TKA: A Leader in Christian Education

TKALEADS As we reflect on the 2022-2023 school year, we witness the blessings of God upon the diligent efforts of our faculty, staff, and students.

Record enrollment was fostered with the addition of the state-of-the-art Frank DiMino Student Union and Esther B. O'Keeffe Innovation Center and the introduction of The King's Online Academy. TKA continues to thrive, nurturing the hearts and minds of our students, building character, and putting Christ first.

TKAACHIEVES We had remarkable success with outstanding achievements that garnered recognition at local, state, and national levels. Academically, we had a record-breaking five students named National Merit Finalists, nine students scored 12 perfect subsections on the SAT and ACT, junior Justin Wright achieved a perfect score on the PreACT, members of the Class of 2023 were accepted by Ivy League, Christian, and top tier universities nationwide and accepted an impressive \$8.1 million in scholarships. International senior Ziyan (Christy) Zheng won a Pathfinder Award and TKA elementary standardized testing results once again provided eligibility for a National Blue Ribbon Award. **TKAPRAYS** Spiritual life remained King's focus as 53 students made decisions to follow Jesus and hundreds grew deeper in their faith. Service was an offshoot of this faith as students dedicated themselves to various charitable endeavors. They participated in building eight homes for Guatemalan families in need through Hope Project International, honored veterans by placing flags on their graves, sent hundreds of gift boxes with Operation Christmas Child, and raised tens of thousands of dollars for numerous charities such as the American Heart Association. The Class of 2023 alone contributed nearly 25,000 hours of community service in Palm Beach County, equivalent to more than a quarter million dollars in value to local charities and citizens.

TKAWINS In sports, King's football and boys basketball teams won their first district titles in years, embodying a hard-working and resilient TKA Lions' mentality. Junior swimmer Aly Bozzuto and the Lady

Lions won two individual state golds enroute to an FHSAA state runner-up finish. Overall, TKA's varsity teams won 81 percent of all contests and achieved a school record 16 championships, including district, regional, county, and state victories. A record thirty-one seniors signed letters of intent to play at the collegiate level and Lady Lions basketball guard Janessa Williams was named Florida 3A Player of the Year after leading her team to a second straight Final Four berth.

TKAPERFORMS In The Smith Family Conservatory, the TKA Symphony Orchestra debuted to a standing ovation for Night at the Movies. Instrumental excellence continued with A Night of Jazz with worldrenown trombonist Wycliffe Gordon. King's Digital Media Arts celebrated Telly, Viddy, Communicator, and AVA Digital awards for its feature length productions and unveiled the popular fan series, Star Wars: Gray Trials. Notably, two devoted fans traveled all the way from Melbourne, Australia to appear as extras in Studio 70's The Wreck of Echo 10-4! Additionally, TKA Theatre Co.'s productions of The Little Mermaid, Ruth the Musical, The Music Man, and Annie Jr. received acclaim from the local and global theater communities and created an ongoing relationship with the premier Christian theater company, Sight & Sound.

What an outstanding year it has been! We acknowledge that none of these accomplishments would have been possible without God's blessings and we express our heartfelt gratitude to you, the TKA community, for your prayers, support, and exceptional work ethic. By diligently serving our King, you have expanded the influence of our school at the corner of Belvedere and Sansbury, shared the message of salvation through Jesus Christ, and produced Christian leaders who will impact the world while excelling in academics, athletics, and the arts. As you read this edition of The Chronicle, please join me in expressing our gratitude to our hardworking faculty, staff, and students, and let us praise our King who enables these remarkable achievements!



iddle and high school years are transformative. The 2022-2023 school year has been marked by growth, success, and treasured memories. The opportunities provided and accomplishments achieved will leave a lasting impact on students. Mornings started with friendly faces in King's Corner, as they welcomed faculty, staff, students, and families with delicious coffee and tasty treats. In its inaugural year, the student-led coffee shop experienced tremendous success with a portion of the profits being invested by the Business Program Investment Group.

