TRANSITIONAL KINDERGARTEN PROGRAM BEGINS AT MIDLAKES

Midlakes Elementary School welcomes its first students into the 'Extra Step' program.

Midlakes Elementary School has launched a transitional Kindergarten program to support young children born between September and New York State's December 1 cutoff date for Kindergarten.

The full-day program, called Extra Step, provides these children with a year to prepare for Kindergarten. Like kindergartners, they learn about reading, writing, and math. They also get to go to the library, attend art, music, and physical education classes. They go to school assemblies and get to play outside.

The curriculum incorporates academics into play-based activities, said Cheryl Fisher,

a former pre-school and Kindergarten teacher who is the lead teacher of the program.

"We are geared towards getting them ready for Kindergarten and giving them that solid foundation," she said. "It is designed to help children gain some maturity and gain some confidence."

For example, students sing songs while reviewing the days of the week. They count with each scoop it takes to fill a bucket with sand. A schedule on the wall lists times for weather, reading, social studies, movement, small group lessons, and more.

Fisher, along with teaching assistant Jane Westfall, works with children on social-emotional skills, sharing, using "whole body listening," and what it means to be a good classmate.

WELCOME TO THE NEW SCHOOL YEAR

Everyone must remain involved to make 2019-2020 a success.

On behalf of the Board of Education and the entire staff of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District, welcome to the 2019-2020 school year.

The official opening of school brought a lot of excitement, but the work of kicking off a successful year started long before students returned to campus on Thursday, Sept. 5.

One of the many areas our staff has rallied around is the new K-6 administrative structure announced last spring. About 40 elementary teachers and staff came together as part of a K-6 Transitional Committee to increase communication, better align curriculum, and reshape how Midlakes Elementary School will best serve students and their families.

With the generous support of our community, we added a counselor at the Elementary School to work in the newly created Pupil Support Office. New teaching positions help us meet the enrollment growth of our youngest students. We established a transitional kindergarten program and added an assistant principal to support the leadership of the Elementary School.

These additions help better support the entire student population with an increased focus on social-emotional well-

ness and academic support.

The structure mirrors what was already in place at the secondary (7-12) grade levels. Also, we believe the new structure will help students and parents as they transition to seventh grade, where the systems and supports will be similar.

Internal teams are collaborating in other areas. For example, a committee of about 40 teachers and staff are working to revise and enhance literacy curriculum across grade levels to meet the New York State's Next Generation Learning Standards.

There's also a concentrated effort on K-5 English Language Arts, which includes the implementation of a new reading and writing program and a family literacy night in December at the Elementary School.

Our work to support all students and get at the issues that hinder their success is the focus of the Systems of Support Committee. Ali Hearn of the Midwest Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports Network met with staff over the summer to increase the District's capacity to prevent behaviors that interfere with learning, promote a positive learning environment and better assess the impact of both on the social

and academic success of all students.

On September 3, we welcomed teachers and staff back with two days of interactive professional development opportunities highlighted by an inspiring talk by staff developer and former teacher Jack Berckemeyer on how humor and optimism can build impactful relationships and successful student outcomes.

While we've already made strides in these areas we must maintain the momentum by encouraging everyone to stay involved. We have a caring and committed staff who go above and beyond to help our students. We are grateful for their support and the support we feel from the community.

Our efforts cannot stop here. We encourage parents and guardians to remain involved and invested in their student's work and pull in the same direction as our teachers and staff to help every student reach their educational potential.

PORTAL OPENS FOR RESERVING SPACES

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District has created an online Facility Use Portal to expand the use of existing school spaces and athletics fields among the community.

The District launched the portal on Midlakes.org to allow residents, community organizations, staff, and others to reserve various school spaces, athletic fields and other areas on campus.

The portal takes visitors through a step-by-step process for registering a

new account, to submit a facility use request, and view the availability of spaces on campus.

School-based activities will take precedence over all other requests.

