricular programs, staffing, and equipment purchases, to name a few. We may have to look at reducing bus routes which could mean longer times for students being on buses. We may have to look at fees for things like field trips and participation in extracurricular activities. We may have to eliminate some extracurricular expenditures by reducing athletic equipment and uniform budgets and even looking at reducing contests. We may have to look at not rehiring staff positions when we have retirements or resignations, which then leads to larger class sizes and greater workloads. While we never want to see opportunities impacted, the reality is, with the failure of the referendum and without a significant increase in state aid in the form of spendable dollars, we will see impacts on programs and opportunities. As we await what our state government is going to do, we will continue to build on the aforementioned list of possible cuts that could come to fruition if we do not see additional dollars. We will be looking at as many efficiencies as possible, but the reality is, there is not a lot more left to cut that will not begin impacting the academic and extracurricular opportunities for our students.

The Arcadia Education Foundation is an independent board, affiliate of the School District of Arcadia, non-profit 501(c) 3 organization that was established in 1988. The State Bank of Arcadia generously donated \$1,000 to start the foundation and it continues to be built entirely by community and business supporters of education in Arcadia. STUDENT IMMUNIZATION LAW—AGE/GRADE REQUIREMENTS

The following are the minimum required immunizations for each age/grade level. It is not a recommended immunization schedule for infants and preschoolers. For that schedule, contact your doctor or local health department.

- Children 5 years of age or older who are enrolled in a Pre-K class should be assessed using the immunization requirements for Kindergarten through Grade 5, which would normally correspond to the individual's age.
- D = diphtheria, T = tetanus, P = pertussis vaccine. DTaP/DTP/DT/Td vaccine for all students Pre-K through 12: Four doses are required. However, if a student received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. **Note:** A dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.
- DTaP/DTP/DT vaccine for children entering Kindergarten: Each student must have received one dose after the 4th birthday (either the 3rd, 4th, or 5th dose) to be compliant. **Note:** a dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.
- Tdap is an adolescent tetanus, diphtheria, and acellular pertussis combination vaccine. If a student received a dose of a tetanus-containing vaccine, such as Td, within five years before entering the grade in which Tdap is required, the student is compliant and a dose of Tdap vaccine is not required.
- Polio vaccine for students entering grades Kindergarten through 12: Four doses are required. However, if a student received the 3rd dose after the 4th birthday, further doses are not required. **Note:** a dose four days or less before the 4th birthday is also acceptable.
- Laboratory evidence of immunity to hepatitis B is also acceptable.
- MMR is measles, mumps, and rubella vaccine. The first dose of MMR vaccine must have been received on or after the 1st birthday. Laboratory evidence of immunity to all three diseases (measles and mumps and rubella) is also acceptable. **Note:** A dose four days or less before the 1st birthday is also acceptable.
- Varicella vaccine is chickenpox vaccine. A history of chickenpox disease or laboratory evidence of immunity to varicella is also acceptable.

CIVIC ENGAGEMENT AND LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE



On April 4th, nearly 40 Arcadia High School students attended the Civic Engagement and Leadership Conference at Winona State University. The students were nominated by their teachers as leaders or potential leaders in their school and community. At the conference, the students attended breakout sessions hosted by Winona State students. Session topics included resume building, adapting to college, developing your identity, self-care, advocacy, social justice and creative writing, among others. Arcadia students participated in engaging conversation about youth leadership and education with students and staff from other

local high schools and Winona State students. Participants also learned about civic engagement, pluralism and multilingualism during the conference. The conference was planned by Dr. Amy Hornby Uribe and Dr. Linda D'Amico and students of the Global Studies and World Languages & Ethnic Studies departments of Winona State University. In addition to being fun, the conference was a wonderful learning and networking opportunity for Arcadia's students, and we are looking forward to next year's conference.

RED CARPET READING INCENTIVE PROGRAM

The Red Carpet Reading program is something new that the elementary school introduced to encourage kids to read more. The program ran from March 16th to April 13th. Each night they asked the students to read or be read to a minimum of 15 minutes and record the title, minutes read, and have an adult's signature on a provided sheet. Every student that returned a completed reading log received a donated prize coupon to Kwik Trip, Oasis Bowling Alley, MM San Juan LLC, Howard's Hardware Hank, Newcomb Valley, or Pizza HUT. In addition, students also had a chance to win free books and bookmarks. The reading slips were entered into a drawing to win the **GRAND PRIZE**: a limo ride to McDonald's to have lunch. The more the students read, the more tickets they got for a chance to win the **GRAND PRIZE**.

