Te are excited to announce that we have adopted a new school-tohome communications tool for fam-

ilies called ParentSquare. This tool is designed to keep parents and legal guardians informed of building- and district-level communications and encourage greater engagement and connection with the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District.

This new tool replaces the BlackBoard mass notification system, which we found to be unreliable at times when sending urgent messages.

We are confident that ParentSquare, which is used by many schools, will provide a safer and more reliable way for district administrators and school principals to communicate with parents and legal guardians to receive updates regarding:

- Weather closings;
- · Schoolwide events; and
- Other important updates and events. ParentSquare also allows families to receive updates in their preferred language.

We do need your help before ParentSquare can be fully implemented. Parents and guardians should make sure that they are signed up! Look for an email from the district, click on the link, and follow the directions to activate your account. It's that simple!

STUDENTS PRACTICE A LIFE-SAVING LESS

Seventh graders reviewed and practiced a common life-saving technique used to revive thousands of people annually, including a player on the Buffalo

Encouraged by the miraculous recovery of Damar Hamlin, students in Carolyn Wescott's health class began to ask questions about the medical attention given to the Bills player during a game in Cincinnati.

The interest prompted Ms. Wescott, a certified CPR instructor, to turn to Midlakes Aquatics coordinator Jack Hauber, another certified CPR instructor, to help lead seventh graders through a lesson on

Cardiac arrest claims approximately 350,000 lives a year, according to the American Heart Association. Survival rates are trending upward thanks to the quick-thinking actions of those spotting the signs early and knowing what to do to help.

"More and more people are finding out that it is not that hard to perform CPR," Hauber told students.

Hands-only CPR is the procedure used to apply chest compressions to manually massage the heart to pump blood through the body and help preserve brain function until more care can be provided. Immediate attention is often the key, such as in Hamlin's case, to ensure a positive outcome.

Those who think someone is suffering from cardiac arrest should check to see if the individual is awake by tapping their shoulder and asking if they are all



right. If they are unresponsive, call 911.

The American Red Cross, the American Heart Association, and other organizations offer training. Consult those agencies for specific information regarding CPR and additional training.

NEW FACILITIES DIRECTOR NAMED

The Phelps-Clifton Springs Board of Education has appointed a local resident with public sector experience to serve as director of facilities.

Ryan Tilburg was appointed on December 28 to take over for Michael Reifsteck, who left to join the Geneva City School District in a similar capacity. Tilburg, a resident of Manchester, brings approximately eight years of experience as assistant supervisor/ chief water operator for the Village of Shortsville Department of Public Works.

"Ryan fills an important role at Midlakes in helping to ensure that we properly maintain our buildings and grounds while anticipating future needs and projects," said Nick Ganster, superintendent of the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District. "He brings enthusiasm and a record of successful public service to our district. We're confident he'll provide valuable leadership to support student success."

Tilburg, a 2003 graduate of Newark High School, studied liberal arts and business at St. John Fisher College. He has construction and commercial driving experience, and at Shortsville helped maintain all water and sewer lines, removed

> snow, performed seasonal mowing and trimming, worked with engineers and writers on grant projects, and maintained open communication with residents.

"I am excited about the opportunities this new position provides me both professionally and personally," Tilburg said. "Midlakes has beautiful facilities, and we'll work hard to

maintain a safe, secure, clean, and healthy learning environment for our students, staff, and all those who visit our campus."

Tilburg will be responsible for the operation, maintenance, and compliance of district buildings and grounds, and will help oversee and plan any capital projects.

He is married with three children and volunteers as a coach in his children's youth soccer and basketball teams. His first day on the job was Jan. 12. ■

Midlakes' National Elementary Honor Society is led by advisors Erin Altman and Heather Bradley and participates in several community service projects throughout the school year.





MIDLAKES GRAD BECOMES NEW SRO

Deputy Edwin Resendiz (Midlakes '14) has already made an impact at school by building strong relationships.

A graduate of Midlakes High School recognized for providing critical aid to county residents has been selected as a second school resource officer to serve the Phelps-Clifton Springs Central School District.

Ontario County Sheriff Deputy
Edwin Resendiz (Midlakes '14) joined
Deputy Bob Holland on January 3 as
the district's second school resource
officer. Resendiz was selected
in conjunction with the Ontario
County Sheriff's Office, during a
process that included updating the
district's contract with the sheriff's
office, holding public hearings, receiving
public feedback, and approval from the
Board of Education.

"An investment in student safety is a great investment by the Board of Education and the community to ensure the health and well-being of our students and staff," said Nick Ganster, superintendent of schools. "Mr. Resendiz has been walking the halls, helping during arrival and dismissal times, and has already worked with students and staff. He embodies that community

policing attitude."

Deputy Resendiz works in both school buildings, although his office is in Midlakes Elementary School.

He joined the Geneva Police Department in 2019 and was recognized for providing life-saving care to a critically injured man from the department and the Ontario County Safety Council. Deputy Resendiz joined the Ontario County Sheriff's Office about a year ago.

He is also active in the school community through a variety of charitable and volunteer activities, which includes serving as a youth soccer coach. He is also bilingual.

"I'm excited to come back and work for the schools I attended, where my own children attend," Deputy Resendiz said. "I want our families and community members to know that I am here to keep our schools safe, and that's our main priority, but I am also here to build relationships with the kids. If you see me around, I am always smiling, saying 'Hi' and giving high-fives to everyone as much as I can."

SUSTAINABLE PUMPKIN PROJECT