Academic excellence continues to be a shining hallmark of The King's Academy. Through dedication, hard work, and a thirst for learning, students have excelled in all areas. Seniors earned 888 acceptances from 234 colleges with 43% of the class admitted to the top 100 ranked colleges and universities.

impressive spaces including the Esther B. O'Keeffe Courtroom & Center for Liberty, The Day Family Center for Medical Sciences, and the Smith Family Bistro. These state-ofthe-art facilities enhanced students' learning with real-life, hands-on application. The completion of the O'Keeffe Innovation Center builds excitement for the 2023-2024 school year. The Center will allow students to embrace innovation, push knowledge boundaries, and seek new frontiers of accomplishment.

In athletics, we witnessed unbelievable feats! Fans were met with exhilarating victories and triumphant moments. Whether it was winning championships, breaking personal and school records, or demonstrating teamwork, our athletes have shown that success comes from discipline, resilience, and perseverance. Additionally thirty-one seniors

committed to playing collegiate sports and collectively TKA experienced a record-breaking amount of championships.

These successes were all possible through God's goodness. Students' lives have been eternally impacted for His Kingdom. It is not easy to walk by faith in the world today. Dr. Ben Carson noted this in many conversations with TKA leaders and during his graduation address to students. McKayla Martin, Valedictorian


National Merit Finalist Liberty University, majoring in Music - Vocal

World Language Program

he World Language program at The King's Academy challenges students to broaden their perspectives, cultivate empathy for others, and think critically about new ideas. Diverse course offerings including Spanish, Latin, and French allow students to pursue their unique interests as they learn from highly qualified, passionate educators. All TKA students are exposed to world languages. Elementary students receive weekly lessons that begin in kindergarten, and our most advanced secondary course offerings include a college-level, AP course conducted entirely in Spanish.

The World Language department emphasizes student appreciation of languages and cultures. Department Chair, Señora Hodges, explains that this emphasis on a joyful classroom environment translates to a more focused emphasis of grammar and vocabulary. The intentionality of fostering a culturally rich environment is very evident during our annual Sidewalk Café. The event was a dream of former Spanish teacher, Señora Silva, who yearned to recreate the vibrant, open-air markets



of Europe and Latin America on campus. The inaugural Sidewalk Café was held in 2002, and it has become a highly anticipated annual event that honors the culture, food, and music of world languages taught on campus.

Students who have completed Spanish 2 have the opportunity for a true immersion experience through TKA's study abroad trip to Salamanca, Spain for two weeks during the summer. Salamanca is an internationally respected intellectual center; the University of Salamanca was founded in 1218 and is the oldest university in the Spanish-speaking world.

King's Latin program continues to expand with the addition of a middle school Logic class in the fall. The study of Latin serves as a foundation for many other subjects including law, medicine, engineering, and English language courses. More than half of all English words are derived from Latin, and over 90% of all scientific terminology finds its origin in Greek or Latin. Knowledge of Latin provides TKA students with a unique Biblical perspective as Latin was the language of the early church.

In Revelation 7:9, John describes his vision of "a great multitude which no one could count, from every nation, tribe, people, and language standing before the throne and before the Lamb." The body of Christ is diverse, vibrant, and includes languages from every corner of the world. The King's Academy is honored to glorify God and reveal His nature to our students through the study of the cultures and languages that He has created.





Trial Program introduces young students to the legal system in a fun and engaging way. It aims to teach them the basics of the legal system and the roles of various trial participants including lawyers, witnesses, judges, bailiffs, and jurors through two components, the Crime Scene Investigation (CSI) unit and the Mock Trial.

During the CSI unit students learn the basics of forensic science and crime scene analysis. Hands-on activities allow students to collect and analyze evidence from a crime scene such as hair, fabrics, footprints, fingerprints, and other physical evidence. Students also learn about the roles of various professionals involved in criminal investigations, such as police officers, forensic scientists, and lawyers. At the end of the unit students present their findings on visual boards and in a short video production.

