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

A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

SAFETY PROTOCOLS HELP KEEP STUDENTS IN SCHOOL

"We need to continue to act as good neighbors so we can overcome this pandemic together."

I hope this message finds you and your families enjoying good health and staying safely connected as we continue to navigate the COVID-19 public health crisis. As you know, Midlakes remains committed to protecting the health and safety of our students, staff, and community while continuing to provide a high-quality education under unique circumstances.

While the past nine months have been frustrating and disappointing in too many ways, we appreciate the patience, support, and determination of the entire Midlakes community.

As we advance our hybrid learning model to include more grades, we must continue to work together to counter COVID-19 fatigue. We must remain diligent in following safety protocols, especially with the beginning of the cold and flu season upon us and the temptations of large holiday gatherings this time of year. It is more important than ever that we all work together to keep everyone safe, healthy, and in school.

Students in UPK through Grade 7 have started in the hybrid learning model. Grade 8 is scheduled to join them during the week of December 7, Grades 9 and 12 on December 14, and Grades 10 and 11 on January 11.

We know this timeline has required tremendous patience from our students and their families, but we are excited to be on track to have all grade levels in the hybrid model by the middle of January. We also respect the decisions of those families opting for full remote instruction.

Many factors could delay our timeline and prevent us from completing the expansion of the hybrid model by the week of January 11. Our health and safety staff continues to work closely with the Ontario County Department of Health to monitor positive cases and track

the testing of students and staff exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19.

While we continue to plan for best-case scenarios, we are also ready to switch to full remote learning based on the potential for positive cases, quarantines directed by the Department of Health, and short-term staffing shortages. To avoid these interruptions, we need the entire Midlakes community to work together.

We encourage all members of our school community to make decisions in the interest of health and safety so all of our students can learn in the hybrid learning model, if their families so choose. It is important to remain cautious when family traditions include travel plans and large gatherings.

We also ask that you continue to observe social distancing, wear face coverings, practice good hand and respiratory hygiene, and stay home when you are feeling ill. Midlakes has a long history of being a kind and caring community, and we need to continue to act as good neighbors so we can overcome this pandemic together.

I would like to extend my heartfelt gratitude to our amazing Midlakes staff for staying positive, hardworking, and creating meaningful learning opportunities for our students. I also want to thank our students and their families for being flexible, staying engaged, and making the best of a difficult situation. Our community truly is Midlakes Strong, and our students are fortunate to be surrounded by so many people who care.

Thank you for your continued cooperation and support, and I wish you and your families the very best for a safe, healthy, and joyous holiday season!

SCHOOL REOPENS

Midlakes welcomed its first students back to campus on September 14, inviting those in UPK to Grade 3, some special education students, and English Language Learners to school for in-person learning for the first time since March due to the pandemic.

Students in grades 4-7 have also been brought into a hybrid learning model that has most attend school on campus at least two days a week. The District has set the following schedule for bringing the remaining students into the hybrid model:

- **Grade 8:** December 7
- **Grade 9 & 12:** December 14
- **Grade 10 & 11:** January 11

Specific cohort and transportation information will be sent to families. Those with questions may call the high school office at (315) 548-6300 or middle school office at (315) 548-6600.

Note: The schedule is subject to change based on infection rates and other factors. Also, students are expected to follow various safety protocols outlined on

WINTER SPORTS: Registration is open through FamilyID for state-approved sports, including boys swimming, to begin on Nov. 30. The Athletic Department is working to deliver skill-specific training and a strength and conditioning program for interested student-athletes. For more information, contact John Lombardi at jlombardi@midlakes.org.

SNOW DAYS: Midlakes will continue to use snow days and appropriate weather-related delays throughout the winter, if the need arises.

COVID-19 REPORT CARD: This online dashboard tracks COVID-19 infections and testing operations of school districts, including Midlakes schools, at schoolcovidreportcard.health.ny.gov. There may be discrepancies due to reporting times and other factors.

CLUSTER ACTION INITIATIVE: The New York State Cluster Action Initiative works to detect small outbreaks and takes action to eliminate them by placing areas into three categories with successively higher restrictions within each: Yellow, Orange, and Red zones. Placement into these zones may require schools to conduct COVID-19 tests, which the District has initiated preparations to administer. Learn more at <https://bit.ly/3faeolG>.

TRAVEL RESTRICTIONS: New York State approved new guidelines allowing travelers to "test out" of a mandatory 14-day quarantine. Those traveling to/from a restricted state for more than 24 hours must obtain a test within three days of travel. The traveler may exit quarantine upon receiving a second negative test four days after departure. ■



REMAINING BUSY

Rethinking schools under new state guidelines has taken the entire school community, including:

- **FACILITIES:** Helping to reorganize classrooms and other spaces to accommodate students under social distancing guidelines in addition to deep cleaning and regular upkeep of campus.
- **FOOD SERVICE:** Prepared 140,000 meals from March to September and set up an online form to handle meal deliveries.
- **TRANSPORTATION:** Reorganized bus schedules to ensure every student has transportation per social distancing guidelines in addition to regular safety checks.
- **IT/HELP DESK:** Created a Remote Learning Help page on [Midlakes.org](https://midlakes.org) and expanded support for families who email techhelp@midlakes.org.

BUILDING CONNECTIONS

Kindergartner discovers meaningful relationship after a chance encounter.

Riley Hixson was a bit anxious visiting Midlakes Elementary School for the first time until she met Deputy Bob Holland, who stopped the UPK student during an orientation meeting last year.

He talked to her about coming to school, staying in school, working to stay on the right track, and gave her a high-five before sending her along. The encounter left an impression on Riley that has remained more than a year later.

"She just thought it was the greatest thing," said Jennifer Hixson, Riley's mother. "Ever since that day, she just loved him and looked for him and has been asking to be a police officer. Now, a whole year later, when we get to school she looks for his car."

When it came time for Halloween it was only fitting for Riley to dress up in a navy blue uniform with a shiny police badge and handcuffs, giving Midlakes its very own four-foot-tall patrolling police officer.

"It's fun and I like to make people feel happy and help them," said Riley, who added that she has arrested her grandmother "like 9 or 12 times" while playing around the house. "Just having fun."

What she didn't expect was a surprise visit from Deputy Holland that brought them together in their uniforms and peaked caps the weekend before Halloween.


Deputy Holland, a former

D.A.R.E. officer, gave Riley two stuffed animals. He also showed the young girl around his police cruiser, letting her turn on the lights and the sirens and call dispatch on the scanner. Riley even named one of the stuffed animals, "Holland."

"I'm telling you that was so awesome," said Deputy Holland. "You don't know the type of impact you have. It just reinforces that every time you meet somebody, it doesn't matter who it is or what you are meeting them for, you can make a difference in their life just by saying, 'Hi' to them."

Jennifer Hixson recorded the encounter and shared it with family and friends on social media.

"So many people commented on how nice of a man he is," she said. "She's just an incredible little person and she really looks up to him. I just can't express how grateful we are to him to be able to give her that experience. I know she will remember that day forever." ■



BOARD SEEKS PUBLIC SUPPORT ON SCHOOL FUNDING

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Board of Education, along with school staff and administrators, is growing increasingly concerned that promised aid payments from 2019-20 and 2020-21, reimbursement aid relating to the pandemic, and aid for the 2021-22 academic year will be cut.

As a result, the Board of Education has established an online Advocacy Action Portal, where District residents may download and mail a letter to state and federal officials encouraging the full funding of schools and support for a federal stimulus package to fund increased costs at schools

relating to the pandemic.

Without such measures, the District could face a financial shortfall that would be catastrophic to the educational program.


