Superintendent's Message

As we turn the corner into 2018, we find ourselves looking ahead. We have had much to celebrate so far this school year, including:

- outstanding learning experiences in and out of the classroom tremendous musical and dramatic performances and artistic endeavors
- fierce athletic competitions heartfelt community service projects valuable professional learning opportunities for staff
- the day to day hard work that makes success possible for our students a special 50th anniversary for the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District.

We also know that many more exciting opportunities lie ahead of us before the end of June!

As we begin the new year, we encourage all our students to work hard and make the most of every learning opportunity, and push themselves to do their very best. We appreciate and ask for the continued support of our families and community as we promote these goals. Our entire staff continues to model this spirit of hard work and continuous improvement by committing to their own professional learning. For example, many of our teachers continue to participate in Learning Walks; opportunities to visit classrooms in other area schools and learn new strategies from grade level and subject area colleagues. Likewise, Midlakes teachers host these same opportunities for our neighbors, so they can learn from the great work going on in our classrooms. The professional dialogue that stems from these visits continues to benefit our students by contributing to new and innovative practices.

On March 16, the Midlakes staff will participate in a Regional Conference Day for the second consecutive year; this time with the Naples and Marcus Whitman School Districts, and focus on the theme of "Connecting for Kids". George Couros, a well-known educational consultant and author of The Innovator's Mindset, will deliver the keynote address and two additional breakout sessions, while staff members from all three districts will lead additional workshops to share best practices for advancing the learning and overall success of students. Regional collaboration enables us to maximize resources to make the best possible professional development opportunities available to our staff. We are proud of our educators for their growth mindset and their commitment to learning and adapting to meet the unique needs of our students.

Meanwhile, the district leadership team has begun the careful process of developing the proposed budget for the 2018-2019 school year. The district has been fortunate over the past several years, through the restoration of state funding, to be able to rebuild programs and expand opportunities for our students. Forecasts related to the 2018-2019 New York State budget are not as promising and there is significant uncertainty regarding anticipated state aid to schools. The district leadership team and Board of Education are dedicated to the strategic development of a 2018-2019 school budget that meets the social, emotional, and academic needs of our students while being respectful and responsible with our community's financial resources. We remain hopeful and will continue to lobby for fair and equitable state funding, but we will also be prepared to make difficult decisions in the best interests of our students. As always, we will be guided by the vision and mission of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District:

Application and details are available in the district office and on our website at www.midlakes.org under the District tab. Applications are due by November 1. Alumni selected for this honor will be recognized at a special Graduates of Distinction event next spring. Nominees to the Midlakes Graduates of Distinction program shall be selected based upon the following criteria:

- 1. Nominees must have graduated from Midlakes High School at least 15 years before they are eligible for selection. The committee may waive the graduation time limit requirement in certain circumstances, as it deems necessary.
- 2. Significant achievement after attending Midlakes High School which include:
 - a. Educational achievements
 - b. Professional achievements
 - c. Job related achievements
 - d. Honors, awards, professional affiliations, publications
 - e. Civic or community involvement
 - f. Other appropriate qualifications which the committee believes merit consideration
- 3. Guidelines for selection include:
 - a. Should be of high moral character
 - b. Should be a graduate of Midlakes High School
 - c. Committee could take into consideration candidates who have contributed to the school or community in a significant way as an honorary inductee even though the candidate may not have graduated from Midlakes

SENIOR TRIP - WASHINGTON, DC

On November 18, eighty-five students and fifteen chaperones boarded two luxury buses for the trip of a lifetime. A tradition for over forty years at Midlakes High School, the Senior Trip to Washington, D.C. offers

its participants four busy, fun-filled days to visit monuments, museums and places of interest in our nation's capital. The purpose of the trip is also academic; students learned about many of the



places and attractions on the trip's itinerary and would be able to now see and experience them in person.

The four-day adventure began on Saturday, when students arrived at school at 5 a.m. for check-in and breakfast. After a brief lunch stop in Pennsylvania, the first item on the itinerary was an afternoon tour of Arlington National Cemetery followed by a stop at the Air Force Memorial. Unanticipated bus trouble and heavy traffic prevented the group from making its appointment for a wreath-laying at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, but the group was able to have dinner and shop before checking into their hotel.

