Message from the Mayor



Happy Summer Medford!

As June comes to a close, we're excited to share that the City Council has approved the <u>FY24 Budget</u>. Thank you to everyone that has worked so diligently to deliver the proposed budget to the Council at the earliest date in over 20 years.

Below are a few of our June highlights:

- As mentioned above, our FY24 Budget was passed by the City Council earlier this
 month. The City's operating amount totals \$179,607,106 and the Water Sewer
 Enterprise Budget Fund totals \$27,365,580.75. Read more in the 'Recent News' section
 below about the administration and Council leadership's compromise that addresses
 shared goals.
- We also named a new Poet Laureate, Vijaya Sundaram, who will take over the position from July 1, 2023 until July 2025. We will be hosting an installation ceremony in early August to pass the torch from our first Poet Laureate, Terry E. Carter.
- The City has also updated the Capital Improvement Plan to help guide long term development, infrastructure, and open space investments for the next six years. The administration worked with our Finance Department and other City departments to develop long-term needs and priorities under the CIP.


City Looks to Fill Three Open Positions

City Council Approves FY24 Budget



The City Council has approved the FY24 budget, with the City's operating amount totaling \$179,607,106 and the Water Sewer Enterprise Budget Fund totaling \$28,965,580.75, at its June 20th meeting.

Sundaram will take over the position from the inaugural Poet Laureate Terry E. Carter, whose two-year term ends on July 1.

"I am beyond thrilled to have Vijaya as our next Poet Laureate," Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn said. "Her unique voice coupled with her vision for the future of the arts in Medford made her an ideal choice to build upon the tremendous foundation that Terry Carter started."

Medford Releases Updated Six-Year Capital Improvement Plan Extending to 2028

CITY OF MEDFORD CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN FY23 – FY28

The City of Medford has updated its Capital Improvement Plan to help guide long term development, infrastructure, and open space investments for the next six years, Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn announced.

With guidance from Director of Municipal Services Sarah Concannon at the Collins Center for Public Management at UMass Boston, the administration worked with the finance team to craft a capital investment strategy based on financial forecasts and projected revenue resources. Once that was completed, departments were then tasked with developing long-term needs and priorities that could be sustained under the CIP.

Mayor Lungo-Koehn Administration Reallocates Additional Funding for Schools, Library and Zoning in FY24 Budget

Over \$400,000 in funding has been reallocated by the administration to fulfill core needs as highlighted by the City Council during budget hearings for the Fiscal Year 2024 Budget, Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn announced.

The money, leveraged from a surplus of funding available in the Highway Department, will be invested across the School Department, Library and Legislative budgets and will be used to address key needs that were a priority of department heads, the City Council and Mayor.

The City is also in the process of breaking ground on a station at Tufts Park. The anticipated completion for the four funded stations is later this fall.

These stations will expand the total number of EV charging stations to 10, spread across several neighborhoods and transportation hubs throughout Medford.

Medford Residents Have Recycled 1,191 Pounds of Unwanted Clothing in May

Through its partnership with Helpsy, a textile recycling company, the city has been able to help residents recycle 1,191 pounds of unwanted clothing in May.

As the largest clothing collector in the Northeast, Helpsy partners with municipalities and organizations across 11 states to collect unwanted clothing and other textiles in order to keep clothes out of landfills. In 2021, the company diverted nearly 30 million pounds of textiles from landfills through a combination of clothing drives, home pickups, thrift store partners and clothing receptacles.

As part of its environmental mission, Helpsy now requires a three bag minimum for pickups. The company is optimizing routes in order to use resources as wisely as possible and reduce environmental impact.



Celebrate the Fourth of July in Medford!

The Royall House and Slave Quarters invites community members to gather on the lawn in front of the historic Slave Quarters building (15 George St., Medford) to read and/or listen to Douglass's "What, To The Slave, is the Fourth of July?" to honor the long history of Black activism, critique, and abolition on July 4th from 12pm-4pm.

This in-person program on the museum grounds is free and open to all. <u>Register here</u> to receive program updates.

The program will begin with a brief libation ceremony to honor the people who were enslaved on the plantation. Scholar/activist David Harris and members of the Mystic Valley Area NAACP will launch the reading, then invite interested community members to read sections of the speech. A poetry reading by Terry E. Carter, Medford's Poet Laureate Emeritus, will close out the program.

After the event, community members are invited to an informal open house inside the Royall House and the Slave Quarters. Light refreshments will be provided.
