Graduates Celebrated at June 14 Commencement

Three-hundred forty-five students were awarded diplomas at the Plymouth Whitemarsh High School Commencement ceremony held on June 14 at Colonial Field.

The evening included an address by Olivia Bell, a poem by Olivia Wellmen, and the alma mater as sung by Madison Coleman, Azzareya Crumpton, Kaitlin Parris, and Julia Zarzoso.

The graduates were congratulated by three speakers, each of whom shared a bit of advice and much praise. Superintendent Dr. Michael Christian reminded the students of the wisdom of kindergarteners and the value of second chances; Lawrence Williamson Jr., Class of 1973 Distinguished Graduate, spoke to the students about their potential and the importance of learning from others; and Dr. Jason Bacani, Principal, noted many of the accomplishments from the Class of 2023. Here are a few of those highlights:

- 92.1% are going to four- or two-year colleges/universities (for a map of where seniors are headed following graduation, see page 11)
- Four students are going into the military
- The Class of 2023 has received a one-year total of \$4,430,453 in scholarship and award money, and a four-year total of \$18,043,086
- More than 40 percent of the class graduated with a 4.0 grade point average or higher
- Nearly 100 students were named AP Scholars by the College Board
- 10 seniors were named National Merit Scholarship Commended Students

CSDEF Raises Funds to Support Students and Teachers

The Colonial School District Education Foundation (CSDEF) continued its dedication to Colonial students by raising approximately \$74,000 and funding several projects, events, and scholarships during the 2022-2023 school year.

Food For Thought

Food for Thought was the largest and most rewarding effort this year, with \$50,000 raised through individual donations, a \$10,000 matching grant from Firstrust Bank, approximately \$12,000 from Subaru of America's "Share the Love" event and John Kennedy Subaru, and a generous donation from the Meersman family.

Money raised was used to pay for more than 6,300 lunches for families who just missed the government cutoff for free meals. The remaining money from the \$50,000 will be used to continue the program next year.

Teacher Grants

The CSDEF gave out \$7,250 in teacher grants to pay for free reading libraries in Spanish, French, and Latin for the Plymouth Whitemarsh High School World Languages Department; a Grief and Divorce library for elementary counselors; and specially weighted stuffed animals that help relieve anxiety at the elementary level.

The annual Feel the Love campaign (that recognizes school staff each February) brought in \$4,100 to help refill the teacher grant bucket.

Giving to Each School

The CSDEF donated \$1,200 to each principal and \$750 to each school's librarian to help cover whatever needs they had. For example, Principal Rose Rock at Colonial Elementary School purchased portable pickleball courts for the playground. Conshohocken

Elementary School Library Media Specialist, Nina Pratowski, picked up kits that allowed students to build robots and learn about gears. The annual Plymouth Whitemarsh

received \$6,000 from the CSDEF toward costs. In addition, Colonial Elementary Schools will be able to upgrade the technology available in their *Continued on bottom of page 5*

PW Graduates Awarded \$32,500 in Scholarships

Twenty Plymouth Whitemarsh High School seniors were awarded \$32,500 in scholarships through the Colonial School District Education Foundation (CSDEF). The CSDEF has taken on the mantle of awarding scholarships following the dissolution of the PW Scholarship Fund.

Scholarships are awarded to students attending technical schools, two- and four-year colleges, and other post-secondary institutions.

Recipients must have a grade point average of 3.8 and are selected based on their academic achievements, involvement in activities or work, and an essay they submit. This year's recipients are:

Scholarship Fund

In addition to funding 20 scholarships, the CSDEF brought in \$5,000 to help continue providing these gifts in the future.

Partnership with Subaru of America

John Kennedy Subaru selected the CSDEF as a Hometown Charity recipient for its annual Subaru Share the Love Event. For almost two months leading up to the end of the year, customers who purchase or lease a Subaru can select the CSDEF to receive a \$250 donation. This year, the CSDEF received more than \$20,000.

Colonial School District libraries also received between 200-300 science books, thanks to Subaru Loves Learning and the AAAS/Subaru SB&F Prize for Excellence in Science Books.

Additional Fundraisers

The return of Foundation Day brought in more than



\$6,800 and offered visitors the chance to tour the new middle school and enjoy fun children's activities, performances, and food trucks.

- The number of staff making contributions through payroll deductions increased by nearly 50%.
- A new partnership with the Philadelphia Union created game nights where more than 100 tickets were sold.
- The Conshy Adult Prom committee donated \$1,732 to the CSDEF.

2023-24 Budget Includes New Positions to Address Rising Enrollment


The Colonial School District Board of Directors approved the 2023-24 budget at the May 25, 2023 meeting, establishing a spending plan that will enable the District to maintain its rigorous instructional program while also limiting the impact to taxpayers.