We also displayed the number of minutes each grade level read. The grade level that recorded the most reading minutes received an extra celebration.

We know this is a busy time of year, and we wanted to help parents not to neglect those few minutes of reading with their child each night. We are thrilled with the growth and enthusiasm we are seeing among our students at



school, and we know that is a direct result of the time spent with them at home. We have come across several resources that reinforce the importance of reading regularly at home and the impact this has on a child's academic development. We want to remind everyone the positive effect that just 15-20 minutes of reading each night can have on a child's future. In a resource from www.specialed resource.com it says

this about reading:

- It doesn't matter the genre reading 20 minutes a day impacts your life,
- If you read to your child 20 minutes a day starting in kindergarten, they will have heard 1.8 millions per year,
- By 6th Grade, your child will read for 851 hours,
- In 1987 a study was conducted by Nagy and Herman. The results were astonishing, For the time commitment of just 20 minutes per day spent reading, students scored in the 90th percentile on standardized test. However, there are tons more benefits of reading, and they go far beyond just test scores.

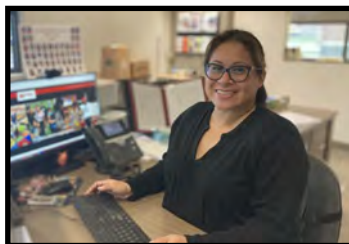

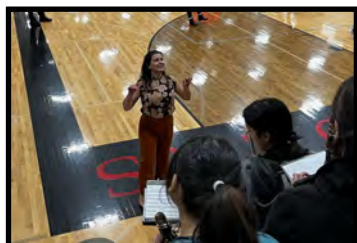

VALLE DUAL LANGUAGE PROGRAM



The Valle Dual Language program is preparing for our second cohort of students! In January, we conducted parent informational meetings and opened the application process. The response exceeded our expectations this year as we had more applicants than seats available in our program. Therefore we conducted a lottery to form the class and a waitlist. Families are confirming their decision by filling out and returning a dual language contract that acknowledges understanding of and agreement to the Valle Dual Language program's mission and goals to support the learning process. Language learning takes time and families have to understand that it is at least a 5

year commitment.

The Valle students are part of a dual language immersion program designed to foster bilingualism, biliteracy and multiculturally competent leaders. Research compiled nationwide suggests that dual language programs have a positive impact on students' reading achievement in English and Spanish. Bilingualism has benefits for cognitive development and is important for maintaining cultural identity and creating cross-cultural awareness.

Our Valle Dual Language program begins with Kindergartners spending about 80% to 90% of their school day learning in Spanish. The level of instruction in the non-English language tapers down every grade level. Next year our first cohort of students will move to 1st grade and the percentage will be around 70% of instruction in Spanish and 30% in English. Students begin learning Spanish phonetics in kindergarten. They're learning how to read and write in Spanish before English, but many principles of the two languages are transferable. Early Spanish literacy instruction is different from English and it focuses more on syllables.

In the first few years, it's not unusual for native English speakers in the dual language immersion classroom to have receptive language — students understand the Spanish their teacher is speaking, but they're not quite ready to express themselves in the language. In a few years, however, the students will be switching back and forth between Spanish and English with ease. To learn more about the program please visit www.arcadia.k12.wi.us/valle.

Schedule appointments with your primary healthcare provider as soon as possible. Appointments fill up quickly during the summer. For uninsured students, St Clare Health Mission in La Crosse offers free sports physicals on Tuesdays and Thursdays evenings 5-7pm. Walk-ins only. Breidenbach Wellness Center in La Crosse offers sports physicals for \$30. Call 608-781-9880 to schedule an appointment.

