Camp Invention

Elgin Local Schools was proud to host Camp Invention from June 5th-9th again this year! Camp Invention is a confidence-boosting STEM summer camp where kids build creative inventions and lasting friendships. Led by qualified local educators, our camps offer new and exciting hands-on activities every year. In attendance were 95 campers, 3 Middle School Leaders in Training, 12 High School Leadership Interns, 9 staff members in attendance. These campers and leadership interns were from 12 different districts in Marion and surrounding counties, as well as home school students.

This year's modules were:

1) Pop-Up Venture. Children became innovative entrepreneurs as they designed their own mini pop-up business! Campers created a business plan and chose how to spend their startup funds. Employing their imaginations, they added lights, greenery, logoed signage, and other features to attract customers to their business. After inventing unique ways to distribute their products, children launched their businesses on Friday and were able to "buy" and "sell" their products with each group.

2) Catching Air- Campers built their own mini skate park with ramps, bowls and rails. They took an exciting ride through physics, design engineering, and art! Campers personalized their mini skateboards, created DIY skateboard riders and designed awesome skate park features. On Friday, students were able to grind the rails of innovation as they kickflipped their way through each other's one-of-a-kind skate parks!

3) MimicBot- Children investigated their inner workings of their very own MimicBot- a robot that mimics sounds- and transformed it into a one-of-a-kind animatronic stuffie! They found inspiration in nature, got hands on with design and use of the power of intellectual property to protect their stuffie from the idea-stealing "Copy Cat". Then campers took their stuffie home to keep creating and innovating!

4) Invention Celebration- To create the best celebration ever, children became confident event planners! They had fun engineering light-up party hats, inventing a Party Assistant to help with their big plans, explored color with bubble art banners, and experimented with sound as they created instruments. On Friday, children rotated between fun stations as they had a giant celebration for their amazing accomplishments.

Excessive Absence and Tardiness Issues

It is important for every student in Ohio to attend school every day. Missing too much school has long-term, negative effects on students, such as lower achievement and graduation rates. There are many reasons students miss school, but districts often can directly impact their students' attendance. By using data to identify and support students who may need extra support and services, districts can target supports to get students to school every day.

In December 2016, the Ohio General Assembly passed House Bill 410 to encourage and support a preventative approach to excessive absences and truancy. Beginning with the 2017-2018 school year, several changes take effect. Schools cannot suspend or expel students for missing too much school. Districts will amend or adopt policies that outline their interventions and plans for students who miss too much school.

Regular school attendance is an important ingredient in students' academic success. Excessive absences interfere with students' progress in mastering knowledge and skills necessary to graduate from high school prepared for higher education and the workforce. To support academic success for all students, the district will partner with students and their families to identify and reduce barriers to regular school attendance. The district will utilize a continuum of strategies to reduce student absence including, but not limited to:

- Notification of student absence to the parent or guardian;
- Development and implementation of an absence intervention plan, which may include supportive services for students and families;
- Counseling
- Parent education and parenting programs;
- Mediation
- Intervention programs available through juvenile authorities
- Referral for truancy, if applicable

DEFINITION OF TRUANCY AND EXCESSIVE ABSENCES

1. 'Chronic truant' is removed from the law;

2. Definition of 'habitual truant' changed from days to hours. The new definition is:

a. Absent 30 or more consecutive hours without a legitimate excuse; a. Absent 42 or more hours in one school month without a legitimate excuse; or

a. Absent 72 or more hours in one school year without a legitimate excuse.

3. Includes 'excessive absences':

a. Absent 38 or more hours in one school month with or without a legitimate

excuse; or

a. Absent 65 or more hours in one school year with or without a legitimate excuse.

TRUANCY IS DECRIMINALIZED WITH SEVERAL CHANGES

1. A district must remove 'excessive truancy,' from its zero tolerance policy for

violent, disruptive or inappropriate behavior;



TRUANCY IS DECRIMINALIZED WITH SEVERAL CHANGES

1. A district must remove 'excessive truancy,' from its zero tolerance policy for violent, disruptive or inappropriate behavior;

2. Students cannot be expelled or suspended (out of school) for being truant (beginning July 1, 2017); and

3. A district must take several steps to engage the student and his or her family before filing a complaint with juvenile court (including parental notification, an absence intervention team and an absence intervention plan detailed below). Juvenile court should consider alternatives to adjudication and adjudication should be used as a last resort. A complaint cannot be filed until:

a. after failed implementation of an absence intervention plan; or a. A child has been absent without a legitimate excuse for 30 or more consecutive hours or 42 or more hours in a school month during the implementation of an absence intervention plan.

STUDENT DISCIPLINE CHANGES

1. Schools may permit students to make up missed work due to outof-school suspensions per district policy; and

2. Schools cannot apply any remaining part or all of a suspension to the following school year, but the superintendent may require a student to participate in community service or an alternative consequence for the number of hours equal to the time left on the suspension.

