

### Rogers High School Aquatic Center

The Rogers High School (RHS) Aquatic Center will be closed to the public until early November. PSD will be performing health code-required upgrades to the RHS Aquatic Center this summer after a lengthy closure in 2022 due to failed equipment. This work will take place with an anticipated completion of mid-August to be ready for fall aquatic school sports. The pool will then reopen to the public on November 13. Information on registration for swim lessons at the RHS Aquatic Center will be available in early November.

The work that will be done during the closure includes the upsizing of the main pool drains to be compliant with the Virginia Graeme Baker Pool and Spa Safety Act, the addition of a redundant pump, motor, electrical switch gear and new sand filters. The total project investment is estimated at \$1.4 million.

## Wildwood Kindergartner Wins National Book-It Reading Challenge Grand Prize

If you've attended elementary school anytime since the mid-1980s, you've probably participated in or heard of the Book-It Reading Challenge.

Each year since 1984, millions of young readers from across the nation have read 10-15 minutes each day during the national reading challenge sponsored by Pizza Hut to earn coupons for the much sought-after personal pan pizza and dreams of winning the nationwide grand prize.

Thanks to her love of reading—particularly Dr. Suess and animal books—the dream of winning the grand prize has become a reality for one Wildwood Elementary kindergarten student. Sadie Bell was recently announced as this school year's Book-It Challenge grand prize winner, earning herself a \$10,000 scholarship and a \$5,000 grant for her school's library to use to purchase books."I felt excited," said Bell. "It's a lot of dollars!"

On her way to being drawn as the grand prize winner, Bell read more than 130 books over the course of six months to bolster her chances of winning. She also earned six free pizzas during her reading spree, which she seemed almost as excited about. "I really like cheese and pepperoni pizzas," said Bell.

Bell intends to continue reading regularly and hopes to be a veterinarian when she grows up. Based on her love of animal books and reptiles, she is well on her way there.

## School Capacity Task Force Begins Their Work

As part of the Puyallup community, we are aware of the rapid growth in the area and the challenges it poses for our schools.

As we look towards the future, we're concerned by the data which indicates that all our elementary and high schools are over our built classroom capacity. It is also projected that our junior highs will exceed our built capacity in 2028. Our schools support more students than we have classrooms for inside our buildings. Although portable buildings are helping to alleviate space issues at many sites, there are several limiting factors that we need to consider, including:

- State-mandated teacher-to-student ratios limit the seats we can assign to each class.
- Physical building space, including classrooms in our school buildings and portable classrooms.
- Property limits to the number of portables we can add to a location, including water, sewer, restroom availability and access, and security.

Without additional bond or levy funding for school construction, this issue requires urgent, creative attention and action to provide our students with the best learning environment.

Puyallup School District is actively engaging with the community to address our schools' space and capacity issues. In April, we asked for your help, and more than 90 students, parents,

and community members from across the district volunteered. Fifteen members from that list, representing a diverse cross-section of community members, will participate in 17 meetings over the next year to ensure that all perspectives are represented.

The School Capacity and Utilization Task Force, which held their first meeting last week, will provide recommendations that support current and projected enrollment, building capacity, and address space issues within our existing facilities until future capital projects are funded and constructed.

The Task Force will review information on the following topics, among others, as it considers interim solutions to ensure our buildings have the capacity to support students:

- School attendance boundaries
- Location of districtwide programs
- Student attendance waivers (existing, new, and transfers)
- Alternative housing strategies
- Alternative grade configuration models Building condition and future building sustainability
