
Additionally, Ryan volunteered at blood drive events throughout his high school career. His donations earned him the Red Cross Award.



HHS staff and students were invited to the Culinary Arts classroom to be customers where they were given fake funds to buy from food trucks. The food truck earning the most money won the competition.


