Changes to school meals

Grades K-8 and Bridges Area Learning Center

Beginning in the 2023-24 school year, all students in grades K-8 and Bridges Area Learning Center in our district will receive breakfast and lunch on school days at no cost. No application is needed. This includes a healthy meal for breakfast and a complete meal for

lunch - including a fruit and vegetable. If a student wants something extra, like another entree or a bottle of water, they'll need to pay for those items.

Even with this change, we are still encouraging families who may have applied for free and reduced-price meals to continue to do so. Submitting an application helps benefit families with much more than just meals.

To apply, complete the Application for Educational Benefits in the SchoolCafé app or our website or ask for one at your child's school. A new application must be submitted each year. All families are strongly encouraged to complete an application for their household.

Grades 9-12 Prior Lake High School

Prior Lake High School is not on the National School Meal Program. As a result, school meals are priced as follows, below.

Free or Reduced-Price Meal applications are available and families are encouraged to apply. To apply, complete the Application for Educational Benefits in the SchoolCafé app or our website at www.plsas.org/meals or ask for one at your child's school. 








Class of 2023: where they're heading

Student information update

We are gearing up for a successful start to the school year! Part of that planned success depends on great communication and we need your help to make that happen.

We are asking all parents of current students to complete the Annual Update in Infinite Campus for each student before the first day of school.

If this will be your student's first school year at PLSAS, you do not need to complete the update this year unless your student's information has changed since completing the initial enrollment.

For returning students, it is important to confirm or update your information so we can communicate with you about important events including emergencies and school closures. You will also be asked to review the Parent/Student Handbook that contains important district policy information.

Eera Deshpande earned a first place finish in an international video competition that gets students to think critically about global challenges related to population.

World of 8 Billion Video Contest is a project of Population Education, a non-profit program based in Washington D.C. The contest encourages students to share what they think we should do to fix global population issues through a 60-second video.

Deshpande's video was titled "Earth's Fate on Your Plate" and addressed the climate impacts of a more plant-focused diet.

Three other Hidden Oaks students were finalists in the World Competition, including Jasmine Dang for her video, "Sanitation Problems Due to Waste."

Inga Craig and Klarissa Harris were also finalists for their video, "The Gender Wage Gap" - Gender Equality Category.

Thousands of videos are submitted each year from around the world and only a first and second place winner is chosen at the middle school level.

PLSAS students received Laker Pride certificates and were recognized by the School Board during its June 12th meeting.

Redtail Ridge held a planting day last May where students in grades K-5 planted petunias, marigolds, a pollinator garden, pumpkins, herbs, carrots, radishes, peppers and more.

Now Kids' Company students in grades 3-5 have been watering and weeding the raised beds and can even tell you all about the importance of "deadheading" faded flowers to promote new growth and re-flowering.

Students are also reaping the benefits of their labor by estimating when the produce will be ripe for picking and then harvesting veggies for snacks.

Students will continue to help with the garden in hopes the miniature pumpkins will be visible by the time their peers return to school in September.

Middle Schools recognized for excellence in positive school climates

PBIS HIDDEN OAKS & TWIN OAKS MIDDLE SCHOOLS Sustaining Exemplar Schools

Hidden Oaks Middle School and Twin Oaks Middle School were named Sustaining Exemplar Schools for their work using Positive Behavioral Intervention and Supports (PBIS) by the Minnesota Department of Education (MDE) for the 2022-2023 school year.

PBIS is designed to prevent problem behavior, provide instruction and support for positive behaviors, and support social, emotional and behavioral needs for all students. Exemplary schools have ensured that students are at the forefront of decision-making by developing ongoing professional development, including training and coaching, to retain and develop new teachers and staff. Schools have found that the PBIS framework provides individual wellness, safety and social-emotional growth and improves learning outcomes.

This year MDE recognized 33 schools in the Metro Twin Cities Region engaging in sustained PBIS implementation. The schools and districts receiving recognition this year are leaders in improving school climate, involving the community and increasing student achievement. Schools must meet several requirements and sustain these efforts over time to be honored and recognized.


