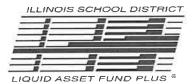

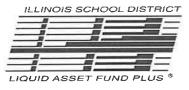

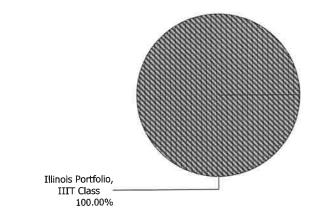

Goal Update

2013-14 Goals:

1. Assess the effectiveness of teacher in-service programming. A written report shall be prepared and submitted to the Board.

The assessment of the goal as reported on March 25, 2014 is as follows:

In order to better understand prior in-service programming the history of its evolution were reviewed as well as the initiatives that are underway.

During the 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 school years the teacher in-service program was designed to support ongoing professional development for the faculty. This continual improvement process aimed at effecting change in curriculum design and pedagogy. Teacher in-service time was dedicated to six research-based topics:

- 1. Assessment for Learning
- 2. Project CRISS
- 3. Technology
- 4. Sheltered Instructional Observation Protocol (SIOP)
- 5. *Understanding by Design (UBD)*
- 6. Differentiated instruction

This in-service work provided teacher's knowledge and expertise in these best practice areas and served as a foundation for the work done to transform curriculum and instruction in an effort to align with the Common Core State Standards (CCSS). During this time teachers continued to document the curriculum on curriculum maps, which are a key tool in ensuring course teams have documents that scaffolds a guaranteed and viable curriculum.

During the 2012-2013 school year, the focus of the in-service program shifted with the change at the state level to a focus on the CCSS. The Common Core State Standards represent a major philosophical and pedagogical change, from a knowledge based set of standards to a collection of learning objectives that delineate skills students need to obtain to demonstrate Career and College Readiness. The CCSS require an increase in expectations regarding the depth and breadth of students' reading of Informational Text. This curricular shift served as the focus of the building-wide professional development last year and was communicated to the staff through the vision of disciplinary literacy, the development of the unique reading skills required for literacy in different content areas. As a result of this work, each division at Community High School is attempting to integrate disciplinary literacy and the Habits of Mind required in each discipline.

During the 2013-14 school year, we have continued to build upon the work done in previous years with a focus on the alignment of the curriculum and instruction to the CCSS. This was achieved through the modification of curriculum maps to include the CCSS and the training of all staff in Project CRISS. Comprehensive training of all faculty in Project CRISS provides all teachers with a common framework in which to design lessons that emphasize the skills required by the CCSS and give teachers strategies to teach the literacy skills

required by the CCSS. The modification of the curriculum maps ensures teachers document when and how the Common Core State Standards are taught. As of January 2014, all faculty has earned Project CRISS certification, and staff has been working to produce CCSS aligned curriculum maps. Throughout the second semester of this year, we will be working not only on CRISS lessons but also on curriculum maps with an emphasis on student reflection on learning.

Teacher in-service work has been supported through the efforts of the literacy coaches throughout the school year and has been essential in mentoring and supporting teachers outside of the Late Start and Early Dismissal time; the coaches work with course teams, as well as individuals, to design Project CRISS aligned lessons and refine curriculum maps. The Project CRISS lesson framework will also serve us well during the transition to 1:1 learning environment, which will provide new ways students can engage, transform and reflect during lessons.

I understand that the staff have been extremely responsive to the in-service program. The work of the last four years has changed the faculty methodology and, as a result, student learning has been impacted. A significant reduction in teacher talk and an increase in student inquiry and collaboration in the classroom is a result of the District's professional development. Evidence of this growth can be seen throughout the building as teachers explore new ways to design and sequence curriculum using the Project CRISS Framework.

Assessing the in-service offerings is a collaborative effort. I have met with teachers and union leadership to evaluate the value, organization, purpose, and topics that have been the nexus of staff development. The feedback I received from staff was insightful. In general, staff feels positively about the in-service offerings they have received this year while also identifying future needs. For the last four years staff felt that the in-service offerings were fragmented and without a focus; however, this year the efforts of the last four years have been synthesized.

