uring its April 18 meeting, the Board of Education adopted an approximately \$40.6 million budget for the 2022-2023 school year that will be put to a vote on Tuesday, May 17.

The proposal calls for a 2% tax levy increase, which is less than one-third the annualized rate of inflation and well below the District's tax cap limit set by the state.

Voters will also be asked to elect three candidates to the Board of Education. The two highest vote-getters will be elected to three-year terms starting on July 1. The third-high-

est vote-getter will be elected to a 13-month, 13-day term beginning May 17.

A proposition to purchase six new buses along with a separate funding measure for the Clifton Springs Library and Phelps Community Memorial Library will be on the ballot. The District hosts the vote for the libraries, but the actual funding does not impact school taxes.

## **NEW TOOL** FOR STUDENTS

Midlakes is excited to announce a partnership with Paper, a secure new tool offering students (Grades 7-12) free, unlimited academic support.

Students can receive oneon-one support from specially trained tutors in more than 200 subjects and in multiple languages with Paper. Tutors are available 24/7 and provide chat-based online support for assignments, and can review topics already introduced at school.

Paper is not intended to replace classroom instruction but is another tool to support students when they need it and as often as they need it. Districts throughout the country and state currently use the service.

Midlakes teachers also have accounts and will be able to review student activity to see what they're working on and provide more targeted instruction as needed.

## A MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

# SUPPOR'

would like to thank the Midlakes community for its patience and perseverance in navigating another unusual school year. While 2021-2022 has seen many changes for the better, we appreciate how our students, staff, families, and community have adapted to the challenges of the past two years.

As we look forward to what we hope will be a more "normal" 2022-2023 school year, the District is pleased to present a budget that advances important instructional and social-emotional supports for our students while responding to unique financial challenges. These challenges required careful planning to maximize the use of state and federal revenues and District reserves to minimize the tax burden on our community. The proposed budget includes a tax levy increase of 2%, which is less than half of the District's legal tax levy limit of 4.15%.

While we are pleased that New York State has continued the process of fully funding Foundation Aid, which was underfunded for many years, other factors have limited the positive impact of this change. A substantial portion of the District's Foundation Aid increase is offset by escalating healthcare costs and rising prices for fuel, utilities, equipment, and supplies. These projected increases, which are outside the District's control, have influenced our spending plan for 2022-2023.

Federal COVID-19 relief and stimulus funds allocated to the District last year will continue to support significant investments in instructional and social-emotional supports for our students for the next two years. These funds enabled us to add positions to close achievement gaps, lower class sizes, and provide additional supports to our students. Since the federal funds are allocated over multiple years, we can finance these positions without immediately impacting our annual budget.

Aided by federal funds, we are able to use the proposed 2022-2023 school budget to address other critical needs. This budget includes funding increases for equipment and supplies to keep up with rising utility and operational costs.

The budget also includes the addition of a laborer/night supervisor to ensure appropriate staffing to clean our buildings and maintain a safe and healthy environment.

The District is also carrying forward \$125,000 in surplus revenue from the 2021-2022 budget to purchase a backhoe with a 14-foot plow. Conservative spending during the current budget cycle made it possible to fund this purchase without impacting our tax levy or reserves. The backhoe will assist with snow removal as we add a staff parking lot behind the Elementary School through the current capital project. It will also be used to maintain our retention pond and the drainage ditches that

channel runoff water. This investment will support proper drainage and improve the condition of our athletic fields and green spaces on campus.

The proposed budget also includes the addition of a computer services position to further support our 1:1 student device initiative, classroom

> technology, and increased cybersecurity protocols. The District seeks to expand student, staff, and family access to technological assistance to support our extensive use of instructional technology.

Finally, the proposed budget includes a more stable approach to providing student behavioral support, social-emotional support, and effective implementation of our Special Education program.

For years, the District has used "Teachers on Special Assignment" (TOSA) to serve as Deans of Students and assistants to the Committee on Special Education. Often, these positions were filled by teachers pursuing administrative certification. Recently, fewer teachers are interested in these TOSA positions, making the model difficult to sustain.

The District is proposing to replace two TOSA Dean positions with two 10-month Administrative Deans. These probationary positions will provide more predictable student support from year to year. Since the TOSA Dean positions are in the current budget, the transition to ten-month Administrative Deans results in only a slight cost increase.

Likewise, we are proposing the addition of a school psychologist position, replacing the TOSA CSE assistant position and enabling us to reassign one of our veteran psychologists as District Psychologist/CSE Chairperson.

This change will provide stable leadership of the CSE process, enhance district-level support for student social-emotional interventions, and enable the Director of Special Programs to focus on instructional and programmatic leadership to improve student academic outcomes. Since the TOSA CSE assistant position is in the current budget, the transition to an additional school psychologist provides a more stable approach with no budgetary impact.

