

Third Grade Science Scope & Sequence 2023-24

On going TEKS/Tools To Know:

- 3.1(A) demonstrate safe practices as described in the Texas Education Agency-approved safety standards during classroom and outdoor investigations using safety equipment as appropriate, including safety goggles or chemical splash goggles, and gloves
- 3.1(B) make informed choices in the use and conservation of natural resources by recycling or reusing materials such as paper, aluminum cans, and plastics
- 3.2(A) plan and implement descriptive investigations, including asking and answering questions, making inferences, and selecting and using equipment or technology needed, to solve a specific problem in the natural world
- 3.2(B) collect and record data by observing and measuring using the metric system and recognize differences between observed and measured data
- 3.2(C) construct maps, graphic organizers, simple tables, charts, and bar graphs using tools and current technology to organize, examine, and evaluate measured data

First Nine Weeks

Demonstrate and Explain Force, Motion and Energy

3.6 Force, motion, and energy: The student knows that forces cause change and that energy exists in many forms.

- 3.6(A) explore different forms of energy, including mechanical, light, sound, and thermal in everyday life
- 3.6(B) demonstrate and observe how position and motion can be changed by pushing and pulling objects such as swings, balls, and wagons
- 3.6(C) observe forces such as magnetism and gravity acting on objects

Second Nine Weeks

Describe and Classify Physical Properties of Matter

3.5 Matter and energy: The student knows that matter has measurable physical properties and those properties determine how matter is classified, changed, and used.

- 3.5(A) measure, test, and record physical properties of matter, including temperature, mass, magnetism, and the ability to sink or float
- 3.5(B) describe and classify samples of matter as solids, liquids, and gasses and demonstrate that solids have a definite shape and that liquids and gasses take the shape of their container
- 3.5(C) predict, observe, and record changes in the state of matter caused by heating or cooling such as ice becoming liquid water, condensation forming on the outside of a glass of ice water, or liquid water being heated to the point of becoming water vapor
- 3.5(D) explore and recognize that a mixture is created when two materials are combined such as gravel and sand or metal and plastic paper clips

Third Nine Weeks

Recognize, Compare, and Demonstrate the Relationship of Sun, Earth, and Moon

3.7 Earth and space. The student knows that Earth consists of natural resources and its surface is constantly changing.

3.7(A) explore and record how soils are formed by weathering of rock and the decomposition of plant and animal remains

3.7(B) investigate rapid changes in the Earth's surface such as volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, and landslides

3.7(C) explore the characteristics of natural resources that make them useful in products and materials such as clothing and furniture and how resources may be conserved

3.8 Earth and space. The student knows there are recognizable patterns in the natural world and among objects in the sky

3.8(A) observe, measure, record, and compare day-to-day weather changes in different locations at the same time that include air temperature, wind direction, and precipitation

3.8(B) describe and illustrate the Sun as a star composed of gasses that provides light and thermal energy

3.8(C) construct models that demonstrate the relationship of the Sun, Earth, and Moon, including orbits and positions

3.8(D) identify the planets in Earth's solar system and their position in relation to the Sun

Fourth Nine Weeks

Describe and explain structures and functions of organisms necessary for survival in their environments

3.9 Organisms and environments. The student knows and can describe patterns, cycles, systems, and relationships within the environments

3.9(A) observe and describe the physical characteristics of environments and how they support populations and communities of plants and animals within an ecosystem

3.9(B) identify and describe the flow of energy in a food chain and predict how changes in a food chain affect the ecosystem such as removal of frogs from a pond or bees from a field

3.9(C) describe environmental changes such as floods and droughts where some organisms thrive and others perish or move to new locations

3.10 Organisms and environments. The student knows that organisms undergo similar life processes and have structures that help them survive within their environments

3.10(A) explore how structures and functions of plants and animals allow them to survive in a particular environment

3.10(B) investigate and compare how animals and plants undergo a series of orderly changes in their diverse life cycles such as tomato plants, frogs, and lady beetles
