

# 2022-23 and 2023-24 school calendars

The Board revised the 2022-23 school year calendar previously approved in February 2021. The new calendar does not contain any additional non-school days. However, the revised calendar now reflects non-school days for the following observances:

- Monday, September 26: Rosh Hashanah
- Monday, October 10: Indigenous Peoples' Day
- Friday, April 21: Eid

The revised calendar contains no other significant changes to traditional breaks including MEA break, Thanksgiving break, winter break and spring break. The Board also approved the 2023-24 school year calendar. Calendars are available at mvpschools.org/calendars.

### **Comments to the Board**

In January, the Board created a new opportunity for the public to address the Board prior to meetings. Comments to the Board begins at 6:30 p.m. before every regular School Board meeting at the District Center, 4570 Victoria Street N., Shoreview. Learn more at <u>mvpschools.org/board</u>.

### **Budget approved**

In June, the Board approved the 2022-23 District budget. Complete details can be found on the Budgets and Finance page at <u>mvpschools.org</u>. The adopted budget will maintain stable class sizes and current programming, and it will allow the District to continue its commitment to the Pre K–14 plan for all students.

### **Operational Plan**

Each year, the School Board approves a series of goals and related activities on which the Superintendent and Cabinet will focus their work. This is known as the District Operational Plan (DOP). Priority goals for 2022-23 include:

- Review, update and refresh the District's Health, Safety and Security Plans. This will focus on the four phases of emergency management.
  - Mitigation
  - Preparedness
  - Response
  - Recovery
- Complete a comprehensive housing and enrollment study.




## Promoting diversity through art

# Among the best in the nation

Irondale and Mounds View high schools have again been ranked among the best high schools in the country, according to a new ranking by U.S. News and World Report. This year's list ranks more than 17,800 public high schools throughout the country, with Irondale and Mounds View being listed in the top 10 percent.




Additionally, both high schools landed in the top 20 Minnesota high schools in the same ranking. Mounds View Public Schools is the only district in the state with more than one high school to

have all of its high schools among the top 20. The methodology used for this year's ranking focused on six factors: college readiness, reading and math proficiency, reading and math performance, underserved student performance, college curriculum breadth and graduation rates.