The \$151,153,201 budget will result in a 2.56-percent tax increase, which is well below the Act 1 index (tax cap set by the state) of 4.1 percent. For a homeowner with the median assessed value of \$152,850, this would result in an additional \$95.46 in taxes. Colonial maintains one of the lowest tax rates in Montgomery County.

The budget includes five new teaching positions to address increasing enrollment. Expenditures for the 2023-24 school year are 4.1 percent higher than last year, with inflation and rising student enrollment driving some of that increase. Other factors affecting the rise in costs include collective bargaining agreement obligations, healthcare contributions, special education mandates, and charter school tuition.

Property Tax/Rent Rebate Programs Available for Eligible Residents

Some Colonial School District residents may be eligible for tax relief through state and school district Property Tax/Rent Rebate Programs.

The state program has been in effect since 1971 and is funded by state lottery and slot machine proceeds. The income limit is \$35,000 a year for homeowners and \$15,000 a year for renters. Half of Social Security income is excluded. The maximum standard rebate is \$650 (this amount may change depending on legislation that was pending at the time this publication went to print).

Colonial offers an additional discount of up to 75 percent of the state rebate base amount.

To qualify for the discount, applicants must be:

- homeowners with a household income of no more than \$35,000 annually (half of Social Security income is excluded); or renters with a household income of \$15,000 annually (half of Social Security income is excluded): AND
- be age 65 or older OR

 be a widow/widower aged 50 or older

OR

 be permanently disabled and age 18 or older

CES Addition Planned to Address Growing Enrollment

To accommodate an anticipated bump in enrollment, the Colonial School District Board of School Directors has approved a renovation project at Colonial Elementary School that would add approximately 18 new classrooms.

At the June 12 meeting, the Board authorized the architect to develop plans for the renovation project following several months of discussions at the Facilities/Maintenance/ Transportation (FMT) Committee level. Initially presented with many different options, the FMT Committee narrowed choices down to two options - one that would add 15 classrooms, and one that would add 18. Other differences between the two options included the arrangement of the main entrance to the building and where administrative offices would be located.

In the end, the committee agreed that the larger addition would be more practical, given that there is more flexibility with regard to how offices might be arranged, and that it strengthens the safety and security of the building by moving the main entrance of the school to the side of the building. The renovation would also involve moving the location for the district administrative offices.



Enrollment projections have shown that Colonial Elementary School's population will grow by 100 to 125 students over the next two years. A renovation project is being planned.

Currently located toward the back of building on the first floor, the district office spaces would become classrooms. A portion of the gym would be used to build new district administrative offices on the front corner of the building, and space on the second floor would also be converted to offices. This enables the district office to have its own separate entrance offering another enhancement to the security and safety of the building.

Enrollment projections have indicated that Colonial Elementary School will grow by approximately 100 to 125 students by the start of the 2025-26 school year. To meet this demand, the district's architect, GKO, will draw up plans this summer, with the intent to seek construction bids in fall of 2023. The majority of the renovation work would take place during the summer of 2024 so as not to disrupt the main part of the school year.

The total cost of the project is estimated to be between \$20 and \$22 million. The Board authorized a General Obligation Bond in the amount of \$15 million in June to help pay for the project. The remaining cost for the project would come from the district's Capital Reserve Fund.

Bus Drivers Needed for Next School Year

Colonial School District is in search of bus drivers. The shortage exacerbated by the pandemic continues, and transportation contractors like First Student are offering incentives to attract more drivers.

Paid training for a commercial driver's license is being offered at \$15 an hour, and when drivers are ready to begin, the pay increases to \$25 an hour. To find out more visit workatfirst com. To learn more about what it's like to be a bus dri

Food Services Department Visited by State Officials

The state's universal free breakfast program was celebrated in June at Colonial Elementary School, where students were greeted by Gov. Josh Shapiro, state lawmakers, and representatives from the Pennsylvania Department of Education as they entered the cafeteria for their morning meal.

The visit was part of Gov. Shapiro's push to continue the free universal breakfast program, which started last year. Colonial was chosen by the state as a location for the governor's visit because the school district has seen a 175-percent increase in breakfast participation at Colonial Elementary School and Plymouth Whitemarsh High School since 2018.

Part of this is due to the free meals, but it is also due to the many offerings that students get to choose from at Colonial School District. Hot breakfast options, 100-percent juice boxes, fruit cups, bagels, and many other items are available.

In addition to serving free breakfasts, Colonial School District has been providing assistance to families who may need it to pay for school lunches. Recognizing that not all families qualify for free/reduced meal guidelines, the Colonial School District Education Foundation provided funding to the





district to assist families who may not make the cut-off but are still experiencing financial hardships. About 100 students a day received lunch for free in 2022-23, thanks to this funding.
