Superintendent Stockwell states, "Anytime we get an opportunity to showcase our great students and the good work going on across the St. Helens School District, we want to take it. The St. Helens School District will join the other 196 school districts throughout Oregon to celebrate January as "School Board Recognition Month," Superintendent Stockwell announced on Tuesday, January 3, 2023.

"Our school board members spend countless hours of unpaid time working to provide the best possible education for our students," said district Superintendent Stockwell. "They also serve as the corporate board of directors for one of the county's largest employers. Celebrating School Board Recognition Month is one way to say thanks for all they do."

School board members represent their fellow citizens' views and priorities in the complex enterprise of maintaining and running the community's public schools, Stockwell said. They also reinforce the principle of local control over public education, which is an important, highly valued aspect of education in Oregon.

"Too often, the efforts of school board members go unrecognized," Stockwell said. The school board's main goal is to support student achievement," Stockwell added.

To achieve that goal, the board focuses on the following needs:

- Creating a vision for what parents and citizens want their school district to become and how to make student achievement the top priority
- · Setting standards for what students must learn and be able to do
- · Assessing whether schools achieve their goals and whether students are learning
- Accounting for the outcomes of decisions and by tracking progress and reporting results
- · Aligning the use of the district's human and financial resources
- · Creating a safe and orderly climate where students can learn and teachers can teach
- · Collaborating to solve common problems and to support common successes
- Focusing on continuous improvement by questioning, examining, revising, refining, and revisiting issues related to student achievement.



January is School Board Appreciation Month, and we want to take this time to highlight one of our amazing school board members, Kellie Smith.


A resident of Columbia County for most of her life, Kellie Smith is in her third term and 9th year as a St. Helens School District Board Member.

SCHOOL IMMUNIZATION EXCLUSION DAY 2023

School Immunization Exclusion Day is Wednesday, February 15, 2023, and we wanted to remind district families to ensure their student(s) immunizations are up-to-date.

Immunizations are required by state law for children and students in attendance at public and private schools, preschools, childcare facilities, and Head Start programs in Oregon. Nearly every facility that provides care for a child outside of the home requires immunizations or a <u>medical</u> or <u>nonmedical exemption</u> to remain enrolled.

Children who are not current on their immunizations by Wednesday, February 15, 2023, will be excluded from school until their immunizations are updated.
