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Course Description

Reading

The students will be immersed in rich literature and informational readings while being introduced to a variety of genres through the reading of novels and selections from the course textbook. Through this literature, students will learn strategies to improve reading comprehension, become critical thinkers, and develop advanced vocabulary. The Accelerated Reader program will be used as a way to promote reading for personal pleasure. This program will include incentives and will be graded.

Spelling/Vocabulary Workshop

Vocabulary Workshop, published by Sadlier-Oxford, will be used to develop spelling and vocabulary skills. This program focuses on word meaning and usage. It is designed to provide students with the vocabulary skills needed to achieve higher-level reading proficiency. Each spelling lesson will focus on a single spelling pattern or concept. The lessons will provide students with practice exercises designed to improve their spelling and writing abilities while expanding their vocabulary knowledge.