The Mock Trial centers around a hypothetical case written by high school students and instructors in the O'Keeffe Pre-Law Studies Program. Students develop a variety of skills, such as critical thinking, public speaking, and teamwork as they represent the state or the defendant in the case. With the help of high school students and instructors, Explore students learn to analyze witness testimony, write direct

and cross examination questions, formulate arguments, and present their ideas to support their side's point-of-view.

This year's trial was the fictional case of *State v. Jack Griffin* which was based on *Jack and the Beanstalk*. The hearing was to determine whether Jack was guilty of breaking and entering and theft. Judge Max Toledo '23 presided over the trial in the Esther B. O'Keeffe Courtroom. Guest witnesses included Elementary Principal Adam Miller as Big Daddy Weave (aka the Giant) and first grade teacher, Christine Kovachik as Mrs. Dreamweaver (aka Mrs. Giant). The jury found Jack not guilty of breaking and entering, but guilty of theft.

Why We do What We Do!

As part of Florida history education, fourth-grade students visit the Jupiter Inlet Lighthouse and the St. Augustine Lighthouse each year. Brave students climb the 105 and 219 steps of the respective lighthouses to enjoy an expansive and breathtaking view of Palm Beach and St. Johns County.

The King's Academy is located 10 miles from the ocean, yet it has served as a lighthouse in the community for over 53 years. A lighthouse guides ships to safe harbors and warns them of hazards that can cause damage along the way. A lighthouse reflects vertical

light onto a horizontal surface, which creates a long, steady beam of light that can be seen for miles. As an educational

institution that influences and shapes thousands of lives each year, The King's Academy strives to reflect the light of God's truth onto our students' hearts so they can become a steady beam of light in an increasingly dim culture.

Ephesians 4:14-15 says, "...we are no longer to be children, tossed here and there by waves and carried about by every wind of doctrine, by the trickery of men, by craftiness in deceitful scheming; but speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in all aspects into Him who is



Helping Parents Navigate Technology & Social Media

upporting our elementary parents as they navigate their students use of technology and social media was the focus of a workshop held this spring. High school teacher Brandon Marlow and "video game pastor" Jared Stewart shed light on the pros and cons of technology with helpful tips for successful tech interactions.

Our students are digital natives. Cell phones, streaming services, and instant connectivity have been pervasive components in their world since birth. While many benefits can be found in technology, if left unmoderated, students can be exposed to content beyond their capacity to understand or respond. The goal of the workshop was to partner with the home to instill a strong sense of digital citizenship within students and move them from merely consuming content to effective digital use and creation.

Mr. Marlow noted that U.S. teens spend an average of 7 hours online

daily according to Global Youth Culture. Most of this time is spent consuming content and interacting with peers through apps such as TikTok, YouTube, and Snapchat. As a result of this increased screen time, teens across the country have reported feeling a stronger sense of isolation, insecurity, depression, and anxiety.

Many misconceptions on apps such as Snapchat give both parents and students a false sense of safety. Students believe that pictures appear only temporarily while some parents are unaware that parental controls and filters can be removed from the user side of the app. Common concerns of using these apps include the sharing of personal information, pornography, false online personas, negative effects on mental health, and extortion. As is the case with most things in life, moderation is key. Overuse and addiction can slowly creep into the hearts of our children without the proper guardrails in place.

Mr. Marlow and
Mr. Stewart emphasized
that parenting children
through the usage of through the usage of technology must be intentional. Students may be able to navigate a phone better than adults, but they require guidance and supervision in training their physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual skills.

Entrusting children with access to the world at their fingertips is a great responsibility as we rest in the truth that "to whom much is given, much will be required" (Luke 12:48). This responsibility requires students to be good stewards of technology. As parents whose goal is to shepherd the hearts of their children, the charge has moved beyond the physical and into the digital world. Modeling and guidance must be prioritized as we seek to shape the next generation into Christ-loving and responsible citizens.

