

COVID-19 UPDATES & RESOURCES:

The District continues to post relevant updates and information for families regarding school operations and community resources during the pandemic.





Phelps and Clifton Springs schools were unified with the opening of Midlakes High School on Feb. 7, 1971.

During a time when leaders of schools in Phelps and Clifton Springs faced growing enrollments and dwindling space, residents of the two communities decided to merge and build a new high school.

"I was in the very first class to graduate from Midlakes," said Stephen Tears, who now lives in Virginia Beach. "We were not looking forward to it because we didn't know anyone from Phelps High School. Well, it went without a hitch .. we started to make lifelong friends."

A 12-member student council helped select the name "Midlakes" for the school due to its location between Canandaigua and Seneca lakes. A color from each of the former schools were combined to represent the black, white, and blue school colors. On Feb. 7, Midlakes High School celebrates its 50th anniversary of unifying two schools and educating students as one community with graduates becoming educators, athletes, musicians, philanthropists and more.

In the upcoming months, the District will break ground on renovations that will ensure the long-term vitality of the school.

Work will modernize wood shop and culinary arts rooms, reconfigure music areas, regrade the main football/lacrosse field, upgrade auditorium lighting, repair restrooms, replace boilers and much more.

Voters approved the \$15.6 million project in December 2019, a proposal paid for by state aid and funds already saved in a capital reserve fund requiring no additional increase in taxes.



CAPITAL PROJECT **MOVES FORWARD**

Construction work to begin sooner than expected.

n December 2019, the Midlakes community overwhelmingly approved a \$15.6 million capital improvement project. That capital project, in conjunction with our NYS Smart Schools Bond

Act allocation, will address several aspects of our campus and facilities in need of repair, replacement, and/or upgrading to meet the needs of our students and protect the community's long-term investment in our facilities.

To expand opportunities for competitive bidding, the District and its partners (Edge Architecture and Watchdog Building Partners) decided in September 2020 to submit the project to the New York State Education Department in two phases. Completing the project in two parts creates the possibility of better pricing while completing some of the work earlier than originally planned.

Phase I of the project, which was submitted to NYSED in December 2020, includes the following work:

- Technology, security, HVAC and mechanical upgrades throughout Midlakes Elementary School.
- Bathroom upgrades in the south wing (grades 3-6).
- Redesign/improvements to the main parking lot and parent drop-off loop at Midlakes Elementary School. Create a new faculty parking lot behind the
- Replacement of the exterior coatings on the Transportation and Maintenance buildings.
- Installation of a fueling station and a salt barn near the Transportation building.

Final approval of the Phase I work is anticipated in February 2021 with exterior site work (parking lots, etc.) to begin about six to eight weeks later. Construction will be planned to minimize any disruptions with interior work site (HVAC, mechanical, bathroom upgrades) scheduled to start in the summer of 2021.

Phase II work, scheduled to be submitted to NYSED this summer for approval, includes:

- Technology, security, HVAC and mechanical upgrades throughout Midlakes Middle/High School.
- Upgrades to the auditorium house lights and lighting controls.
- Bathroom upgrades throughout Midlakes Middle/ High School.
- Repair and resurfacing of the football/lacrosse field.
- Relocation of the cafeteria for grades 7 and 8 closer to the kitchen/food line and the cafeteria for grades 9-12. The new cafeteria will be redesigned as

a multifunctional space that can accommodate small performances, meetings and ceremonies, and concessions for events in the auditorium.

• Relocation, redesign, and upgrade of our music facilities for grades 7-12, including two new

> band rooms, a new chorus room, a new general music room, as well as practice and instrument storage spaces.

> > · Upgrades to a technology classroom to facilitate both computer-based and equipment-based

 Upgrades to the culinary arts classroom to facilitate improved student opportunities while also supporting other aspects of the Family and Consumer Sciences curriculum. Phase II work is tentatively scheduled to

take place between March and December 2022.

The District will work with faculty and staff, Edge Architecture, and Watchdog Building Partners to strategically sequence Phase II of the project, identify temporary instructional spaces during the transition, and take any other steps necessary to minimize the disruption to our students, staff, and community.

We are confident that the outcome of the project and the improved opportunities for our students will far outweigh the temporary inconveniences caused by the construction process.

In the coming months, the District will continue to share news and updated renderings related to the project. We are grateful for the overwhelming support from the Midlakes community for these important improvements to our campus, and we are dedicated to keeping you informed of our progress.

Rest assured that while we move forward with the capital project, we are still dedicated and working diligently to manage the COVID-19 public health crisis and provide the best possible educational opportunities within the guidelines set forth by the New York State Department of Health and the New York State Education Department.

We are tremendously grateful for the work of our administration, faculty, and staff to protect the health and safety of our students and advance their opportunities for social, emotional, and academic growth. Their outstanding work will make it possible for the District to move forward with its plans to upgrade our facilities and protect the community's investment according to the new schedule for the capital project.




STUDENTS INDUCTED INTO **HONOR SOCIETY**

A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

he New York State School Boards Association (NYSSBA) defines a school board as the board of directors of a district responsible for establishing goals, setting policy, and overseeing resources.

