Important Information

Absences EXCUSED/UNEXCUSED Students that regularly miss school are at heightened risk for falling behind academically. Parents/guardians should make every effort to ensure students are in school daily. Student absences will be excused for the following reasons: illness, doctor appointment, family emergency, death in the immediate family, concern for the student's safety and observance of a religious holiday and concern for the student's mental, emotional, or physical health or safety. For information regarding vacations, please see Extended Absences below. Parents/guardians must provide a reason for all absences. If no reason is given, the absence will be unexcused.

Extended Absences Up to 10 Days Parents/guardians may request an extended absence from school for their student for up to 10 days. Requests must be made to the building principal in writing at least a week prior to the extended absence for approval. If the parent/guardian fails to request an extended absence for up to 10 days and their student is not in school, those days will be unexcused.

Extended Absences in Excess of 10 Day Only in rare cases will an absence in excess of 10 days be excused. Requests for extended absence in excess of 10 days must be made to the Superintendent in writing at least a week prior to the extended absence for approval.

Extended Absences in Excess of 3 Weeks Parents/guardians requesting an extended absence in excess of three weeks will be required to withdraw their student from school. Parents/guardians are highly encouraged to consider homeschooling their student or enrolling them in another school pursuant to Illinois' Compulsory School Attendance laws.

Chronic Absenteeism and Chronic Truancy The Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) defines chronic absenteeism as absences in excess of 10% of total school days. In Palos 118, students are considered chronically absent if they miss more than 17 days of school. Palos 118 is required to report all students missing 17 total days or more of school (both excused and unexcused absences) to ISBE as chronically absent.

Illinois defines chronic truancy as missing 9 or more days of school unexcused. Palos 118 is required to report students missing 9 or more days of school unexcused to the South Cook Intermediate Service Center (ISC) as chronically truant. ISC can investigate all students reported as chronically truant.

Absence Make-up Work Parents of students who are absent from school due to illness may request make-up work prior to 10 a.m. by calling the school office. In the event that a child is ill for 2 days or longer, it is strongly recommended that parents call the office and request make-up work. Homework may be picked up in the school office from dismissal until 4 p.m. (East & West) and 3:45 p.m. (South). A student who is excused from school attendance shall have the equivalent opportunity to make up any examination, study, or work requirements which he/she missed during the excused absence (schedule to be determined by the teacher).

Vacation Make-up Work Academic success is dependent upon regular student attendance. Parents are encouraged to plan family vacations when school is not in session. It is impossible to replicate the classroom experience by virtue of make-up classwork. Class discussions and conceptual development cannot be made up through missed assignments. Should it be impossible to schedule vacation without impacting the school schedule, the teacher will provide make-up work upon the student's return to class. Students will be given the same number of days to complete make-up work as the number of days out of school for vacation.

Tardiness In the event that a child arrives late to school, a parent/guardian must accompany the child to the office.

Telephone Use Except in cases of special emergencies, parents are asked not to telephone their children at school. If any emergency arises at school, children are given permission to use the school telephone.

Gifts Collection of money for the purpose of purchasing gifts for school personnel is discouraged.

Recess (Elementary Schools) Students will go outside for recess unless the temperature (with the wind chill factor) is below 15 degrees, or other circumstances such as playground conditions or precipitation require students to remain indoors. Please dress your child appropriately.

School Visitors and Parents School security procedures require that all visitors and parents must request admittance to the school through the office. Parents who desire to observe their child in class should make arrangements with the school principal. Classroom visitation procedures are also clarified in board policy 6:122. School offices have locked entrances and a buzzer intercom and camera system.

- All parents/visitors are required to have a picture ID such as a driver's license or state-issued ID.
- All parents/visitors must identify the purpose of their visit. An appointment must be made in advance by contacting the building administrator to observe a classroom, attend a conference, or meet with a teacher.
- All parents/visitors will be required to wear a visitor badge and lanyard while in the school. The staff has been instructed to direct any unidentified visitor to the office.
- All parents/visitors are limited to the pre-approved purpose for their visit and should not visit classrooms, engage students in conversation, or tour the building.
- At the conclusion, visitors/parents must return to the office, sign out, and return their visitor badge.