International Student Program Update

/ith a strong focus on academic excellence and cultural integration, the International Student Program continues to be a stepping stone for success and personal growth. This year we welcomed 78 students from 26 countries and autonomous regions. The graduating class of international students has achieved remarkable accomplishments with all graduates being accepted into universities across the U.S. and around the world, including Carnegie Mellon, NYU, Fordham, University of California San Diego, and others.

This school year was also marked by the spiritual growth of our students. Four students put their faith in Jesus; one from Japan, one from France, one from Brazil and one from China. Ryo Ushikubo '25, from Tokyo, Japan, is hosted by a TKA family—Jerel and Mistie Olson. Jerel is the pastor of a local church and had the privilege of baptizing Ryo. Their son, Xane '25, shared that when Ryo told him the decision he had made, he wept knowing the eternal impact this experience had. The hope these students have when they return to



Chapel Gets Real

Contrary to popular belief, the Bible is not an ancient book littered with outdated rules and principles that hardly matter for today or tomorrow. In fact, the Bible has much to say about how we should live our lives and what a flourishing, God-honoring life looks like. If TKA students are going to experience the joy and fulfillment that comes from knowing Christ, they must learn how God has designed them to be in relationship with one another. Dr. Sean McDowell, a gifted communicator and world-renowned Christian apologist, spoke to middle and high school students in Chapel about sex, love, and relationships. He shared that true freedom is living according to God's design. Rather than looking at the question of sexual morality from a cultural perspective, he challenged them to see it from a Biblical perspective. Using Genesis

1 and 2, Sean reminded the students about the dangers and perils that follow when we misuse sex outside of God's intended design. Since Sean is an apologist at heart, he used logic and reason to convince students that living according to God's Word makes sense and creates a better world regardless of their belief in God or Christianity.

Chapel Gets Practical

Our hope and desire is for chapel to be more than just head knowledge and more than just static information that is forgotten once the service concludes. That is why our Spiritual Emphasis Week was so impactful. Not only did students hear powerful messages on the importance of joining God in his great mission in the world, but they were also able to put that knowledge into practice as they participated in a service project. Pastor Eugene Cho shared a

message about perseverance in the faith amidst confusion, loneliness, defeat, and insecurity. He reminded students that Christ has called them to a greater purpose in life and to see the brokenness around them as a challenge to do something about it. Growing up as an immigrant in the United States from Seoul, Eugene's heart for the poor and the marginalized began to grow as he witnessed the hate and evil that is so prevalent in our world today. In 2009 Pastor Eugene founded *One Day's* Wages which is an organization whose purpose is to help alleviate global poverty. In 2020 Eugene became the President of Bread for the World, a Christian advocacy group that works to end world hunger. It is no coincidence that the day following Chapel students were able to glean with CROS Ministries, helping pick over 3,500 lb of peppers. Gleaning originates in the Old Testament and







is a ministry that collects leftover food in the fields and donates it to those in need. Students donated the gleaned peppers to the Feeding South Florida Food Bank, which helps provide food to those with severe food insecurity in Palm Beach County. Having heard the message to go out and share the love of Christ with those around them, students were able to participate in that calling and experience what it looks like to join God in His great mission.

Chapel Redefined

Christians around the world are using their God-given talents to glorify God and to preach the message of Jesus with passion and conviction. This semester, students experienced an unconventional way of worship. In February, a Christian rap group,

God through the musical style of rap. Our hope is that students saw the beauty in the diversity of music that God has created and how Christians can use music to glorify Him. Similarly, students were blessed to hear from a professional BMX group, StuntDudes, who visited chapel in May. Through their love and unique gifting in BMX, this team of athletes has traveled to more than 50 countries performing high-flying stunts all while preaching a powerful message of the hope and forgiveness found in Jesus. Vic Murphy, StuntDudes founder and worldrenowned BMX rider, challenged students to consider whether they are on the broad road that leads to destruction or on the narrow road

that leads to life. By accepting Jesus as their Savior, they are promised life today and life forever. Their chapel performance culminated with a "Jump of Death" where one member jumped over MS/HS Principal and MS/HS Directors of Student Ministries. Everyone walked away unscathed and seriously impressed at this team's talent and love for Jesus.

