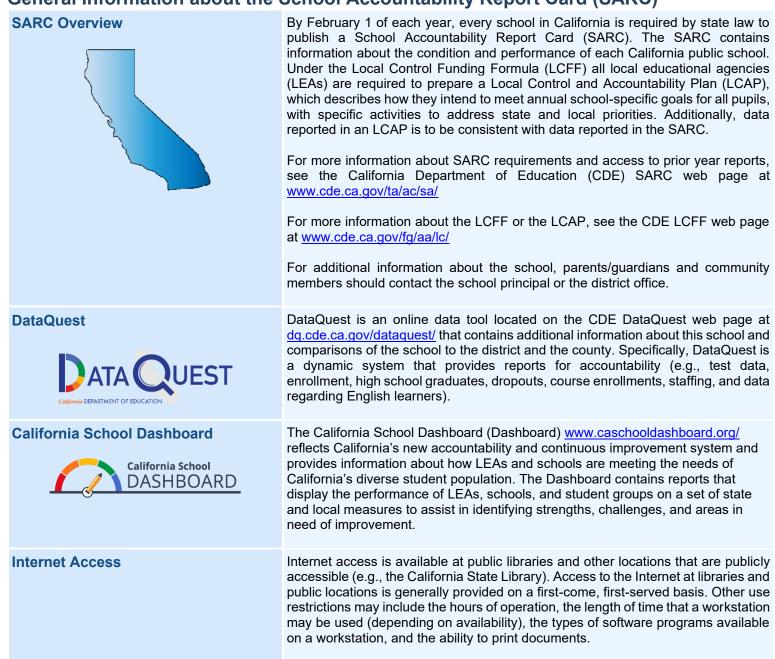

#### 2021-22 School Safety Plan

Park School's Safety Plan is updated annually. All updates and revisions are communicated to our staff. The school's disaster preparedness plan includes steps for insuring student and staff safety during a disaster. Fire, disaster, and lockdown drills are conducted on a monthly basis throughout the school year. Students are supervised throughout the day by teachers, administrators, and yard duty supervisors. There is a designated area for student drop off and pick up. All visitors must check in the front office. All parent volunteers are finger printed, have been TB tested and received their COVID vaccine to make sure they can safely be in our campus.

Safety is a high priority because it is necessary to ensure a successful and healthy educational environment.

Fire, disaster, and lockdown drills are conducted on a regular basis throughout the school year so that all staff and students are familiar with what steps to take in an event of an emergency. The school is using an online application called Share911 to communicate with staff during emergencies. This online safety app is also used to coordinate safety/disaster drills.

Our school has an active School Safety Committee that includes administrators, teachers, maintenance, school supervisors, and other staff members. The committee works together in forming and revising the school safety plan as well as responding to day-to-day safety issues. At the time of the latest review of the School Site Safety Plan, all revisions were communicated to both the classified and certificated staff. During the 2021-22 school year, this has included all of the necessary safety, health and sanitizing protocols to ensure that staff and visitors to campus remain as safe as possible during the COVID-19 school reopening.

In May 2021 HUSD opened for in person learning opportunities at all sites. HUSD developed district wide safety plans with schools also having plans specific to their site. The "Ready to Return" In-Person Learning Safety Plan was created in April 2021 that addressed questions/guidelines regarding face masks, daily health screenings using the Frontline Health Portal, social distancing, and cleaning procedures. Notifications of the plans were sent out to all staff and families. It was posted on the district/school websites for the entire HUSD community to access.

#### 2020-21 Types of Services Funded

Park Elementary implements multiple programs designed to support the academic success of all students with particular focus on those performing below grade level. Some of the programs we implement at Park are: Leveled Literacy Intervention for students in 1st-3rd grade, ALIVE program for reading intervention and self determination for students in 4th-6th grade, after school acceleration in language arts and math and online programs to support academics (Accelerated Reader, Raz-Kids and IXL). We also have a full-time Library Media Tech to ensure that every student has weekly access to check out books. We have an English Learner Specialist who monitors programs targeted to our English learners. We also fund extra hourly pay for teachers who collaborate to engage in cycle of inquiry and action planning as a grade level.

#### **Professional Development**

Park School supports and promotes adult learning. Our areas of focus are Culturally Responsive Teaching and Deeper Learning Practices. Culturally Responsive Teaching was selected based on our site discipline data reports and the connection to HUSD's Strategic Plan. Our focus on the Deeper Learning Network was selected to support classroom instruction as mentioned in The Strategic Plan. As part of the growth process, opportunities for training and staff development are provided at both the district and individual school sites to administrators, teachers, and classified staff. During the school year we had five full days of professional development and a well as site specific minimum day PDs. Teachers are supported through ongoing collaboration opportunities, instructional coaching, and after school facilitated learning sessions.

During the 2020-21 school year, teachers were provided additional professional development opportunities targeted towards teaching through distance learning during the pandemic. Teachers were trained on multiple programs and platforms to increase student engagement with distance learning and ensure that deeper learning strategies were being implemented. The district also provided anti-bias, anti-racist professional development to all staff during the school year. The focus was on understanding and identifying our individual biases to interrupt patterns of systemic racism that exist in education.