The first year of the Powerlifting team has shown great success! Powerlifting consists of three attempts of the Squat, the Bench Press and the Deadlift in tests of maximal strength. On the platform, it is you and the loaded bar with only the cheering from the crowd, your team and your coach. Powerlifting is about conquering not only the weight that is on the bar, but the voice in your head that you may not be able to do it. 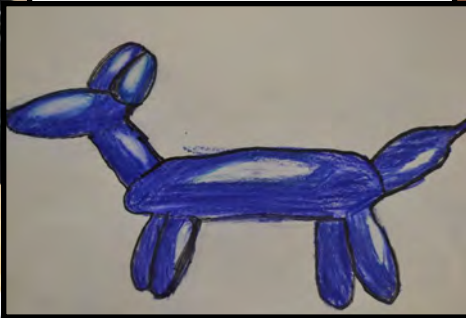


5TH GRADE CREATE BALLOON DOG SCULPTURES

Fifth grade students are learning about Jeff Koons, a famous American Sculptor known for his large Pop Art sculptures, often featuring a balloon dog. The balloon dog sculptures are bold, brightly colored, and made from stainless steel with a shiny metallic finish. First, students practiced drawing and shading a balloon dog using a variety of light and dark values. They paid special attention to the observed light reflection that appears on the original balloon dog sculpture.

After practicing drawing and shading form, students were given the opportunity to work and create three-dimensional sculptures using Crayola Model Magic. To start their project they warmed the clay up in their hands to make it workable.

Then they created the necessary body parts. Mrs. Schlosstein, Middle School Art Teacher, guided the students through a step-by-step tutorial on how to create the balloon dog's body parts. The students used plastic straws for an armature to strengthen and support the sculpture. To complete the sculpture students modeled and formed the clay to the correct proportions for their final masterpieces.

Boletín de Mayo Desde el Escritorio del Superintendente Lance Bagstad



¿Dónde se ha ido el año escolar? Creo que todos nos hacemos esta pregunta todos los años por estas fechas. Parece que nos estábamos preparando para el comienzo del curso y ahora ya estamos en los últimos 30 días del año escolar. Mientras escribo este boletín se siente como si fuera verano con temperaturas de 80 grados. Esperemos que para cuando lean este boletín, las temperaturas sean más o menos las mismas y la Madre Naturaleza no nos haya devuelto a temperaturas más frías.

La primavera trae consigo mucha actividad y emoción. Vemos conciertos de primavera, excursiones, eventos deportivos de primavera, baile de graduación, graduación de la escuela preparatoria, la planificación de la escuela de verano, muchas otras actividades, y por supuesto, los niños se emocionan por las vacaciones de verano. Mientras que hay muchos estudiantes en nuestro distrito haciendo grandes cosas todo el tiempo, quería tomar un momento para reconocer a algunos grupos que, a través del final del invierno y en la primavera, pudieron

mostrar sus talentos como calificados para las competencias de música del estado, competencias FBLA del estado, y la competencia de Robótica Mundial. Esto demuestra que el trabajo duro y la dedicación dan sus frutos para estos estudiantes. ¡Felicitaciones a todos!

A medida que avanzamos en la primavera y nos acercamos al verano, estamos trabajando muy duro para ver qué nos depara el futuro. Como todos saben, en la primavera presentamos una propuesta de referéndum para superar el límite de ingresos, lo que habría autorizado al Distrito a recaudar impuestos adicionales para sus operaciones. Aunque si el referéndum hubiera tenido éxito los impuestos sobre la propiedad habrían bajado, el referéndum no tuvo éxito. Como el referéndum no tuvo éxito, ahora estamos buscando innumerables maneras de reducir nuestros gastos. Tendremos que mirar todo: gastos de transporte, demoras en el mantenimiento de los edificios, programas académicos, programas extracurriculares, personal y compra de equipos, por nombrar algunos. Es posible que tengamos que reducir las rutas de los autobuses, lo que podría significar que los alumnos pasaran más tiempo en el autobús. Es posible que tengamos que estudiar la posibilidad de cobrar por cosas como las excursiones y la participación en actividades extraescolares. Es posible que tengamos que eliminar algunos gastos extraescolares reduciendo los presupuestos de equipamiento deportivo y uniformes e incluso considerar la posibilidad de reducir las competencias. Es posible que tengamos que considerar la posibilidad de no contratar nuevo personal cuando haya jubilaciones o renuncias, lo que conduce a un mayor número de alumnos por clase y a una mayor carga de trabajo. Aunque no queremos que las oportunidades se vean afectadas, la realidad es que, con el fracaso del referéndum y sin un aumento significativo de la ayuda estatal en forma de dólares gastables, veremos impactos en los programas y oportunidades. A la espera de lo que nuestro gobierno estatal va a hacer, vamos a seguir construyendo sobre la mencionada lista de posibles recortes que podrían llegar a buen término si no vemos dólares adicionales. Estaremos buscando la mayor cantidad de eficiencias posibles, pero la realidad es que no hay mucho más que recortar que no comience a afectar las oportunidades académicas y extracurriculares para nuestros estudiantes.