At King's we strive to make chapel services engaging, informative, and most importantly, centered on the Gospel message. Our hope is that students look forward to coming to chapel and find that this time is an encouragement and a highlight of their day.



Scan the QR Code to watch TKA's Chapels or centuries, people in Western culture felt some social pressure or some social benefit to going to church, reading the Bible, and praying. Americans were largely "Christianized" in their thinking. To be known as a "good churchgoing man or woman" was part of being an upstanding citizen. Being a Christian was a status-enhancer. At worst, people were indifferent toward Christianity.

Times have changed. For a vast number of Americans, these ideas are weakening or absent. Our culture has grown cold to Christianity's message and hostile to its presence. The issue is not that Christianity's message is simply being rejected; it is that the gospel is becoming incomprehensible and increasingly despised. Christians no longer find themselves in a culture where their faith is highly regarded in public: they are no longer in the centers of cultural production, their

Reasonable Faith

ideas are openly repudiated as a threat to democracy, and ascribing to Christian views now brings negative consequences.

As a result, Christians are increasingly bombarded with objections to their faith. Without a thoughtful faith that asks questions and grapples with issues, many Christians lack confidence in what they believe and why they believe it. This fall, HS Bible teachers and Reasonable Faith directors Mr. Dan Stuart and Mr. Jerry Barrantes launched a Reasonable Faith Chapter for parents. Nearly 50 adults attended weekly apologetics meetings to discuss topics such as God's existence and the problem of evil-with the intention of exploring the reliability of the Gospels and Jesus' resurrection. "I realized that Christianity not only meets the needs of our heart, but it also meets the demands of our intellect as well," shares parent Paula Diaz. Attendees learned how to make sense of these chaotic cultural changes, discovered best defenses for the Christian faith, experienced greater confidence in what they believe and why they believe it, and were emboldened to meet the challenges and questions of our culture with poise and winsomeness. This was all introduced in the context of a warm and engaging community called Reasonable Faith.

Reasonable Faith features the work of philosopher and theologian Dr. William Lane Craig. Its three-fold mission is to: 1) to provide an articulate, intelligent voice for Biblical Christianity in the public arena; 2) to challenge unbelievers with the truth of Biblical Christianity; 3) to train Christians to state and defend Christian truth claims with greater effectiveness. EDITING STUDIO








ELEMENTARY DIGITAL LAB


The Digital Lab engages digital natives and transforms them from merely consumers to producers. The facilitator guides students through thinking and activities that foster design innovation. Students will develop their digital building block skills which include: analyzing and managing data, software development, computer programming, digital security and privacy, and basic computer technical skills.





EXPLORATION LAB

The Exploration Lab serves as the basecamp for students in the elementary gifted program. Beginning in the fall of 2023, offerings will expand with the addition of an honors technical theatre course and an elective for middle school students. The Kingspys are the end of season awards celebrating the accomplishments of the teams together as one program in similar fashion to the ESPYs. Months of planning and preparation went into the selection process, gift baskets, decorations and deserts which made a memorable event for all in attendance.







Boys Basketball Ends a 33-Year Drought

Boys basketball has exhibited significant growth and potential in recent years. Through their commitment they built momentum and broke a 33-year drought by capturing their first championship since 1990. Seniors Will McPherson, Jackson Worley, James Shoenfelt, and Jack Chamberlain set the tone for the season by providing depth on and off the court to direct the Lions and keep their focus on the post-season run. One-thousand-point scorers Jermaine Council and James **Shoenfelt** led the offense along with talented sophomore Javian Jones. They finished the regular season 23-1 with a 7-game win streak heading into the district tournament. That streak carried through with a semifinal win over John Carroll and Benjamin to secure their first district championship since 1990. The Lions went on to beat Santa Fe Catholic High School and Bell Creek Academy before bowing out in the Regional Final and Florida High School Athletic Association Elite Eight.