If the Phelps-Clifton Springs Board of Education stopped right there it would fulfill its obligation. However, your Board of Education has never found that definition to be truly representative of our students, staff, or our community.

Establishing goals is a part of what the Board of Education does during any school year. We meet with the superintendent, who outlines the annual goals of the administration team and faculty, to discuss and formulate objectives in anticipation of laying out our expectations to students and families in early September.

Years ago YOUR board established the practice of publishing our goals. For example, the board thought it was important to do a better job communicating with the community. The idea at the time was simply to have a better website.

The result established a digital footprint that cannot be ignored. We now have social, digital, and print media platforms that help bring our District to life. The Midlakes Journal and our Midlakes Schools Facebook, Twitter, and YouTube channels showcase student achievements and staff interactions while keeping the community informed of upcoming events, and make it easier to find important information on our District and community.

Oh, and we rebuilt the website, too. It was a goal that wasn't necessarily tied to student achievement but has become just as important to our kids, their families, and our neighbors.

Another area that defines any school board is the management of resources, but what does that mean? It's about making the decisions behind the annual budget. If I had to guess, the budget issue is probably the most read Journal editions of the

year. Articles, pie charts, and graphs tell the story of where school funding comes from and where District resources will be allocated for the upcoming school year.

But the management of resources goes beyond the annual budget. It has us constantly

looking for new ways to make our

processes more informative and transparent and includes capital improvement projects. In approving the 2019 capital project, the Board of Education had a great deal of interaction with stakeholder groups, administrators, teachers, community members, and students to help best decide what our campus would look like

This work also helps direct the future for all students. The long-range planning to make this possible was put in motion well before any of your current board mem-

for the foreseeable future.

bers placed their name on a ballot. In honor of the work done by those before us, this board strives to set the table for future boards as well.

In some ways, this year is like any other when the Board of Education first sat together and discussed our annual goals. Those goals, of course, are tied to our strategic long-range plans as well as our best practices and policies. We even have a goal to better inform the public of what we do. I guess we can check that box.

Ask any board member what goal they are most excited about and I am certain they will respond about our goal to establish and increase student interaction with the Board of Education.

Like our communication's goal, I'm sure it will not be defined solely by the words on a piece of paper. It will likely grow and evolve.

What will student interaction look like for the Board of Education and what will it mean for current students? We hope it leads to a greater sense of community involvement. Possibly leading a current student to become a future board member.

BOARD OF EDUCATION MEETINGS

Based on guidance from New York State regarding COVID-19, the Phelps-Clifton Springs Board of Education holds its meetings remotely with access provided on the Midlakes Schools Facebook page and Midlakes.org.

The Board of Education values the input of the Midlakes community and welcomes public comment on any topic related to its work, with the exception of individual personnel and/or students matters.

Community members may submit a comment using the Zoom question and answer box during the live stream. Anyone making public comment must identify themselves by name and address.

The public comment period will be limited to a total of thirty (30) minutes and one (1) comment per person, Individual comments will be limited to two (2) minutes.

The Board of Education does not respond to items presented or

questions raised through public comment

However, it may discuss topics of public comment at a later time and/or contact the individual who submitted the comment.

Meetings begin at 6:30 p.m. with the next scheduled for Monday, Feb. 8.

SYSTEMS OF SUPPORT

New framework guides supports for all students.

Midlakes has been building a new framework called Multi-Tiered Systems of Support, a data-based approach of support for all students to help them meet their individual academic and social-emotional needs.

Multi-Tiered Systems of Support provides three general levels of support, including:

- **Tier 1:** Universal support for all students by providing the foundation for success for the most amount of students.
- Tier 2: Targeted support from a teacher or specialist focusing on specific skills and development needs for students requiring additional assistance.
- Tier 3: Intensive and individualized support for the smallest group of students.

The District has been implementing curriculum and screening processes at every grade level to identify and track students in each tier.

For example, reading specialist Donna Aceto led a study of the Equipped for Reading Success program by SUNY Cortland professor Dr. David Kilpatrick to

incorporate some of his work into classes this year. Some K-8 special education and reading teachers are also piloting the use of a structured phonics program to help struggling readers.

Similar efforts in math, science, English and other areas are being incorporated across multiple grade

In addition, the District has implemented the Character Strong social-emotional learning program this year. Anna Corrente, a school counselor, has been co-facilitating these lessons with classroom teachers in grades K-6.


In grades 7-12, physical education teachers with support from the Pupil Support Office have been incorporating the curriculum, Also, weekly Character Dares – simple challenges focusing on emotional wellness - are sent to staff and students reinforcing what is taught in the classroom.


Combined, these additional programs help support the whole child while creating consistency in programs across grade levels.

ATHLETES LAUDED FOR ACADEMICS

Several fall sports programs and approximately 40 student-athletes have been recognized by the New York State Public High School Athletic Association for outstanding achievements in the classroom.

To receive Scholar-Athlete team recognition and a certificate, the team's average GPA for at least 75 percent of its roster must be greater or equal to 90 percent. Student-athletes need to earn at least a 90 GPA.

Families may request busing for either of these purposes by completing the online forms at http:// midlakes.org/transportation.


The deadline for childcare is June 1 or within 30 days of moving into the District. The deadline for private/parochial is April 1.