We are confident the 2022-2023 proposed budget meets the needs of our students and community in a fiscally responsible manner. We have been strategic in structuring new and existing positions in a way to improve District operations while keeping costs under control.

The 2% tax levy increase needed to support this spending plan falls far below the current rate of inflation. We will always look for ways to meet student needs while being mindful of the impact on our community.

Thank you for your continued support of all Midlakes students.

# QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Included are responses to some commonly asked questions regarding the Annual Vote. For more, visit Midlakes.org/AnnualVote.

## How will the budget affect property owners?

The \$40,636,321 budget proposal calls for a 2% increase in the real property tax levy. Based on \$100,000 assessed value and overall assessments and equalization rates from the 2021-2022 school year, residents can expect to see an average increase of \$35.25 if they qualify for the STAR exemption, \$15.90 if they qualify for enhanced STAR, or \$49.52 with no STAR exemption. Keep in mind that the equalization rates and overall assessments across seven municipalities overlapping the District have yet to be released for 2022-2023.

## What expenditures are increasing the most?

The District is part of the Finger Lakes Area School Health Plan (FLASHP) consortium and its rates for 2022-2023 are expected to increase by 21.9%. As a result, the District is projecting an increase of \$837,409 in employee benefits/health care costs.

### How has inflation impacted the budget?

The Consumer Price Index (CPI) between November 2020 and 2021 rose 6.8%, a rate of increase the nation hasn't seen in nearly 40 years. On top of that, CPI rose another 1.2% as a result of the war in Ukraine and rising gas prices. The District has seen a steady increase in the cost of utilities, materials, supplies, and equipment during the 2021-2022 school year and has budgeted accordingly for 2022-2023.

## How is the tax levy limit calculated?

State law mandates that an eight-step formula be used to calculate the District's tax levy limit. This calculation accounts for growth in the local tax base, the rate of inflation, and provides the District with certain exemptions (capital expenditures, retirement contributions, court orders, and judgments). The District may also carry over the unused portion of the tax levy limit from the previous year. The District has \$230,322 in carryover from 2021-2022, resulting in a tax levy limit for the upcoming school year of \$15,485,323 for a 4.15% annual increase. For 2022-2023, the District is proposing a tax levy increase of 2%.

## Has refinancing the District's debt helped?

Based on the recommendation of Fiscal Advisors, the District was able to take advantage of low-interest rates in refinancing \$9.34 million in serial bonds from prior capital projects. This is projected to save the District approximately \$75,000 annually through 2030.

## Why is the District paying for more buses?

The District works to ensure the safety of students and staff by using a 10-year rotation to purchase new buses and phase out aging models. To continue this schedule, the District will spend up to \$684,804 out of its Bus Purchase Reserve Fund to purchase six buses, specifically two 30-passenger, two 65-passenger, and two 71-passenger buses. The state provides 90% aid reimbursement over five years on the purchase of buses. The net cost to the District after state aid will be \$68,480 out of the reserve fund.

## What happens if the budget isn't approved?

The District has two options if the budget is defeated. It can propose a new budget or the same budget for a re-vote in June. If that budget proposal is defeated, the District would be required to adopt a contingency budget. Since the District is proposing a 2% tax levy increase, there would be a change to the tax levy in the contingency budget, specifically a reduction of \$297,352. In addition, there would be restrictions on purchasing non-contingent items and the District would be required to charge fees for all facility uses.

## STAFFING CHANGES UNDER BUDGET PROP

The following are proposed changes for the 2022-2023 academic year:

- A Computer Services Assistant to allow expanded service relating to increased use of technology and safety protocols.
- A Laborer/Night Shift Supervisor (K-12) to handle overnight cleaning and other work.
- Part-time occupational therapy services (0.2) and part-time physical therapy services (0.4) provided by WFL BOCES to cover increased needs. The District would receive aid in

the following year.

- An Elementary and Secondary Administrative Dean of Students to replace two Teachers on Special Assignments to provide an enhanced candidate pool and more stable services.
- A School Psychologist to offset the elimination of a Teacher on Special Assignment CSE Chair and to provide more social-emotional support.
- · Eliminating a teaching assistant position, which aligns with a staff retirement.

Additional positions and programs were addressed in 2021 with the use of federal and state aid, and include:

- After-school and summer programs.
- Additional math and reading support.
- Positions to support social-emotional learning.
- Materials/supplies to support in-person
- Cleaner/laborer and clerical positions to support cleaning/health and safety protocols.
- HVAC upgrades to improve ventilation.



Occupation/ Career: State Correction Officer, and retired U.S. Army.