Any requested use of the district's facilities must comply with state law and district regulations.

Also, those approved to use school facilities assume responsibility for the conduct of both participants and spectators and must carry comprehensive

insurance coverage.

District policy requires a custodian to be present for any request taking place outside of normal school hours.

Should a custodian be needed, the user group is required to pay for this service. Other fees may apply.

COUNTY TREASURER HANDLING TAX PAYMENTS

The Ontario County Treasurer has partnered with the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District to offer expanded hours of service and collect payments of school taxes, which began during the first week of September.

District residents may work with the Ontario County Treasurer or visit Community Bank branches in Clifton Springs and Phelps to pay school taxes.

The school district is no longer collecting tax payments.

The partnership with the Ontario County Treasurer, which already collects taxes for several school districts, streamlines the process for the District while improving access to tax information and extending the hours of

service to property owners.

School taxes are due on September 30. School taxes paid in October are subject to a 2% penalty.

Taxes paid between November 1 and November 15 can only be paid at the County Treasurer's office, and will include a 3% penalty and a 5% Treasurer's fee. Taxes not paid by November are re-levied.

The Ontario County Treasurer's Office is open from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, excluding holidays.

PLANNING A BRIGHT FUTURE INVOLVES EVERYONE

In the coming weeks, the Board of Education will present a capital improvement plan to the community for its input and approval. This investment in our campus is the first step in what we hope will be a multi-year, multi-project strategic plan.

Planning for this project began just about a year ago with the hiring of the District's new architectural firm, Edge Architecture. Edge immediately went to work on a Building Condition Survey to

guide the Board and district administrators during our initial decision-making process.

The survey took a thorough look at our entire campus to identify and prioritize areas needing attention. We then began identifying various buckets – or broad categories of work – we wanted to address in this project through discussions with the Board's Facilities Committee and district administrators.

The ideas behind these categories came from years of conversations with parents, teachers, and community stakeholders and include mechanical upgrades to HVAC and boiler systems, student drop-off and visitor parking enhancements at the Elementary School, High School music room upgrades, moving the Middle School cafeteria closer to the kitchen, and adding a fueling station for our transportation department.

Once we agreed on our buckets, we shared the plan for wider input. The Board invited several community members to serve on an advisory

committee. The committee was comprised of parents, teachers, administrators, volunteers, coaches, and retirees. Walk-through meetings were held in late spring and early summer to introduce our ideas and gather feedback.

A public meeting was held in the auditorium to gather more feedback, answer questions, and introduce our plan

to a broader audience. The idea behind all of these meetings was to ensure that we were on the right path.

After many months of planning, we are now heading towards a vote. We have also scheduled meetings and are accepting further feedback to answer your questions on the project.

I'm certain one of your first questions on the proposal relates to its financial impact. We are pleased to share with our community how our \$15.6 million capital project will have no additional impact on local taxes.

We are also very proud of the collaborative process that brought us to this point. But our work is not over. We look forward to answering your questions and hope you share in the excitement that we have in this project.

Also, on behalf of the Board of Education and the District, we'd like to thank committee members, community stakeholders, and our administrators for their work on this capital project and continued support of our students.

Thank you for trusting us to ensure that our District is focused on what's best for everyone.

CAPITAL PROJECT OVERVIEW

SETTING THE STAGE FOR SUCCESS

Residents of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District will have the opportunity to provide further input on a capital project designed to address a wide-range of facility needs across Midlakes schools.

The \$15.6 million project currently consists of prioritized items identified with the assistance of a Facilities Committee comprised of community members and a Building Condition Survey required every five years by the State Education Department.

