Li'l Abner is a classic American musical from 1956 that is based on the comic strip Li'l Abner by Al Capp.

Hoops For Heart, Mrs. Mosiman

For going on thirty years now, Lockwood Elementary School has been supporting the American Heart Association via their Hoops For Heart campaign. According to the World Health Organization, cardiovascular diseases are rated as "the number one cause of death globally." The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention asserts that one of every four deaths in the U.S. are attributed to heart disease. So what are a bunch of jump-roping, hoop-tossing kids going to do about this world-wide crisis? Quite a bit, actually. 


BoxTops for Education has an app

Lab Notes

Look at this object:

How would you describe a complex object like this to someone who couldn't see it? In physics lab, Mr. Rad challenged us to describe a similar object clearly enough so that someone who hadn't seen it could build an exact replica.

Clear, easy to follow instructions were difficult to come up with. We tried to be very specific by mentioning color, shape, size, direction, and location. We encouraged the builder to ask questions for confirmation.

Ultimately, we ended up building a mirror image of the original object. This most likely happened because we alternated between absolute and relative directions. Relative directions use a person's own perspective, like forward, backward, left or right. Absolute directions use things everyone agrees on like landmarks or compass directions.

This lab taught us to communicate more clearly. It is important to understand the other person's perspective. It is also important to realize that sometimes people may interpret your words differently than you intend them so make sure communication goes two ways with both parties trying to understand what the other actually means.

NYSSMA Sr. High Area All-State Zone 2

November 15-16 Letchworth Central School Music hosted New York State School Music Association (NYSSMA) Zone 2 High School Area All-State. The district welcomed two choruses, a symphonic orchestra, and a concert band. The honor ensembles featured the top 400 high school musicians from 51 schools in Western New York who auditioned the previous year at NYSSMA Solo Festivals. The two day event included rehearsals with prestigious guest conductors and two concerts on Saturday.

This event was a collaborative event with NYSSMA, Genesee Valley School Music Association (GVSMA), and Letchworth CSD Music Teachers. A special thank you to Mr. Campbell, Mr. Brant, Mr. Decker, Mrs. Raymond, and the rest of LCS who helped out with the event. Congratulations to Mr. Wartinger for being an outstanding organizer and host for the event. He made LCS proud.



Composer in Residence

In the constant pursuit of new ways of engaging his musicians, Mr. Decker is collaborating with the composer Mr. Glenn McClure this academic year. Together this past Fall they applied for a grant through the Arts Council for Wyoming County for a collaborative cross curricular project.

With the help of science teachers led by Mrs. Blackburn, students in science classes will gather scientific data and translate numerical data sets into visual representations (charts, graphs, etc.) with standard scientific methods. They will then work with Mr. McClure to translate this data into an audio representation. Students will use modular mathematics to translate numerical data into melodies and harmonies. Melodies and harmonies generated through this sonification process will provide the raw artistic material for a new band piece that will be performed by the LCS Jr. Band (grades 7-8).

The instructional design requires an integrated approach that will bring Music and Science together, culminating in a collaborative musical work. Music curriculum often focuses more on performing existing music rather than creating new music. This project will support this underserved part of the music curriculum. Science and Math curriculum will benefit from leveraging the motivational qualities of music for the promotion of hard science skills. All participating teachers will help design project activities to ensure that students will be building upon/reinforcing existing curriculum.

Mr. McClure and Mr. Decker were awarded a grant to fund the project through the Arts Council this January. Please attend the concert Thursday, June 11, 2020 at 7:00 pm to hear the new work's premier performance.
