READING CURRICULUM SPELLS EXCITEMENT

Parked comfortably in a cozy chair inside Leslie O'Hora's second-grade classroom, Sophia Sharp quietly reads a book that asks her to match such words as mouth, legs, tail, and nose to photos of different animals.

She quickly matches the words and continues on as O'Hora works on vocabulary words with two other students in the room.

Teachers throughout Midlakes Elementary School are doing similar exercises with students as the District implements a new K-5 English Language Arts curriculum from the American Reading Company to prepare for changes in statewide standards and new

assessments administered in the spring of 2021.

The curriculum at Midlakes is designed to get students excited about reading while meeting their individualized needs and growing their English Language Arts skills across grade levels.

The Elementary School held a Family Literacy Night in December to inform parents of the changes and show how they can best support their young readers at home. The school is also working to ensure that the new

DISTRICT AWARDED \$375K UPK GRANT

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District expects to nearly double its Universal Pre-Kindergarten program with approximately \$375,000 in funds awarded through a competitive state grant.

Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo informed the District of the grant as part of an initiative to support Pre-Kindergarten programs throughout the state. The Phelps-Clifton Springs

Central School District was among only 26 districts in the state to receive the grant.

The \$375,251 grant will allow the District to provide full- and half-day pre-kindergarten opportunities to as many as 90 four-year-olds.

The District will share more details regarding the expanded UPK program as they become available.

curriculum can meet the varying needs of students and families with materials produced in braille and multiple languages.

"There is an abundant amount of research showing how important reading is to a student's future success," said Michelle Robinette, Director of Curriculum and Instruction of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School. "The more they read, the more successful they will become."

Each student's proficiency level was determined earlier in the year by their teacher, who assigned a reading level – designated by a color and number. Books are placed in bins mirroring those levels, with new books rotated into the bins every few weeks.

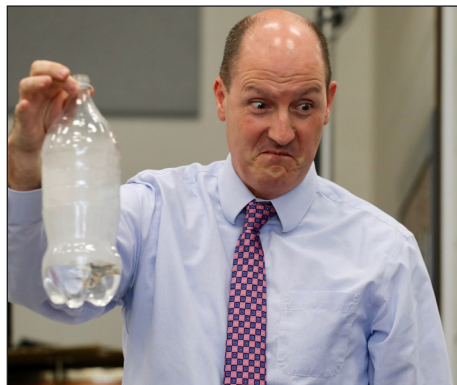
Dedicated classroom time – sometimes as much as 45 minutes – is set aside for group and individual readings, small group discussions, and one-on-one conferences to help students reach their next reading level. Students also have cards with strategies to help them figure out unknown words.

Teachers are discovering that students are excited and have been sharing what they're learning from the books.

"They are just into their books," said Ali Estes, a third-grade teacher. "They just want to keep reading and go on the adventures that are in their books."

For example, third graders have been uncovering various facts while reading about weather patterns. Their research was used to write about what they discovered.

Also, WHAM-TV (Channel 13) meteorologist Mark McLean visited with students to answer questions and share interesting weather-related information.

Fifth graders kicked off their school year by reading Bruce Coville's book "My Teacher is an Alien" about a group of students who discover that their teacher is actually an orange-eyed alien. The author from Syracuse met with students to answer questions and share how he develops his stories.

O'Hora's second-graders have been learning all about bugs.

She started a lesson by reading a

message with students on how they were going to determine the main topic, and key ideas from a text to write a paragraph. The students read the lesson aloud as O'Hora pointed to several words displayed on a smart TV.

"It is really cohesive and just makes sense," O'Hora said about how the reading and writing exercises work together. "The kids are reading. They love talking about their books."

HOW FAMILIES CAN SUPPORT READING AND LEARNING AT HOME

Families can support literacy skills at home in several ways, including:

- Remove distractions and find a comfortable place to make reading a pleasurable habit.
- Take students to a local

library to find books (and topics) of interest, especially during breaks from school.

- Read to or with your child. Take turns reading.
- Model and encourage reading for information and for

pleasure at home. Remember, reading occurs in magazines, cookbooks, newspapers and even comic books.

- Play Scrabble, Boggle, Blurt, Scattegories or a similar game to practice literacy skills.

SOME QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR STUDENT

- What will happen next?
- What details from the reading support your rationale?
- How would you rewrite the ending and why?
- Is there a character you can relate to and why?

DISTRICT BEGINS STRATEGIC PLANNING

A community forum is set for February 11 in the High School.

Over the past two years, the Midlakes Board of Education, administration, and staff have been focused on the concept of alignment. Ensuring that every Midlakes student has access to the best possible opportunities and outcomes requires everyone working together and pulling in the same direction. It also requires a clear understanding of where we are and where we want to go.