Sunday began with a guided bus tour of Old Town Alexandria, Virginia, where students were able to see Robert E. Lee's birthplace, as well as the church where George Washington worshipped with his family, among other locations associated with moments in our nation's history. A visit to the World War II Memorial, a photo opportunity in front of the White House, a narrated tour of the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, a stop for lunch and shopping at Union Station, a tour of the United States Holocaust Museum, and visits to the Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Thomas Jefferson and Martin Luther King, Jr. memorials completed the afternoon's agenda. An evening visit to the Vietnam, Lincoln, Korean War, Einstein and Pentagon 9/11 Memorials capped a long day of tour stops.

Monday began with a scenic drive along the George Washington Parkway for a guided tour of Mount Vernon, George Washington's home, which still operates as a working farm. After visiting Mount Vernon the group headed back into Washington for a stop at the White House Visitors' Center, a drive along Embassy Row and a guided tour of Washington National Cathedral. In the evening the group enjoyed a dinner and dancing cruise along the Potomac River on the Spirit of Washington. On Tuesday, the final day of the trip, the day began with a tour of the US Capitol building, as well as stops and group photos at the Library of Congress and US Supreme Court buildings. Lunch and time to explore the many Smithsonian museums followed. After that the two buses headed north to return to the place where the adventure had begun just four days earlier. Students and chaperones would agree that another successful trip was enjoyed by all who chose to partake in the adventure.

PERSONALIZED LEARNING AT MIDLAKES

The innovative practice of personalized learning is growing at Midlakes! Twelve teachers signed up last year to start transforming their curriculum and their classrooms to better fit the needs of their students. Twenty-one more teachers joined this year for a total of thirty-four teachers working to personalize learning for their students.

Midlakes High Students partner with the Canandaigua VA

Serving our Veterans While Enhancing their Education

For the past 15 years, Midlakes Teacher Nicole (Nikki) Young and other Midlakes Staff have brought students from their High School Work Experience Program to the Canandaigua VA Medical Center at Christmas time. 2017 was no exception. On December 11th, the Program of 9th and 10th graders came to the Voluntary Service Office at the VA to assemble and wrap presents for the 150+ Veterans who reside at the Medical Center.

Through the generosity of donations and many contributors, the Voluntary Service Office each year selects items for the Veteran Residents as gifts for Christmas. This year the gifts included a patriotic bag, filled with personal care items. The Students from the Work Experience Program were then tasked with the assembly and wrapping of each. With just a lunch break (and a treat), the group was able to accomplish the task in less than 4 hours, and then took a short walking tour around the Campus.

The Work Experience Program at Midlakes began in 2003, and is comprised of three (3) components: Academic, Vocational, and Independent Living Skills. The philosophy of the program is that work experience assists young adults in making the transition from a student to a member of the working world. It provides the student with experiences that will enable them to gain confidence, selfrespect, and the ability to cope and grow with the changing world. The grade 9-10 students that participated at the Canandaigua VA also assist on a regular basis at the Coffee Shop Café at Midlakes. Students that continue in the Program into grades 11 and 12 can also earn hours toward a special credential with their diploma, by being placed in the Community. A number of those students are currently working in area Hospitals, grocery stores, and other locations as part of the program, in addition to the standard classroom education they are receiving in English and the other traditional subjects.

Red Ribbon Contest Winners at Midlakes

National Red Ribbon Week was celebrated from October 23rd-31st. The first Red Ribbon Campaign was organized in 1988 by community neighborhoods in response to the way drug abuse was destroying families and neighborhoods. Since that time, the campaign has grown, reaching millions of youth and their families in the United States. Red Ribbon Week commemorates the ultimate sacrifice made by Drug Enforcement Agent Enrique 'Kiki' Camarena, who worked undercover in Mexico investigating a drug cartel believed to include officers from the Mexican army, police, and government officials. His investigation led to the discovery of an eight-billion-dollar marijuana manufacturing operation in Mexico. The cartel sought revenge, and on February 7th, 1985, Special Agent Camarena and his pilot Captain Zavala-Avelar, were both tortured and murdered.



To honor these men, individuals wore red ribbons, the symbol for drug prevention and reduction of drug sales. The U.S. Congress proclaimed the first National Red Ribbon Week in October 1988. Since then, the Red Ribbon is worn each October to bring awareness to alcohol, tobacco, and other drug and violence prevention.

This year, the Council on Alcoholism and Addiction of the Finger Lakes held a contest to celebrate Red Ribbon Week. Students were asked to complete a 10-question quiz and submit it to the Council. Any students who received a score of 100% on the quiz were entered into a drawing. There were over 300 students who received the score of 100% and were eligible to win one of the four prizes. Two Midlakes students won prizes; Madison Bowman (10th grade) won the first-place prize, a Dell laptop, and Alexis Lolis (7th grade) won the 3rd place prize, a \$100 gift card. The students were presented with their prizes by the director of the Council, Tim VanDame, on Friday, December 1st. Congratulations to both winners!

