Hal maintained a positive attitude and said that in these difficult times he realized that winning at life starts with accepting life before it happens. He found strength in the statement, "can't change it." It closed the doors of resentment and unrealistic expectations and allowed him to focus on moving forward. In any of life's circumstances, he would allow himself five minutes to feel strong emotions and then he would repeat aloud, "can't change it" and focus on forward motion. Hal has made a full recovery despite all odds.

Life is a series of ups and downs, changing plans and changing directions. You can't change that, but you will always be able to control how you respond to the "plot twists" along the way.

You can have confidence in yourself and the wings you have strengthened to fly solo. You can rely on yourself and know that even if the tree limb breaks, you will be okay because you have everything within you that you need to keep from falling. You can choose your dreams and believe that no matter where you start, one step in a positive direction will bring you closer than standing still in self doubt. As Charlie Wardle shares, "learn to be your own best friend, because too often we fall into the trap of being our own worst enemy."

On behalf of the administrative team, I wish for you to believe in yourself and know that as you go off on your journey you have everything within you to succeed. Millbrook High School held its annual graduation ceremony on June 23, where 70 seniors became graduates making their families, friends and teachers proud and some even a little teary-eyed.

The graduates paraded up the hill from the high school to the Athletic Complex and accepted their diplomas to huge rounds of applause. Making their parents even prouder, the students were accepted to nearly 70 colleges including Vassar College and Hawaii Pacific University.

Valedictorian Olivia Lucal recalled how her freshman year was upended due to COVID where it taught her and her classmates about empathy, community and how to be resilient amongst lockdowns, virtual learning and

# Math Coach Introduced

Elementary teachers from both Elm Drive and Alden Place gathered between June 21 and 22 to tackle different ways to teach math to the district's young minds with an expert in the subject.

Dr. Anchala Sobrin, Regional Coordinator of Mathematics, Data, and Grant Programming at Putnam Northern Westchester BOCES, led the professional development session and will be working in the district throughout the 2023-2024 school year as a math coach. She will also be available to assist teachers who applied for summer math grants.

As teachers begin their second year using Eureka Math, they will build their repertoire of strategies supporting students' mathematical thinking and problem solving skills.

"She will provide teachers the opportunity to plan and design lessons and assessments to track student understanding,"



Executive Director of Instruction and Community Relations Dr. Amy Watkins said. "She will also model a variety of ways to deliver math instruction to deepen student understanding."

After spending four years as STEM Director in the Peekskill City School District, Sobrin joined BOCES because she wanted to work more directly with teachers and students.

"I want to be where the kids are, where the impact is," Sobrin said. "This was calling out to me because math is my passion."

"We try to do things like meeting them where they're at in their building," Cabello said. To help ease parents' minds, they were also given a tour of the school where they met with teachers and current MMS students who talked with them about their experience. In August, students will come back to get a head start on their studies.

"They can be here and ease into being a middle schooler," Cabello said.

For Tommy Martin, he is both excited and nervous to start middle school and found that having a middle school buddy guiding him through school was helpful. He is interested in joining the art club.

"It helped for them to describe it and tell us the feel of it," Martin said.

"It was intimidating how big the school was."

Carly McKee enjoyed the tour she was given and felt at ease, as she spent time in the middle school building in first grade due to a mold issue at Alden. She plans to join the middle school band.

"I'm looking forward to everything," McKee said.

## Math Coach Introduced

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Watkins noted that Sobrin's knowledge allows her to support teachers who provide basic math to students helping them become independent thinkers.

"She has a passion when it comes to providing rich, rigorous math instruction," Watkins said.

Sobrin and the teachers discussed New York State's Next Generation Mathematics Learning Standards, grade-level outcome and ways to customize Eureka to fit the needs of Millbrook, while still meeting state standards.

"Of all the programs out there to teach math, there is not one of them that is completely perfect," Sobrin said. "We'll figure out how we are going to extract from the program what our needs are to serve students."

Teachers also participated in activities where they drew pictures in four square boxes and then used those pictures to explain what teaching math is like, as well as explaining what standards and curriculum look like.

Elm Pre-Kindergarten Teacher Aide AnnaMarie Muscari appreciated the opportunity to be trained alongside the teachers during the development and she found Sobrin to be an excellent trainer. "She's fantastic," Muscari said of Sobrin. "It truly is a great opportunity for all of us."

Elm Third Grade Teacher Jason Zmudosky found the development to be more than just jumping into the curriculum.

"It's getting a broader perspective to begin with," Zmudosky said. "I think that's a good



starting point."

Zmudosky appreciates that Sobrin will be around throughout the year to answer any questions and to share her knowledge.

"It's good to have a point person who is familiar with the curriculum," Zmudosky said. "She's someone else to lean on."