As we adapt to the changing needs of our students and the evolving expectations related to college and career readiness, it is important to review our progress, our opportunities, and the desired outcomes for our students.

On February 10, Midlakes will begin a strategic planning process that will clarify the values and beliefs of the District and establish the goals that will guide our work for the next 3-5 years.

The District is committed to working with all stakeholder groups to gather feedback on our successes, our areas for improvement, and the priorities that will enable us to support the social, emotional, and academic needs of our students to create the appropriate opportunities for success. This feedback is essential to identifying the needs and goals that should serve as focal points of our work

for the next several years.

The District will be assisted in this work by a team of consultants from the Warner School of Education (University of Rochester). The Warner School was selected through a competitive application process. Its team brings a wealth of experience in working with school districts to analyze and evaluate current performance, investigate opportunities for improvement, and develop strategic plans that serve as practical and effective tools for advancing student outcomes.

On February 10, the team of consultants will be on campus all day to meet and gather feedback from students, teachers, support staff, and administrators. The consultants will also meet with the Board of Education, just prior to the February 10 Board meeting, to gather its insights on the successes and goals of the district.

The team will return for a 6:30 p.m. forum on Tuesday, Feb. 11 in the High School (rooms 118, 119 and 120) open to parents and community members. For those who are unable to attend the community forum, a survey will be posted on the school website during the month of March.

Once all the data and feedback have been collected, a Strategic Planning Council will meet regularly from March through May to evaluate the information, discuss the values, beliefs, and goals of the District, and develop a Strategic Plan for final consideration by the Board of Education. The Strategic Planning Council will be made up of approximately 25 members representing students, parents, teachers, support staff, administration, and the Board of Education.

The District is excited to develop a plan that includes the many perspectives of this inclusive Planning Council. The strategic plan will be finalized and presented to the Board of Education by June 15.

The strategic planning process will enable the District to align our programs, policies, and budgets to a clear set of goals that reflect a common understanding of what our students need to thrive. Strategic planning represents an important step in advancing the work of the District and the success of our students.

STUDENTS SELECTED TO AREA ALL-STATE

Two Midlakes students were recognized by the New York State School Music Association for outstanding solo performances and were invited to perform with other top regional musicians in select concerts earlier in the school year.

Matt Cannan, a seventh-grader, performed with the Junior High Area All-State Band Festival held on Nov. 1 and 2 at the Greece Athena Performing Arts Center. Senior Abby Sloane, a percussionist, was invited to perform with the Senior High Area All-State Concert Band on Nov. 15 and 16 at Letchworth High School.

ART STUDENTS HELP FIGHT HUNGER

Midlakes art students created 30 ceramic bowls and several watercolor paintings to donate to the Catholic Family Center's for the Empty Bowls fundraiser to help end hunger in the Rochester region.

Students in Shannon Gage's art class were joined by potters from across western New York for the fundraiser in helping to donate approximately 900 soup bowls. It was the first time high school students from any school took part in the event.

MUELLER RECEIVES SUPERINTENDENT AWARD

Midlakes High School student Molly Mueller was recognized during the inaugural Wayne-Finger Lakes Superintendent Award Program held in November at the Wayne-Finger Lakes BOCES conference center in Newark.

The program was developed to provide recognition to standout students from across the Wayne-Finger Lakes region and was made possible through the generous support of Campus Construction Management, Ferrara Fiorenza.

STATE NAMES SCHOLAR-ATHLETE TEAMS

Several fall sports programs and nearly 50 student-athletes were recognized by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association for outstanding academic achievement.

The girls cross country (94.21 GPA), girls soccer (92.12), girls swimming and diving team (94.21), girls tennis (90.81) and the girls volleyball team (92.52) were all declared a Scholar-Athlete Team for the fall of 2019.

To receive Scholar-Athlete team recognition, the team's GPA

for at least 75 percent of its roster must be greater or equal to 90 percent. Student-athletes needed to earn at least a 90 GPA for recognition.

WHITCOMB RETURNS TO COACH

Dave Whitcomb, who once served as principal of Midlakes High School and held roles as Director of Athletics and head varsity football coach, has been appointed by the Board of Education as head varsity football coach.

Whitcomb is currently second in wins in Section 5 football history with 217. He has been recognized several times in several leagues as Coach of the Year, including a 2005 selection as All-Greater Rochester Coach of the Year.

STUDENT STARS IN KINDNESS ASSEMBLIES

Sixth-grader Romeo Castellano was the star of two assemblies on kindness at Midlakes Elementary School. The assemblies reminded students that being kind is about rising above expectations by being polite, smiling, including others, taking turns, giving a helping hand and a compliment, taking responsibility and treating others the way you want to be treated.

Romeo took center stage by singing "Count on Me" by Bruno Mars. He was joined by students and staff.
