RPS Specialty Schools

Richmond Public Schools has several <u>specialty schools</u> that require participation in their selection process for admission. Students are eligible to apply to:

- Franklin Military Academy (6th 12th grade)
- Open High School (9th and 10th grade)
- Richmond Community High School (9th and 10th grade)
- Thomas Jefferson International Baccalaureate Programme (11th grade)
- The Governor's STEM Academy for Career and Technical Education at Richmond Technical Center (9th grade).

Seats vary year to year based on current enrollment, building capacity, and staffing.

The Governor's STEM Academy for CTE at RTC and Thomas Jefferson's IB Diploma Programme are not full-time schools but rather are a half-time program (GSA @ RTC) or a program within a school (TJ).

Selection Process - Specialty Schools

Common Application Components

- The online common application in Enroll RPS streamlines the application to all schools for which a student is interested and eligible
- Online common applications include the following required components:
 - Two teacher recommendations using a standard questionnaire
 - Short answer (all schools and grades) and essay (only high school students)
 - Scoring is double-blind by members of the school team and normed against a school rubric
 - Students choose from a list of three essay options
- All students have the opportunity to interview at each school to which they apply
- Grade Point Average from the last two years is incorporated into a students final score

School Specific Flexibilities

- Schools set individual component <u>weights</u> and their related scoring <u>rubrics</u>
- School teams conduct and score interviews and score writing components

Regional Governor's Schools

Richmond Public Schools also purchases seats for students to attend three regional governor's schools:

- Appomattox Regional Governor's School
- Maggie L. Walker Governor's School
- CodeRVA

Each of these schools has their own selection process for admission. RPS is represented on the regional school boards by our Gifted and Talented Coordinator and a member of the RPS School Board.

CodeRVA does not use selective criteria for admission. Their selection process not being considered for changes this year.

Selection Process Overview - Governor's Schools

Appomattox Regional Governor's School

Students select one of eight focus areas for adjudication:

- Dance
- Instrumental Music
- Literary Arts
- Theater Arts /Technical Theater
- Theater Arts Musical
- Technology
- Vocal Music
- Visual Arts

Students are ranked under each category based on their audition recommendations, essay, interview, grades and scores for rigor. Each focus area has their own acceptance and wait list.

Maggie L. Walker Governor's School

Students are ranked numerically by their total composite score consisting of recommendations, essay scores, ability test scores, grades, and rigor. The top qualifying student from each RPS middle school (8) and private sector (1) are offered a slot at MLWGS. The same is true for wait listed students. The remaining slots are selected from the ranked composite score list.



Selection Process

How does the selection process work?

- 1. Students submit applications by December 1st.
- 2. All applications are reviewed for eligibility
- Application Scoring (December to Mid-February)
 - a. Writing components are shared with school teams (de-identified) for double-blind scoring.
 - b. Interviews are scheduled and scored by school or regional teams
 - c. GPA (unweighted) is calculated by Enrollment, Placement, and Planning using school GPA rubrics
 - d. Recommendation scores are calculated automatically using teacher responses
 - e. Regional assessments are scored on campus
- 4. All component scores for each application are loaded into a centralized database. Students are ranked based on composite score and assigned a seat offer, waitlist number, or are deemed not eligible according to individual school rules.
- 5. Students and families receive results online in Enroll RPS in early March.

Equity Commission Proposal - Diversity Goals

Proposal: Create Diversity Goals to Guide Changes to Application and Selection Processes

Create diversity goals to guide specialty school application and enrollment processes. Each specialty school should seek to serve students within plus/minus 5-10 percentage points of the subgroup overall enrollment in the division.*



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Proposal 1 Overview

Proposal: Reconfigure the Specialty School Application Process

"Require a minimum GPA of 2.5 and run a lottery for any applicants who are at or above the minimum. Once the applicant pool is created for qualifying students based on GPA, add a weight for students who are considered Economically Disadvantaged by the state. Add an additional weight for students who attended an elementary or middle school where ED students accounted for the divisionwide school-level average of ED students or higher (e.g., 60% in RPS middle schools, so 60% or higher). Strength of weights should correspond with diversity goals."*

Proposal: Modify the Governor's School Selection Process

"Set an evidence-based minimum criteria score for admission to Governor's schools from RPS (e.g., 70) and enter all students who scored 70 or above in a lottery. Apply the same weights described [above] to RPS Governor's school applicants during the division's lottery selection process."*

Proposal 1 Overview Continued

How would this proposal work?

For specialty school applications, students would still submit applications in Enroll RPS. Once GPA data is available, students would be marked Eligible or Ineligible based on the cutoff. Then, a randomized lottery would run, similar to the process used for open enrollment, to determine seat offers and waitlist order. Implied in this proposal is that other components - interviews, writing, recommendations - would be removed.

For governor's school applications, students would still go through the application process as designed. Once final composite scores are determined, they would enter a lottery, similar to the process for open enrollment, to determine seat offers and waitlist order.



Proposal 2: Allocate Guaranteed Seats for Students from each RPS School and Private School / Homeschool

Similar to the approach implemented by Henrico County Public Schools for 2023-24, allocate a set amount of seats to regional Governor's Schools based on the the number of middle schools across RPS school district plus include the private sector as one entity.

For example, for decades, each RPS middle school has offered a top qualified student a seat to attend Maggie Walker Governor's School. Henrico followed suit. This upcoming school year the Henrico School Board purchased 12 additional seats to be offered to each HCPS middle school therefore promising each school 2 guaranteed seats for qualified students.

RPS has added 30 additional seats at MLWGS within the last 3 years (10 additional seats in each 9th grade class). RPS has 8 middle schools. The proposal would guarantee three qualified students from each middle school and from private schools/homeschool to be offered seats (27). Remaining seats would be awarded to students based on their overall composite score.

*Students would still be required to meet prerequisites for admission.

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Proposal 3 Overview

Economically Disadvantaged Status

In RPS (and Virginia schools), low-socioeconomic students are coded with an economically disadvantaged (ED) status. Per the VDOE, a student who is a member of a household that meets the income eligibility guidelines for free or reduced-price school meals (less than or equal to 185% of Federal Poverty Guidelines). These are students who are eligible for free/reduced meals, receives Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or is eligible for Medicaid. If the student is identified as experiencing homelessness or becomes identified as migrant, at any point during the school year, the student is automatically identified as economically disadvantaged and is also eligible for the Free and Reduced Meals Program*.

Proposal: Allocate a Percentage of Seats to ED Students

A set percentage of total seats would be held for ED students who submitted applications. <u>For example</u>, if 50% of seats were reserved for ED students, and a school has 60 rising 9th grade seats, 30 seats would be held for the highest ranking ED students.

The remaining seats would go to the highest ranking students in the overall pool – regardless of their ED status.

This assumes that the school has not meet the percentage of Economically Disadvantaged students seat offers through higher ranking applicants.