DIGITAL CITIZENSHIP

The class wrote letters to their families and other Midlakes classrooms asking for monetary donations to raise money for their Trees for Troops project. The students also had



Trees for Troops jars at home. The kids worked hard doing chores at home to raise additional funds for their cause. With the donations they received, they were able to box up thirty-four live trees to send to soldiers serving overseas. The students in Mrs. Maslyn's class, along with the students in Mrs. Catchman's kindergarten class, Miss Smith's 2nd grade student council and residents at Ashton Place made ornaments for the trees. The kids also wrote notes to our military heroes. Ornaments

and notes were sent with the trees in hopes of spreading a little holiday cheer from home. This year, the Trees for Troops ran into a snag due to new regulations, apparently issued on Nov. 27, that tightened restrictions for certain military posts, notably scaling back the maximum size of packages that would be allowed. But tree



farmers who have coordinated these programs for the past decade were not aware. Neither were the postal workers, who accepted the trees and payment. Mrs. Maslyn was notified that some

of the trees did not make it their destinations. However, the class was happy to hear that many of their trees did.

The class received letters of thanks and pictures from some of the recipients of the trees. The letters expressed messages such as "Words do not even begin to express how touched and thankful I am ", "What a wonderful surprise it was to get a little piece of the U.S.A. to spread the Christmas cheer for our soldiers here. The notes from the students brought smiles to each and every one of us, and we sincerely appreciate everything!", and "Thank



you for the tree, ornaments and notes! It means so much to all of us to know we are in the hearts of fellow Americans back home."

2017 Midlakes Fall Athletics in Review

The boys varsity volleyball team went 16-5, with a 10-0 record in the league, cruising to another league title. This team enjoyed playing together and was an entertaining group to watch. The team had 10 players receive all-league honors. The athletes selected for first-team honors were Devin Kelly, Caleb Delgado, Cory Braden, Maverick Coryell, and Josh Delgado. Second-team honors went to Harrison Day, Ben Jansen, Isaiah Delgado, Brandon MacDonell, and Matt Crouch. The boys team average was well above 90, making them a scholar athlete team.

The girls varsity volleyball team was a young group this year, with only 2 seniors on the team. They finished out the season 8-14. This team was full of grit and determination, and the players worked hard to get better during each practice. The team had an exciting victory over Franklin in the first round of sectionals to move on before dropping a heartbreaker to a familiar Finger Lakes League rival, Waterloo. Lydia Day received first team all-league honors. Paige Siganowich, an exceptional senior nominee, also received an honorable mention all-league selection. Holly Shoemaker was also recognized as an exceptional senior. This group of girls had the second highest team GPA among the teams at Midlakes, and will be recognized as a scholar athlete team.

This year's girls varsity swim team came into the season pumped up and ready to go. The girls made every meet an edge-of-your-seat thrill ride, finishing with a record of 5 and 4. Their hard work and dedication paid off, as ten swimmers qualified for sectionals. Abby Schoenfelder, Hazel Kettelkamp, Bailey Mahoney, Erynne Garver, Cecelia Harris-Maxwell, Emma Curran, Sarah Socha, Emily Meissner, Kennady Perri, and Maggie Mahoney qualified for the sectionals held in Victor, and they put it all on the line. Abby Schoenfelder set a new school record in the 200-meter freestyle. She also received 1st team all-league honors in the 100 meter freestyle and the Ross Nelson Outstanding Swimmer award for the Finger Lakes. The swim team had the highest overall GPA among Midlakes fall sports teams and will be recognized as a scholar athlete team. Outside the pool, the girls gave back to the community in many ways. They acted as mentors and helped young swimmers improve. They took the time to give back to the community by painting the interior of the YMCA to give it a fresh new look. The girls' modified team showed some true grit in rolling with some scheduling difficulties.

This year's varsity football team started out with high participation levels. The players worked hard in the off season, taking advantage of open weight room hours in the morning and the afternoon. The linemen worked hard, going to a lineman camp that Utica put on early in the summer. The team also participated in a few offseason day camps at Red Jacket. The varsity football team held an event in which youth football



players had the opportunity to practice with the varsity players and see whatit was like to go through practice with older partners. The younger players were also presented with jerseys that they

could take home with them at the end of the day. The varsity team was also very visible at the modified team's games, cheering the

younger players on. The team had seven scholarathletes (players with average grade percentages above 90). Trevor Milliman received first-team all-league honors as a tight end and second-team all-league honors as a defender. Alex Hayes and Jeb Bassett (as linemen),



Linwood Carswell (as a running back), Collin LeGault and Matt Mattoon (as defensive backs) also received second-team all-league honors. Jacob Maslyn, Bryce Burri, Jordan Maher, Connor Young, and Jacob Borrelli received all-league honorable mention. This group of kids includes a nice young core of players who will be back and ready to go next year.