Lions basketball was highly regarded by the *Palm Beach Post* and *Sun Sentinel* garnering All County selections for **Jermaine Council** (1st Team), **Ransom Soles, Javian Jones, Jack Chamberlain** and **Reggie Workman** (2nd Team) with **Coach Murray Smith** being selected *Sun Sentinel* Palm Beach County Boys Basketball Coach of the Year.

Girls Basketball – Back-to-Back Final Four

What is the best way to follow up a state final four season? You go back and do it again! The Lady Lions tore through the regular season schedule going 18-4 against some of the best basketball programs in South Florida. Impressive wins against teams such as last year's 3A State Champion Westminster Academy, Male Academy, and Liberty High School from Nevada proved that they were a force to be reckoned with. The Lady Lions raced through the playoffs with a district championship win over Cardinal Newman, and regional wins over Edgewood, Holy Trinity, and Seffner Christian. Their twoyear run to the finals was led by seniors Janessa Williams, Jordan Race, and Naomi Cadet. Janessa Williams and Jordan Race led the charge, both eclipsing the 1000-point mark in their senior year. Sophomore sensation Jade Jones and **Sophia Kateris** will be counted on next year to steer the ship back to Lakeland.

The girls were recognized with high praise and post season honors for their amazing run and talent. Janessa Williams was selected as the Florida Dairy Farmers 3A Player of the Year. All County First Team selections were earned by Jordan Race, Jade Jones and Janessa Williams with Janessa being named the Palm Beach County Player of the Year. Sophia Kateris was selected to the Second Team, and Chris Race was once again named the Palm Beach County Coach of the Year.







Boys Wrestling

The learning curve for the Lions in their inaugural season came quick under the direction of first year Head Coach Dr. Dale Porcher. Dr. Porcher's experience as a high school state champion competing at high level amateur tournaments, and MMA training proved beneficial for the upstart Lions. His patient approach, technical development, and teaching allowed the Lions to make great strides. Six wrestlers advanced out of the district tournament including Dartavious "Tay Tay" Saintelus, Tyce Porcher, Ridge Martin, Nathan Winters, Joel Henning, and Ryo Ushikubo. The team finished the regional tournament with a remarkable 10th placement out of 28 schools and ahead of every 1A school in Palm Beach County. Dartavious Saintelus carried the honors for Kings by being the first regional runner-up wrestler to advance to the 1A FHSAA State Finals.

Competitive Cheer

TKA competitive cheer owns the longest run and consecutive trips to the FHSAA State Championships. This year they qualified for their 16th advancement in a row. Coach Jenn Allen continues to produce championship caliber teams and always brings out the best in her athletes. This year the Lions switched to a tumbling division with a team comprised largely of new middle school athletes. Big days are ahead for the competitive cheer team.

Boys Volleyball Sets the Standard with State Final Four Appearance

The second-year boys volleyball team has set a lofty standard for others to pursue. The Lions inaugural 2022 year ended with an impressive (21-6) season followed by this year's (27-2) record. The new program captured impressive accomplishments including a District Championship, Regional Championship, and a State Final Four appearance. These incredible feats were achieved by both boys volleyball and beach volleyball as they competed in a single FHSAA class that included all participating schools, regardless of size and strength.

The season was capped by special recognition in the Palm Beach Post and Sun Sentinel with Logan Taylor being named Player of the Year, Coach Taylor as Coach of the Year, and First Team All-County selections for Saulius Vilkelis and Micah Tumas.