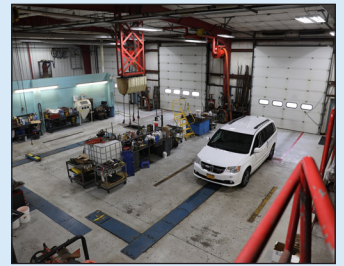

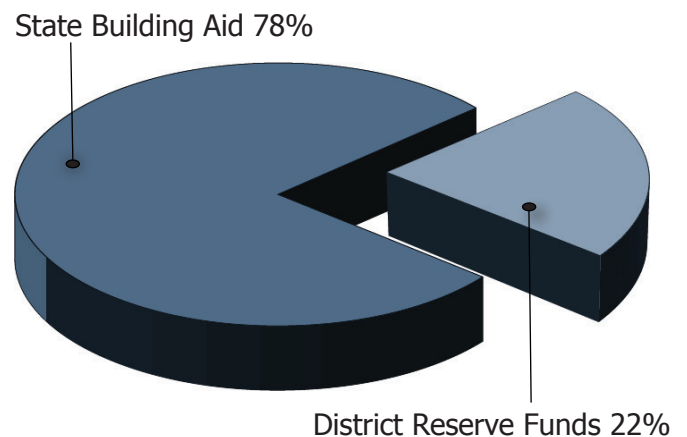

MIDLAKES HALL OF

Three former student-athletes known for outstanding athletic success and incredible dedication to athletics in the community were recognized during the Midlakes Athletics Hall of Fame 19th annual induction ceremony held in front of family, friends and sports boosters.

The Midlakes Athletics Hall of Fame Committee inducted Don Russo, posthumously, Liz (Donk) Lewis, and Aaron Hoven during a banquet on Friday, Sept. 20 at the Clifton Springs Country Club.

Inductees were also honored during Midlakes Homecoming football game and will have plaques of their accomplishments displayed in the entrance to the sports facility at Midlakes High School.

"The Class of 2019 to the Midlakes Athletic Hall of Fame represent a wide range of inductees," said Rick Ciciarelli, chairman of the committee. "Don Russo graduated in 1972, Liz (Donk) Lewis in 2007, and Aaron Hoven in 2009. This is the greatest span of graduation years the Hall has had up to this point."

DON RUSSO

Russo was a two-sport athlete during the early 1970s, when Phelps and Clifton Springs schools merged. He played baseball and football, and scored the combined program's first touchdown with a game-winning 12-yard interception return, said Brad Gordner, who inducted Russo.

"Don was a credit to his school, his community, and his family," Gordner said. "He was genuine. He was funny and he wore his heart on his sleeve. He had a passion for teaching kids how to play sports with the same enthusiasm and sportsmanship that he embodied."

He graduated with a business degree from SUNY Oswego and worked many years for the New York State Electric and Gas Co., in addition to coaching youth football, basketball, and baseball. Russo was inducted as a Friend of the Program honoree. Russo's children, Angie McGarry and Matt Russo, accepted the award on his behalf.

"He had a big influence on a lot of kids," McGarry said during the ceremony. "He was always there to encourage and



to challenge them. They referred to him as 'Donny Baseball'. It was Don Mattingly's nickname but they called him that because he shared so much knowledge of the game with so many players."

LIZ (DONK) LEWIS

Lewis was a three-sport athlete recognized in 2007 as Midlakes Athlete of the Year. She was a stand-out soccer, bas-

ketball, and softball player. After graduation, she played collegiate basketball at Rochester Institute of Technology and at The Sage Colleges, where she was a two-time captain and team MVP.

Midlakes Girls basketball coach Nate Rich said Lewis received 10 varsity letters and received more than 25 different athletics honors during her career.

"It's not so much for her God-given

athletic ability, but her work ethic that separated her," Rich said, "her knowledge of the game, her leadership and her win to will."

Lewis is a physical therapist with the Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES, head coach of the junior varsity basketball team and was an assistant on Rich's staff that led the girls basketball team to Sectional titles and multiple state tournament

appearances in recent years.

"Little did I know when I started playing sports that it would act as a catalyst to enrich my life," said Lewis, who thanked her family for being at games and for their continued support. "I learned to make and accomplish goals, overcome adversity, to be a leader, a better teammate, gracious in defeat and humble in success, (and) to respect

yourself and others. I'm most grateful for the opportunity Midlakes provided me."