On the girls varsity soccer team, 9 players were scholar-athletes this year. This team was very active, playing in multiple tournaments and travel games over the summer to get ready for the season. The team also participated in a pre-season clinic that helped prepare players from multiple levels improve as soccer players. This season, they finished 3rd in the Finger Lakes East and ranked 9th in Class B with an overall record of 8-8. Macy Kisner and Hannah Galloway received second-team all-league honors. Jordan Naeye, Cara Walker, and Claire DeBoover, were selected for third-team all-league honors. Trinity Maestre received honorable-mention in the Finger Lakes East.

The boys varsity soccer team was able to grab three wins and one hard fought tie this season. The team had a great mix of players who were willing to do whatever it took to help the team improve. The team had eight scholar-athletes who will be recognized by the state for having an average grade percentage above 90. Marshall Wasman and Dan VanNostrand were selected as first-team all-league players in the Finger Lakes. Josh Tubbs was selected for second-team all-league honors, and Jaden Presher received honorable mention. Marshall Wasman, Dan VanNostrand, and Lucas Smith were also selected to play in the Exceptional Senior soccer game held at Mynderse. The boys modified soccer team picked up steam at the end of the season, capitalizing on some major improvements

to pick up a few key wins. This year, both the boys and girls cross-country teams were recognized as scholar-athlete teams. Combined these teams had 14 athletes whose average grade percentages were above 90, including one athlete with a 99.14 average. The boys team had 10 wins on the season and after



finishing 13th at the league championships on their home course, they improved and finished 11th a week later at sectionals. The girls'team finished the season with 9 wins. On its home course for the league championships, they came in 12th, but improved to 9th place a week later at sectionals. The boys modified team placed 8th at leagues with an average time of 13 minutes and 54 seconds. The girls modified team placed 3rd at leagues with an average time of 14 minutes, 43 seconds. The girls tennis team held its own this year, with a 5-6 overall record. The girls played competitively throughout the season and lost some close matches. Makenzie Kommer was seeded 4th going into sectionals and managed a third-place finish, thus earning the right to enter the State Qualifying Tournament. After playing a four-hour match in the first round of that tournament, she defeated her opponent in three sets. Nine of the girls on the tennis team had overall grade percentages above a 90, making them scholar-athletes. The team's many seniors will be missed next year.

Four varsity cheerleaders were recognized as scholar-athletes this fall. The girls took second at the Pal-Mac Cheerleading Competition. The team also improved its scores with each competition, leading to a great deal of progress over the season. They took 6th place at sectionals. Savannah Darling competed for a spot in the Eddie Meath All-Star game at Gates-Chili High School, eventually earning a spot due to her determination and hard work.

The boys varsity golf team had seven wins this year and one tie. Four of the team's players will be honored as scholar-athletes. Nick Smith and Lucas Garver qualified to compete in the Finger Lakes League Championships. Nick Smith also finished in the top 10 to qualify to compete in sectionals this spring. The golf team had some exciting matches that came down to a few putts.

COLLEGE APPLICATIONS & FINANCIAL AID: By this point in the year your college applications and your financial aid forms should be completed. If you are still planning on applying to colleges, visit school-specific websites for details about the admission process. If you have not yet completed your financial aid, please go to www.fafsa.gov to apply for federal student aid. There is a link that will take you to the TAP application for NYS aid, as well. If you missed that link, you may go to www.hesc.ny.gov for NYS TAP information. Some colleges may also require the CSS Profile. If they do, more information can be found at css.collegeboard.org. Please note that unlike other financial aid forms, there is a fee to file the CSS Profile.

<u>SCHOLARSHIPS</u>: Be sure to apply for any scholarship opportunity that you may qualify for! Listen to announcements, check the postings in PSO, and/or visit our website (www.midlakes.org/webpages/hspso) to review local scholarships. Other sources to look for scholarships include websites, like www.fastweb.com, employers or parent's employers, churches and any groups you or your parents belong to. Final deposits for colleges are typically due by May 1st. Get your financial aid applications done early so you can compare the cost of each college and consider making a final visit before making your final decision. Keep your grades up! Colleges request a final transcript!