CHAIN OF COMMAND When questions, concerns, or interests regarding your child's progress or school program arise, please address them properly by contacting the classroom teacher first. If questions or concerns remain, it is inappropriate to contact the building principal. If there are still unresolved concerns, contact the superintendent of schools.

SCHOOL CLOSINGS District 118 will utilize an automated calling system to call home, cell and/or work phone numbers in the event of a school closing. School closings are also listed on the district website and the Emergency Closing Center website www.emergencyclosings.com.

LATE START OF SCHOOL/ WEATHER DELAY Palos 118 may also declare a one hour late start option to provide an additional solution for poor weather situations and parents will be notified with an automated phone message. A late start schedule delays all school and bus operations by one hour. Students report to their bus stops one hour later and schools begin one hour later.

LATE START WEDNESDAYS With the exception of the first and last week of school all students will start 30 minutes later on Wednesdays. For detailed times, go to www.palos118.org/latestartwed.

SKYWARD PARENT PORTAL Palos South parents and students have access to grades and attendance through a secured parent portal. Parents and students will receive individual usernames and passwords. The usernames and passwords are given to all parents and students entering sixth grade, or those new to the district. Please contact the district office (448-4800) if you do not receive a username and password by the end of your child's first month of school.

REQUIRED PHYSICAL EXAMS AND IMMUNIZATIONS

Physical Exam and Immunizations Illinois State Law requires each public school student to present proof of physical examination and immunization upon entering school at kindergarten or at the first grade level, when transferring to a new school, and at the sixth grade level. School District 118 will exclude children on the first day of school only until such time as proof of physical examinations and immunizations are presented. The

Department of Public Health requires evidence of immunity against Poliomyelitis, Diphtheria, Tetanus, Whooping Cough, Measles (Rubeola) Rubella (German or 3-day measles), Mumps, Chicken Pox, Hemophilus Influenza, Pneumococcal Disease, Meningococcal Conjugate, and Hepatitis. If there are objections on religious grounds, the Illinois Certificate of Religious Exemption to Required Immunizations must be completed and signed by parent and child's health care provider responsible for performing the child's health exam. If the physical condition of a child precludes immunizations on medical grounds, the examining physician must indicate the reasons.

Dental Exam Illinois State Law requires each public school student to present proof of dental exam by May 15 of current school year at the kindergarten, second, and sixth grade levels.

Vision Exam Illinois State Law requires eye exams within one year prior to entering kindergarten starting in the fall, and for students entering a school in Illinois for the first time. Proof of the required vision examination by an optometrist or ophthalmologist must be submitted by October 15 of current school year.

Physical Exams, Interscholastic Athletics The Illinois State Board of Education requires all students who participate in interscholastic athletics to have an annual physical examination. The proper form must be completed and returned prior to the first day of tryouts. Forms are available at South and on the website.

Vision and Hearing Screening School health personnel perform vision and hearing screening of students. The parents of a child may request a screening at any time. Vision screening will be done, as mandated, for the following children: Preschool, kindergarten, second grade, eighth grade, special education, teacher referrals, and new students during the current school year. Hearing screening will be done as mandated, for the following children: Preschool, kindergarten, first, second, third, special education, teacher referrals, and new students during the current school year. Vision and hearing screenings are not substitutes for a complete eye and ear examination by an appropriate doctor. Your child will not be required to undergo this VISION screening if an optometrist or ophthalmologist has completed and signed a report form indicating that an examination has been administered within the previous 12 months and that an evaluation is on file at the school. Your child will not be required to undergo this HEARING screening if an audiologist has completed and signed a report form indicating that an examination has been administered within the previous 12 months and that evaluation is on file at the school. This notice is not a permission to test and is not required to be returned. Vision and hearing screening is not an option. If a vision or hearing examination report is not on file at the school for your child, your child in the mandated age/grade/group will be screened.