AARON HOVEN

Hoven excelled in cross country and track and field at Midlakes. He was a five-time All-League cross-country selection and a team MVP, winner of the McQuaid Invitational and twice helped Section V win the Class B State Cross Country Championships.

He won many league titles in track and field and Sectional titles in the 800-meter run and pole vault. He also set a school record in the 1600-meter race and helped the 4x800-meter relay team to another school record. He also competed in the state meet.

His father, Chris Hoven, told the audience that Aaron found his love for running while doing laps around the house with his brother.

"They would go out and run their 10 laps around the house laughing and joking," said Chris Hoven. "He told his mom, 'That's where he learned to love to run – with my brother and with my parents on the porch cheering us on.'"

Aaron Hoven ran for Canisius College, where he was a two-time team captain and a four-time MAAC All-Academic pick. He thanked his family – mom for providing snacks and dad as the unofficial team photographer, both as cheerleaders – and the many coaches at Midlakes who helped him achieve his goals.

"Throughout my time at Midlakes, I had supportive coaches who always worked me to reach my best and achieve the goals I set for myself," said Aaron Hoven. "My family was and still is my greatest support. My family helped me to understand the value of a strong work ethic and how it can lead to achieving your goals."

ROTARY LEADS EFFORT FOR NEW SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Bags stuffed with school supplies — pens, pencils, binders, highlighters, paper, and more — were donated to Midlakes students through an annual donation led by the Clifton Springs Rotary Club.

Rotary distributed about 190 bags of donated supplies to students and teachers. The local service club collected and sorted the donated supplies, which saw the Salvation Army, St. John's Episcopal Church Second Seasons Consignment Boutique, the Mary Hicks Preston Foundation, and other groups join the effort.

"It is just a great way to make sure that all of our families start the school year off on the right foot," said Theresa Dorgan, a member of Rotary who helped gather supplies. "This effort gives families one less thing to worry about during a very busy time of year."



Rotarians helped raise about \$6,000 to meet the supply requests developed by K-12 teachers at Midlakes schools. Backpacks, colored pencils, and styli were among the items given to students during school orientation days on August 28 and 29.

Thousands of items, including scissors, toothbrushes and toothpaste, second-hand clothes and more were made available to families of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District. Leftover supplies were given to each school and made available to students at a later date.

A speech therapist will spend time with the children daily to help with communication skills.

The District began the program after discovering that some of the younger students encountered issues during the second half of first grade.

There are 18 students currently in the program.

"When you could be almost a year younger than some of your classmates, you are not ready to be as mature as they are," said Fisher. "I don't want to see kids struggle and if we can do something now to help them, from the second half of first grade all the way through high school, then that is what is right for these kids and their families."

The Theatre Experience of Midlakes High School will present Deborah Brevoort's *The Women of Lockerbie* for four shows from Thursday, Oct. 31 through Sunday, Nov. 3.

Brevoort's drama is a poignant story of a mother from New Jersey roaming the hills of Lockerbie, Scotland while looking for her son's remains lost in the crash of Pan Am Flight 103 on Dec. 21, 1987.

She meets the women of Lockerbie, who are fighting the U.S. government to obtain the clothing of the victims found in the plane's wreckage. The women, determined to convert an act of hatred into an act of love, want to wash the clothes of the dead and return them to the victim's families.

The Women of Lockerbie is loosely inspired by a true story. The characters and situations in the play are purely fictional. It is a drama about the triumph of love over hate.

The play won the silver medal in the

Onassis International Playwriting Competition and the Kennedy Center Fund for New American Plays award.

The Women of Lockerbie will be staged in Midlakes Black Box Theatre at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 31 through Saturday, Nov. 2, and at 2 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 3.

Presale tickets for *The Women of Lockerbie* are \$8 for adults and \$7 for students and senior citizens.
