Over the summer, our school received new blacktops and playgrounds. In 2021, the school began a three phase construction project that will bring new playgrounds, new blacktops, a new admin building, 3 new kindergarten classrooms and 7 1-6th grade classrooms. In addition, all existing spaces will be renovated and brought up to date. The project also includes new landscaping, new drop off circle, and visitor parking.

2021-22 School Safety Plan

At the time of the latest review of the School Site Safety Plan, all revisions were communicated to both the classified and certificated staff. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for ensuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire, disaster, earthquake and lockdown drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year. Our plan includes guidance from small injuries to power outages to major disasters. It also plans for search and rescue, student supervision, first aid, and student release. In addition, we also have protocol for lockdowns and school intruders.

Safety is a high priority because it is necessary to ensure a successful and healthy educational environment. Students are supervised throughout the day by teachers, administrators, and other campus supervisors. There are designated areas for student drop-off and pick up. Visitors need to check in at the front office and receive a badge.

Fire, disaster, and lockdown drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year so that all staff and students are familiar with what steps to take in an event of an emergency. The school is using an online application called Share911 to communicate with staff during emergencies. This online safety app is also used to coordinate safety/disaster drills.

Our school has an active School Safety Committee that includes administrators, teachers, maintenance, school supervisors, and other staff members. The committee works together in forming and revising the school safety plan as well as responding to day-to-day safety issues. At the time of the latest review of the School Site Safety Plan, all revisions were communicated to both the classified and certificated staff. During the 2021-22 school year, this has included all of the necessary safety, health and sanitizing protocols to ensure that staff and visitors to campus remain as safe as possible during the COVID-19 Shelter in Place status of our school.

In May 2021 HUSD opened for in person learning opportunities at all sites. HUSD developed district wide safety plans with schools also having plans specific to their site. The "Ready to Return" In-Person Learning Safety Plan was created in April 2021 that addressed questions/guidelines regarding face masks, daily health screenings using the Frontline Health Portal, social distancing, and cleaning procedures. Notifications of the plans were sent out to all staff and families. It was posted on the district/school websites for the entire HUSD community to access.

Professional Development

The major areas for staff development this year are rooted in equity and anti-bias/anti-racism work. Specifically, we are looking at how to recognize and check our bias and racism as predominately White educators and how white supremacist systems oppress and impact our students. We will use this lens of equity to guide our work of sparking students curiosity for learning, connecting learning to their experiences, and fostering a deep love for learning. We will do this through the use of culturally responsive practices, anti-racism, and inquiries into instruction and learning guided by Jamila Dugan and our equity pilot work. These areas of focus were selected by our ILT and SBDM teams in consult with the school district. The decision was informed by student achievement data over the past 10 years and historical trends in education. In addition, Lorin Eden has committed itself to be an equity pilot school, which means that all of our PD is centered around becoming anti-racist educators.

Professional development is delivered through 90 minute workshops on minimum days, ongoing conversations at staff meetings, and on teacher PD days/staff meetings. We are still working on a plan to support teachers during implementation, and the biggest support is through grade-level collaboration.