Quiero terminar felicitando a la Clase de 2023. La Clase de 2023 ciertamente ha experimentado muchas cosas en sus cuatro años de escuela preparatoria. Su primer año comenzó como cualquier otro año para los estudiantes de primer año. Venían a la escuela preparatoria por primera vez, experimentando todo lo nuevo acerca de la escuela preparatoria. Algunos estaban conociendo nuevos amigos mientras nuestros estudiantes de la escuela pública y privada se unían para convertirse en la Clase de 2023. El año escolar 2019-2020 avanzó como la mayoría y luego llegó marzo y la Clase de 2023 estaba a punto de comenzar a experimentar la escuela preparatoria como ningún otro grupo había experimentado la escuela preparatoria. Las escuelas cerraron a mediados de marzo de esa primavera y nunca volvieron a abrir para la instrucción en persona durante el resto de ese año escolar. Cuando llegó el otoño, la Clase de 2023 volvió a la escuela, pero con un aspecto muy diferente. Todos llevábamos máscaras, nos distanciábamos socialmente, algunos estudiantes aprendían en persona y otros elegían estar en línea, e intentábamos averiguar qué eventos debían celebrarse y cuáles no. Como se acerca el final de la carrera escolar K-12 de la Clase de 2023, no debe verse como un final, sino como un nuevo comienzo. Independientemente de cuáles sean sus planes después de la escuela preparatoria, cada uno de ustedes saldrá y tendrá muchas oportunidades de hacer grandes contribuciones a la sociedad. - D= difteria, T= tétano, P= vacuna contra la tosferina (pertussis). Vacuna DTaP/DTP/DT/Td para todos los alumnos de Pre-K a grado 12: Se requieren 4 dosis. Pero, si un alumno recibió la 3a dosis después de cumplir 4 años, no hacen falta más dosis. Nota: También es aceptable una dosis 4 días o menos antes de cumplir 4 años.
- Vacuna DTaP/DTP/DT para los niños que ingresan a Kindergarten: Su hijo(a) debe haber recibido una dosis después de cumplir 4 años (ya sea la 3a., 4ta. o 5ta. dosis) para ser aceptado. Nota: También es aceptable una dosis 4 días o menos antes de cumplir 4 años.
- Tdap es la vacuna antitetánica, antidiftérica y antitosferínica acelular para los adolescentes. Si su hijo(a) ha recibido una dosis de una vacuna antitetánica como la vacuna Td en los últimos 5 años antes de ingresar al grado en que la vacuna Tdap es obligatoria, no es necesaria la vacuna Tdap.
- La vacuna antipoliomelítica para estudiantes que ingresan a los grados Kindergarten a 12: Se requieren 4 dosis. Pero, si un alumno recibió la 3a dosis después de cumplir 4 años, no hacen falta más dosis. Nota: También es aceptable una dosis 4 días o menos antes de cumplir 4 años.
- Las pruebas de laboratorio de la inmunidad a la hepatitis B también son aceptables.
- MMR es la vacuna contra el sarampión, las paperas y la rubeola. La primera dosis de la vacuna MMR debe recibirse al cumplir un año o después de un año de edad. Nota: También es aceptable una dosis 4 días o menos antes de cumplir 1 año. Las pruebas de laboratorio de la inmunidad contra todas estas enfermedades (sarampión, paperas y rubeola) también son aceptables.
- La vacuna contra la varicela es la vacuna contra el chickenpox. Los antecedentes de enfermedades de varicela o las pruebas de laboratorio de inmunidad a la varicela también son aceptables.
