

You throw a stone off a bridge. One... two... Splash! The stone hits the water. Have you ever asked yourself how fast the stone was accelerating? Well if you haven't, the physics lab has figured it out for you!

Acceleration is the rate at which velocity changes, meaning that the stone is speeding up as it gets closer to the water. The average acceleration due to gravity (g) on Earth is 9.81 m/s2 (meters per second, per second; meaning that every second, speed increase by 9.81 meters per second). Yet this can vary slightly depending on your distance from the center of the earth. Mount Nevado Huascarán in Peru has the lowest g on earth, at 9.76 m/s2; and the Atlantic Ocean has the highest, at 9.83 m/s2.

We wanted to find the exact acceleration due to gravity here at Letchworth. To figure this out, we measured the distance from the top of the stairs to the boomerang, and then dropped a pencil from the top of the stairs and timed how long it took to hit the boomerang. After several trials, we calculated a class average of 9.95 m/s2 for the acceleration due to gravity. Although our answer came out larger (a result, most likely, of some inconsistency in our experiment, like reaction time), it is within range of the accepted value.


Mr. Hess Returns to College

Student Accident Insurance

Families Are Responsible For Paying Bills Resulting From Student Accidents / Injuries. Letchworth Central School is not required to offer student accident insurance; however, as assistance to families, the Board of Education does purchase a "scheduled insurance" which provides minimal coverage.

If the family insurance plan does not completely cover the medical bills, the school's insurance will help as "scheduled" for each type of injury. Families are responsible for any remaining amount after the school's "scheduled" insurance payment. Remember though, that the school's coverage is only minimal coverage.