Girls Lacrosse

Coach Brett VanAlstyne and girls lacrosse continue to have stellar seasons. This year the Lady Lions amassed a record of 15 wins and 5 losses. Despite being paired with what may be the hardest girls lacrosse district in the country, they continue to compete, battle, and rank in the top 25-30 teams in the state of Florida. Softball

With a new head coach and the graduation of six senior starters, Lions softball was ready for a rebuild. That did not happen! Instead, Lions softball continued their winning ways with a regular season record of 12 wins and 2 losses. Returning starters **Chiara Laus** and **Marlo Lacy** provided the leadership; while newcomers **Gracyn Needle, Lily Stone** and **Kiersten Zimmerman** jumped right in the fray making an immediate impact on the team. Eighth grader **Gracyn Needle** proved to be a force behind and at the plate batting .622 with a school record 54 RBIs and 3 HRs. Special days are ahead for the Lady Lions.

Baseball

The varsity baseball team had high aspirations with a senior laden team heading into the 2023 season. Offseason injuries to the top pitchers on the staff would make the season challenging, but the Lions battled each step of the way. Seven of the losses were by one or two runs, and the season record could have easily been flipped with a few more bounces going the Lions way. Four athletes medaled at the FHSAA 2A State Finals. **Colton Lawson** finished as the 1600m Runner-up with a new school record of 4:18.91, **Michael Castillo** finished 8th in the 3200, **Tianna Demeritte** placed 4th in the high jump, and **Avery Fronrath** finished 7th in the 3200 and 7th in the 1600. **Colton Lawson** was also named the M. Nelson Loveland Male Senior Career Athlete for the 22-23 season.

Boys and Girls Tennis

Seniors **Jaden Williams** and **Sandra Watson** paved the way for the young tennis upstarts to take the reins next year. **Jaden Williams** set a school record with a 128-10 and district runner up finish, winning 17 matches in a row at the number one position. The girls went 7 and 7 led by **Sandra Watson** who will be playing for University of Massachusetts.

oach Maddy, I want to thank you for this wonderful season, for your constant prayers, and for letting me be in your life to learn more about God. You are like a second mother and someone who guides me to do my best even when I feel I can't. You have picked me up at my lowest and helped me pursue my dreams to play college basketball." This is one of many testimonies that TKA alumnus Madison "Maddy" Erneston '17 has received from the teens she coaches in her AAU basketball team, *The Private Snipaz*. Maddy graduated from Coastal Carolina University in 2021 and serves as a missionary for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA) in the Conway-Carolina Forest area of South Carolina.

"I love coming alongside coaches, athletes, teachers, and communities with the good news of Jesus. There is no other ministry that allows you to share the gospel on public school campuses," says Maddy. She encourages students through Bible studies, weekly huddles, and high school leadership teams, meeting with more than 60 students and 30 coaches weekly. During her first nine

months as a staff member, Maddy witnessed 524 students accept Christ!

Last year, while serving in a local government housing community, Maddy felt compassion for the young teens who were hungry for love and acceptance. She noticed their passion for basketball and the respect that the status of an athlete brought. She began praying and fasting, asking the Lord to show her what she could do to make a difference for these teens facing so much division and hardship. On the 20th day of her 21-day fast, God told her to start a basketball team. With no training as a coach and the reality that the last time she played was in middle school, Maddy hesitated but stepped out in faith. She started a Christ-centered nonprofit basketball team that gives every athlete a fair chance to be successful

Community members noticed and asked how they could become involved. Tournament fees were paid, new jerseys were donated, and a \$15,000 gift was given to sponsor the team's next season. Coaches and teams in the area began asking to join the program. The program expanded to five teams and teammates have become more of a family than a group of athletes. As a result of Maddy's "yes," 65 athletes are hearing Bible teachings, learning important life skills, and being mentored by a team of loving coaches. She wants every person she comes in contact with to know that a relationship with Christ will change their lives forever.

"These kids mean the world to me. They are my motivation and fill my life with so much joy.

My goal is to give them a chance to succeed in life and stay off the streets, while teaching them how to be
