Welcome back to the 2023-2024 school year! For those of you that do not know me, I am the head nurse for the Tell City-Troy Township School Corporation and the full-time elementary school nurse here at WTE. I have been a nurse for 18 years, and I have been with Tell City School Corporation since April 2017. I have experience in all different areas of nursing. I have two boys who also attend Tell City. Nolan Gebhard is 16 and will be starting his Junior year at Tell City Jr. Sr. High School, and Nathan Gebhard is 13, and will be starting his 8th grade year at Tell City Jr. Sr. High School. I know the past couple of years have been uneventful due to COVID-19, but with the help of all of you, I feel like it couldn't have gone better. I think we will have another great school year, and I am eager, and excited to get started, and to be able to work with all of you and your children.

Nurse Notes

A few reminders as we start this school year:

- All students are required to have an updated immunization record on file and documented in order to start and remain in school.
- Make a point to talk with the school, the teachers and nurse about any medical condition/health concern you may have including your child.
- Reminder to bring new and updated medical orders from your child's physician for any treatment and prescription medications that are to be done here at school. All medications must be brought in their original containers and a medication form must be completed by a parent or guardian.
- Allergy and asthma medications, rescue inhalers, and Epi-Pens are a necessity, and may save a life! These medications also require an updated order every year. There are samples of different asthma health care plans in the nursing office and on our website. Please feel free to print one off of our website, stop by and pick one up in the front office, or let me know and I can send one home with your child. These action plans have to be completed by your child's physician and returned to school before the start of the school year.
- If your child has a health condition or needs special care while at school, for example, medications, treatments, or monitoring, please inform the school nurse or office. Individual health care plans help keep your child safe, protected and healthy. It is also important to talk to your child's teacher regarding any health care conditions.
- PLEASE have a current and working phone number of a parent or guardian in the school office daily in the event your child needs your attention and we need to get a hold of you.
- Keep in mind that students needing school physicals will also need to be getting those completed and turned in. You can access a physical form on the TCJSHS website and under forms is where you will find the physical forms. These forms are also on William Tell's website under the 'Nurse Notes' tab.
- Please remember that breakfast is the most important meal of the day and a great way to get your child's school day started.
- If your child needs any type of mouth care during school hours please have them bring a note from their physician. All students brushing their teeth at school will need to do this in their classrooms.
- All students will now be bringing a nurse pass with them before coming to the nurse (other than emergencies, daily medications, and chronic health care needs). This will help cut down on the traffic in the nurse's office throughout the day.
- Help your child create a daily schedule: Waking up, eating breakfast, arriving at school on time, doing homework, enjoying free time, having dinner with the family, bathing, brushing their teeth, and packing up for the next day; and post a daily chore list on the fridge as a reminder. *Encourage them to be active, eat healthy, drink water & to be kind.*
- All nebulizers & in-halers will require a chamber in order to use this at school. Speak with your child's pediatrician to obtain the proper equipment & to update their Asthma Action Plan.

MINIMUM IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR SCHOOL ENTRY 2022-2023

6th Grade

- 1 Tdap (Tetanus & Pertussis)
- 1 MCV4 (Meningococcal)

12th Grade

- * 2nd MCV4 (Meningococcal)

State law requires that all children enrolled in a school corporation be immunized (and updated as needed) against certain diseases:

- 3 doses of Hepatitis B – 3rd dose must be given on or after 24 weeks of age and no earlier than 16 weeks after the 1st dose.
- 5 doses of Dtap (tetanus/pertussis/diphtheria) - 4 doses are acceptable if the 4th dose is on or after the 4th birthday and at least 6 months after the 3rd dose.
- 4 doses of Polio (IPV or OPV)
- 2 doses of MMR (Measles/Mumps/Rubella)
- 2 doses of Varicella (Chickenpox)
- 1 dose of Tdap (Tetanus and Pertussis)- Before entering the 6th grade.
- 1 dose of MCV4 (Meningococcal) - 2 doses for all Seniors.
- 2 doses of Hepatitis A- Given at least 6 months apart. Requirement for students **K-12**
- **Recommended immunizations:** Annual Influenza (all ages), 2/3 HPV (Human Papillomavirus) (Grades 6th-12th), and 2 MenB (Meningococcal), (Grade 12), Coronavirus (SARS-CoV-2)(COVID-19), age 12 and older.

To obtain a copy of your child's immunization record, or to see if they are currently up to date with all of their immunizations, please contact your child's physician, Perry County Memorial Hospitals Immunization Department at 1-812-547-0128, or Perry County Health Department (PCHD) at 1-812-547-2746. Your child will need to have a copy of their updated immunizations on file before the start of the school year.

Please notify your School Nurse when immunizations are complete.