The CRISS strategies, curriculum mapping, and course team analysis of student data are creating a connection to the previous years' efforts. However, the staff has shared that they have concerns and feel as though any additional initiative would put them on "overload". The perceived lack of focus the staff spoke of was attributed to the loss of the Assistant Principal of Curriculum six years ago; since that position has been effectively implemented this year, the staff all has shared a sense of focus and purpose for staff development. I believe the in-service programming has addressed initiatives that have evolved from within the district as well as those from outside the Community High School. The staff feels a sense of relief as a result of the collaboration of staff and an administrator dedicated to curriculum and instruction, working towards the broader curricular needs of the district.

The focus throughout the 2013-14 school year has been impactful and aligned to the staff development goals:

- 1. Align all curricula to the Common Core State Standards
- 2. Improve instructional practices to meet the increased rigor in student learning found in the Common Core State Standards

- 3. Foster collaborative teaming for the purpose of curricular reflection, response to intervention (RtI), and data-based decision making
- 4. Create a school climate that supports students in an increasingly rigorous environment

Looking ahead there will be a continued need to evaluate the in-service offerings and make necessary adjustments to accommodate growth and change. Areas of future needs include the following:

- scheduling of in-service time
 - · lunch n' learns
 - · frequency of late arrivals / early release
- departmental data analysis
 - · mastery manager training
 - · data interpretation
- technology: all aspects of a 1:1 initiative
- o data collection
- professional learning communities
- testing literacy
- curriculum mapping continued

Regardless of our needs both for all staff in-service or continuous individual professional development (for example, instruction for teachers of Advanced Placement coursework) it is evident that the staff and administration are making positive strides towards creating a professional atmosphere where time is being used appropriately to foster improvements in teaching and ultimately student learning.

Updates relevant to the 2014-15 school year include the following professional development initiatives with a vision of developing students who can think critically in each academic discipline throughout this past year:

- To document Common Core Standards and Disciplinary literacy skills on curriculum maps
- To ensure alignment between curriculum, instruction and assessment
- To focus on student success in the learning of disciplinary literacy skills
- To document and use the Project CRISS Framework to teach common core
- To review and revise curriculum maps for consistency
- To use the Project CRISS Framework and technology to support student learning of the curriculum
- Technology weeks (2nd week of every month) which included:
 - o Lunch 'n learns
 - o Tech tips via email
 - Google café
- Division meetings with a shared focus on technology integration
- Professional development opportunities including Google Drive, Google Docs, Google Forms, and Google Classroom

2. Compile baseline data on the numbers of students performing below, at, and above grade level. A written report summarizing this data shall be prepared and submitted to the Board.

The assessment of the goal as reported on March 25, 2014 is as follows:

EPAS

EPAS (Explore Plan ACT) is a set of assessments starting in 8th grade with Explore and ending in junior year with the ACT. At Community High School, the PLAN test is given in Freshman year, the Retired ACT is given in sophomore year, both of these tests are given a year in advance of the suggested date by ACT.

The EPAS scores shows the percentage of students who are ready for college and a career or who are on track to be ready for college and career depending on the test. The EPAS system is not a measure of students at or above grade level. The ACT is used by colleges as one piece of evidence used for college entrance; the score needed for entrance depends on the college and the rest of the evidence presented by the student. ISBE uses a composite score of 21 to determine college and career readiness.

The tables below use the composite scores to determine the percentage of students meeting college and career benchmarks. The composite score is the average of the four sub scores (English, Math, Reading, Science). Research has shown the composite score to be the most reliable predictor of success. EPAS benchmark scores are based on "success" which is defined as a 50% or higher probability of earning a B or higher in the corresponding college course or courses. The following tables give the percentage of students who are ready for college and career.