## **Qualifications and Activities:**

## A MESSAGE FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

# BALANCING OUR NEEDS, **KEEPING TAXES IN CHECK**

The 2022-2023 budget proposal continues a long trend of modest tax increases.

One of the chief responsibilities of the Board of Education — and one we take very seriously — is to oversee the annual budget process, which includes approving the final spending plan before putting it out to a vote by our com-

munity.

We began the process of developing the 2022-2023 budget in November, when we first reviewed the draft budget development calendar, and for the last several months have reviewed and provided feedback on several iterations of the spending plan presented to us by **Business Administrator Karl Dubash and Superintendent** Matt Sickles.

Together, we have worked hard on presenting a budget to voters on May 17 that has a minimal impact on taxes and prioritizes the needs of our students.

Our budget maintains programs and services with

a modest 2% tax levy increase, which is less than one third of the annualized rate of inflation. We were able to do this despite significant increases in health care, inflationary pressure, and an unprecedented labor shortage that made maintaining our level of service tremendously difficult.

The impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on our schools has been profound and this budget prepares the District for the upcoming academic year by providing our students with the very best opportunity for success while responding to changing conditions.

Also, we are particularly happy to propose an additional school psychologist position in the budget. This position will help us remain focused on supporting the "whole child" to help sustain a plan already in place that helps develop students by addressing their social-emotional needs — a critical

> piece for our students as we continue to recover from the pandemic.

This budget, along with federal and state pandemic aid, allows us to invest in initiatives directly affecting students in meaningful and positive ways.

We are proud that this budget continues our long trend of modest tax increases. We are once again well under the District's calculated tax levy limit of 4.15%.

But we couldn't settle on a 2% tax levy increase without being forward in our thinking. An example of this was how Mr. Dubash saw an opportunity to refinance bonds

issued by our District from earlier capital projects. Refinancing these bonds will save the District \$75,000 each year through 2030 and had a critical role in our ability to close a gap between revenue and expenses in this budget.

Overall, we feel that this budget reflects the Board's commitment to balancing the needs of our students, staff, and taxpayers, while responsibly investing in our educational plan for the future.

Again, thank you for your continued support of our students - it does matter!

## **DISTRICT BUDGET**

To adopt the annual budget of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District for the fiscal year 2022-2023 and to authorize the requisite portion thereof to be raised by taxation on the taxable real property of the District.

## **BOARD OF EDUCATION**

To elect two members to the Board of Education for three-year terms, each commencing July 1, 2022. The seats are presently held by

Jacob Amidon and Ryan Davis. To elect one member to the Board of Education for a partial term of one year, one month, and 13 days, commencing May 17, 2022. The seat is presently held by Lindsay Marino.

## **BUS PURCHASE**

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to purchase six student transportation vehicles, including related furnishings and equipment, not to exceed \$684,804, which

is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and pay for such buses by using \$684,804 from the District's Bus Purchase Reserve.

## **COMMUNITY LIBRARIES**

A separate proposition for the approval of \$174,000 annually to be contributed to support the Clifton Springs Library in the amount of \$87,000, and to the Phelps Community Memorial Library in the amount of \$87,000. ■



# 'FOSTER GRANDPARENT' FINDS A HOME AT MIDLAKES

Rita Parrish wrings the paint out of used brushes, sharpens pencils and cleans up around the art rooms at Midlakes Elementary School through a volunteer program that brings retirees into the classroom.

The Geneva resident visits school about three times a week through Foster Grandparents to help out however she can.

"I just love it," said Parrish. "I am not a person who can sit at home, watch TV, and drink coffee. I am someone who wants to get out and do things. It's good to come in, help, and see their smiling faces."

There are about 40 people who volunteer as Foster Grandparents at area schools and daycare centers in Ontario, Wayne, Seneca, and Yates counties, according to the Wayne County Action Program, which places and supports area volunteers.

"She is just amazing," said Melissa Kuter, an art

teacher at Midlakes Elementary School. "She is so helpful. She offers assistance, and just loves coming in and interacting with the kids."

Volunteers are 55 or older and reside locally. They go through a background check and are trained with assistance from the New York State Office of the Aging. They also receive a small stipend funded through a federal grant administered by the Corporation of National and Community Service.

While the program provides an extra set of hands in classrooms and a bit of one-on-one attention for students, it keeps Foster Grandparents busy by engaging them in their community.

"This is my first year at Midlakes, so I hope to come back next year," Parrish said. "Once I get home and think about the smiles you see throughout the day — it was well worth it. I love it."

## STRATTON NAMED **MASTER TEACHER**

Brie Stratton, a science teacher at Midlakes High School, was named a New York State Master Teacher by Gov. Kathy Hochul, becoming the fourth educator in recent vears at the school to receive the designation to boost STEM-related education.