MEDICATIONS IN SCHOOL Medication for students remains the responsibility of parents and should, if at all possible, be given at home. For required medication during the regular school day, these steps must be followed:

1. Written orders from a physician detailing the name of the drug, dosage, and time interval must be provided on the district's form. Orders must be renewed annually.
2. The parent/guardian must complete the school district's form requesting that the school comply with the physician's orders.
3. Medication must be brought to school in a container appropriately labeled by the pharmacy or the physician.
4. Palos 118 retains the authority to reject complex requests for administration of medication.
5. Direct communication with the health office is essential for full comprehension of the student's medical needs.
6. Cough drops and throat lozenges can only be brought from home and used by students if written

parental permission is provided to school nurse.

SPECIAL EDUCATION AND STUDENT SERVICE School District 118, in accordance with state and federal mandates, supports the rights of all children with disabilities to a free, appropriate public education. Students may qualify for special education services if they are determined to have a disability that is adversely impacting their educational performance and are in need of a specially designed instructional program to succeed in school. A continuum of instructional programs and services are available to eligible students who have a disability that impacts their ability to benefit from standard educational programming as determined by an Eligibility Conference and an Individual Education Plan (IEP) Conference. Special Education programs and services are offered directly through the school district or in conjunction with Southwest Cook County Cooperative for Special Education. A copy of the rules and regulations that govern the Administration and Operation of Special Education can be attained from the Student Services Department or by written request to: Illinois Office of Education, 100 North First Street, Springfield, IL 60277.

PRESCHOOL SCREENINGS School District 118 conducts free preschool screenings for children who are 3, 4, and 5 years of age. The purpose of the preschool screening is to assess a child's general development and detect any delays in vision, hearing, motor, cognitive, social emotional, and/or speech and language development areas. Children identified through the screening process as being at risk for learning and/or behavioral difficulties may be referred for a special education evaluation. Members of the Student Services Team conduct the screenings and will provide feedback to the parents as to their child's performance. The screening takes about 45 minutes. Preschool screenings will be held multiple times during the school year. For further information, please contact the Student Services Department at 708-761-5807.

Children from birth to three years of age whose parents and/or physicians suspect significant physical or developmental delays may be eligible for an evaluation and/or intervention services through the Illinois Child and Family Services Program. For further information on birth to three screenings, please contact Student Services at 708-761-5807.

ENGLISH LEARNER SERVICES School District 118 offers opportunities for English Learners to develop high levels of English proficiency and academic achievement by providing supports to attain grade level content and meet state standards that all students are expected to meet. English Learner Services include Transitional Bilingual Education (TBE) in Arabic, Polish and Spanish and Transitional Program of Instruction in English for all other languages.

Palos 118 is mandated to assess progress of language proficiency of all English Learners annually. English Learners are administered ACCESS which assesses students' English in the domains of Listening, Speaking, Reading, and Writing. Parents/Guardian of English Learners are notified of their child's placement in EL services and English proficiency progress. Parents/Guardians have the opportunity to provide input and feedback on EL services by joining the Bilingual Parent Advisory Committee (BPAC).

COMPUTER AND INTERNET USE All District 118 schools offer technology tools and online resources to support student learning. Students in grades four through eight are provided with personal network

passwords and space to save individual work on our file servers. Use of our network services, including access to the Internet is supervised and subject to the provisions of our District 118 Acceptable Use Policy. This can be viewed online. Please refer to the District 118 Board of Education policy explained in its entirety in Policy 6:235, Access to Electronic Networks.

TRANSPORTATION Students in grades K-8 who live 1-1/2 miles or more from their attendance center receive free bus service. This service is also available to students who attend kindergarten and who live in Illinois Dept. of Transportation approved hazardous walking areas. Parents who qualify for bus service will receive information in the mail prior to the school year. Call the transportation department at (708) 448-4405.

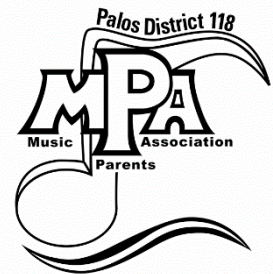
