EXAMINATION OF THE BRITISH EMPIRE

The freshman class began their World History class with a unit on the British Empire. Students have explored the actions taken by the island kingdom across Africa, Asia, and South America as well as the repercussions that continue to affect the daily lives of millions of people. The impact of the British Empire is a polarizing topic of debate around the world that we are fairly sheltered from in the U.S. Through this study, students will gain a better understanding of people groups, perspectives, and conflicts that exist around the world.

HISTORY OF THE AMERICAS: FLORENTINE CODOX

In Mr. Popovski's class, History of the Americas, students are reading the American Historical Association's translation of Bernardino de Sahagun's *Florentine Codex*. The codex contains how the Aztecs viewed the conquest of Mexico. Along with this resource, we will be reading Spanish sources and Cortez's own letters to the king. The purpose of this is to strengthen students' ability to read primary sources and analyze 'cause and effect' in complex historical texts. Discussions in the class center around themes of religion, conquest, and culture clashes.



TOPIC OF DEBATE: THE 1619 PODCAST

Students in the American Studies course are currently working on one of their larger assignments for the semester. A current topic of debate is whether the 1619 Podcast should be nationally banned in high school. The podcast is a series that explains how slavery has transformed America by connecting past events and policies to the present day. For their assignment, students must defend their perspectives by writing an essay.



PSYCHOLOGY: WHY DO WE SLEEP?

Mr. Vivoda's AP Psychology class is continuing to study our various states of consciousness. Currently, students are learning about the science of sleep and are considering several theories on why we dream.






COMPUTER SCIENCE: APP DEVELOPMENT

This month, the AP Computer Science class finished coding their 3rd app. The app is a simplified version of a social media site in which users can like, dislike, and comment on a particular post. This project saw students create variables and develop patterns to affect their values. In the coming weeks, students will learn to create conditionals and functions which they will then apply to upcoming development projects.