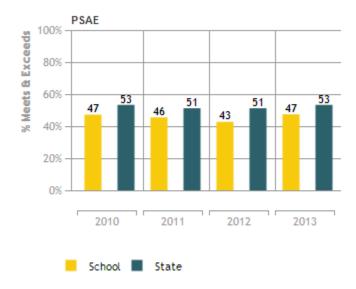

PSAE

The PSAE (Prairie State Achievement Examination) is a two-day standardized test taken by juniors. On the first day of testing students take the ACT and on the second day students take two workkeys examination (applied mathematics and Reading for information) and a ISBE developed science assessment.

In using PSAE to determine the numbers of students at, meeting or below grade level the definition of "at grade level" is students who meet or exceed state standards. The graph below shows the number of students who meet or exceed state standards over the last four years.



STAR Testing

STAR assessment in math and reading is being piloted with all freshmen during the 2013 – 2014 school year. Students will be tested at least three times during the year to both benchmark the student and progress monitor learning. The STAR testing system provides its own benchmarks: the minimum performance levels students are expected to reach by certain points of the year in order to meet end-of-year performance goals. The end-of-year benchmark typically represents the minimum level of performance required by state or local standards. Community High School is aligning to the Common Core State Standards (CCSS), and STAR benchmark represents progress towards career and college readiness as determined by the CCSS assessment. However it should be noted that no CCSS aligned assessment has been given at the state level and STAR assessment was not originally designed around the CCSS, but has been aligned with CCSS after the development of the assessment.

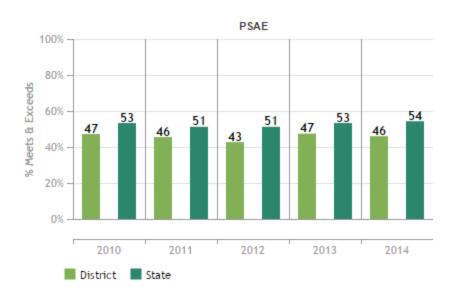

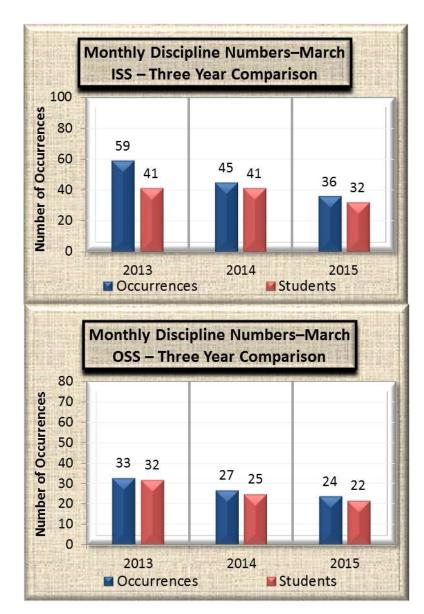

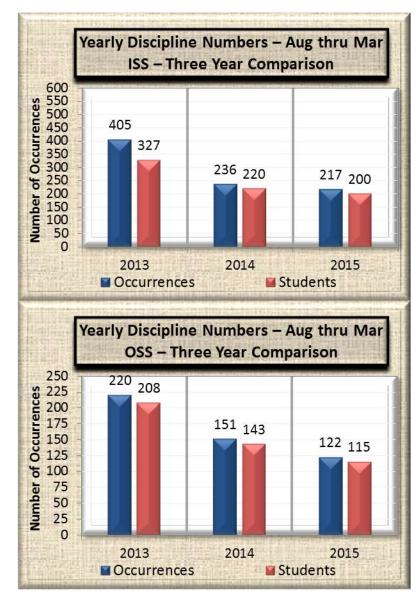

Current annualized costs for Special Education transportation is approximately \$700,000. The State reimburses a portion of these costs with the FY15 level to be estimated at approximately \$500,000. This has the potential of being a 28% increase over the expiring contract but will most likely be less due to a restructuring of the rates for low incidence (1 or 2 students) routes. We are currently transporting students to 13 locations.