EMIS REPORTING CHANGES

1. When a district notifies a parent that a student has excessive absences;

2. When a child has been absent without a legitimate excuse for 30 or more consecutive hours, 42 or more hours in one school month, or 72 or more hours in one school year;

3. When a child, who has been adjudicated an unruly child for being a habitual truant, violates the court order regarding that adjudication; and

4. When an absence intervention plan has been implemented for a child who is habitually truant.

DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES WHEN A CHILD HAS EXCESSIVE ABSENCES

When a student is excessively absent from school, the following will occur:

1. The district will notify the student's parents in writing within 7 days of the triggering absence;

The student will follow the district's policy for addressing excessive absences; and

3. The district may refer the student and family to community resources as appropriate.

HS/MS Attendance and Tardiness

DISTRICT RESPONSIBILITIES WHEN A CHILD IS HABITUALLY TRUANT

When a student is habitually truant, the following will occur: 1. Within 7 school days of the triggering absence, the district will do the following:

a. Select members of the absence intervention team;

a. Make 3 meaningful attempts to secure the participation of the student's parent or guardian on the absence intervention team.2. Within 10 days of the triggering absence, the student will be assigned to the selected absence intervention team;

3. Within 14 school days after the assignment of the team, the district will develop the student's absence intervention plan; and 4. If the student does not make progress on the plan or continues to be excessively absent, the district will file a complaint in the juvenile court.

Districts must establish an absence intervention team to be deployed only when a student is deemed habitually truant. Intervention teams for students excessively absent is at the discretion of the local district.

The purpose of the absence intervention team is to establish a student-centered absence intervention plan for every child who is habitually truant by identifying specific barriers and solutions to attendance. The team is cross-sector and ideally includes the participation of the student and the parent. This requirement is new and is aimed at breaking down barriers to attendance without filing criminal complaints against the student in juvenile court.

1. Districts with a chronic absenteeism rate of 5 percent or greater must establish absence intervention teams for students who are habitually truant beginning with the 2017-2018 school year;

2. Schools are permitted to have their own absence intervention teams, but the district is responsible for developing a team if the school does not have one;

3. Membership of each team should vary based on the needs of each individual student, but each team MUST include:

a. A representative from the individual's school or district;

a. Another representative from the school or district who has a relationship with the child;

a. The child's parent (or parent's designee) or the child's guardian, custodian, guardian ad litem or temporary custodian.

4. The district or school may consult or partner with public and nonprofit agencies to provide assistance, as appropriate, to students and their families to reduce absences.

Extra-Curricular Attendance Policy

Students involved in extracurricular activities must be present and in class by 11:15 am and must remain in class the remainder of the day. This represents the last half of the day of the contest or extracurricular to

participate in a contest/extra-curricular. Any student must be present the last half of the day to attend an extra-curricular activity. Exceptions are:

- 1. Death in family
- 2. Dr's Appointment due to a previous Illness or injury

3. Other problems that can be met with approval by the Administration

Parent/Guardian Responsibility When a Student is Absent

When a student is absent, the parent/guardian must place a phone call to the school prior to 9:00 AM. If a parent/guardian has not contacted the school, Elgin's Call Alert System will contact the parents at the number listed on the student's Emergency Medical Form (This system is set up to allow one number per student to be contacted or called.). Calls from students (even if they are 18 years old) or siblings are not sufficient.

In addition to a phone call to the school, documentation must be provided to the school to verify the student's absence upon returning to school.

All forms of excuses must be provided within (3) days of the student's absence.

If the school does not receive a written excuse from a parent or documentation for a super excused absence as listed below the student absence will be considered unexcused. Parental excuses for absences shall not exceed 34 total hours (five days) per 9 weeks. Therefore, parental excuses for absences in excess of 34 total hours (five days) per 9 weeks will be considered unexcused absences unless a valid written doctor's excuse, court documentation, funeral, religious holiday is provided. Failure to provide the "super excuse" may result in the school implementing an Absence Intervention Team for truancy with the student and his/her parents.

HS/MS Approved Snacks and Beverages during School Hours

HS/MS Approved Snacks and Beverages during School Hours Student Wellness is a very important piece in the academic lives of our students. During school hours, there are guidelines that students will need to follow in regard to this. Only water



or clear refillable water bottles are permitted during academic hours (7:30 - 2:35). All students have access to water fountains throughout the day. Students are encouraged to bring a CLEAR refillable water bottle that can be refilled at break times using the water fountains provided. Only snacks or other food items (aside from items sold from the cafeteria) approved by the administration, will be permitted.

The following actions may be taken:

- If students are found with an open energy drink or any beverages other than water, staff will request for the drink to be disposed of or confiscated and stored by a staff member until the end of the day if not opened.
- Failure to comply with staff requests to dispose of energy drinks or any beverages other than water to school, such as behaviors listed below will lead to further disciplinary consequences and contact will be made with parents/caregivers.
- Consuming the energy drink or any beverages other than water rather than providing the drink to staff or refusal to dispose of the open energy drink or other beverages other than water into a trash container will be given immediate disciplinary consequences.
- Food and drink (with the exception of water) is not permitted in the halls, gymnasium, stairwells, DMC, or courtyard.

Welcome back to the 2023-24 school year at Elgin High School!


As we begin the 2023-24 school year, we are excited with the opportunities that our students will have in preparing for their futures! We all anticipate and look forward to what this school year will bring!
