a journey Like no other

How the Class of 2023 embraced an abnormal high school experience

THE JOURNEY BEGAN ON AUGUST 1, 2019, the first day of an atypical four years of high school. Like many freshman classes before them, the Class of 2023 was awkward, scrawny, and at a loss when it came to finding unity and identity as a group. When their first high school Spirit Week came around in January of 2020, they struggled to find cohesion and spirit and, as a result, ended the week behind the eighth graders and finished in fifth place. However, like every freshman class before them, they looked forward to having the next few years to improve their school spirit and bond together to become one unified class. Unfortunately, things just didn't go their way.

A few months following Spirit Week 2020, the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic upset the routines and lives of people worldwide in unprecedented ways. For the Class of 2023, their final freshman quarter became their first experience of online school. They went on to spend their sophomore year divided into Alpha-Omega groups and lost staple high school experiences like their sophomore and junior camps, athletic competitions, and Spirit Weeks.

Come August 1, 2022, the Class of 2023 found themselves at the start of their senior year, faced with the challenge of leading a new generation of underclassmen through a school year without COVID-19 restrictions.

When Spirit Week 2023 rolled around, the seniors were an unproven class; no one could say for certain if they could muster enough unity and spirit to serve as adequate role models for the underclassmen. However, to the surprise of many, the absence of Spirit Week activities from the past two years did not suppress the senior class's school spirit but stimulated it. Reflecting on her class's first place win at this past January's Spirit Week, senior class vice president Trislyn Maeda stated, "This year, our class really understood that this was our last year, and that we had an opportunity to introduce Spirit Week to the other classes and say, 'This is how we do Spirit Week; this is how you be seniors; this is how you have fun at school.'"

For senior Azure Wasson, one factor that helped the seniors win the Mana Cup was their newfound appreciation for a "normal" senior year. He believes that the pandemic taught his class not to take in-person interactions for granted. Wasson is an extrovert and struggled with adapting to online school as the isolation from his peers adversely affected his grades. "I just could not get myself determined to do anything," he said. "But, coming back from that, I've learned to appreciate things a lot more. [The pandemic] gave me a lot of time to actually think about other people and how I wanted to present myself to other people. Although it was really difficult while it was happening, I learned a lot from it, and it improved my character later on."

Another defining moment for the class, according to advisor Ryan Frontiera, was their sophomore end-of-the-year social. It was the first time the class was allowed back on campus all together. Although it was a simple, scaled-down social with small group activities like Spike Ball and s'mores roasting, Frontiera remembers the event as a "therapeutic" moment for him and his fellow advisors. "Seeing that visual of [the students] together and laughing was just so nice to go back to," he said. "I feel like they, as a class, know how to enjoy each other as well."

Maeda also holds a special place in her heart for that first in-person sophomore social, referring to it as one of the council's "biggest successes." However, she credits a big part of her class's growth to the senior advisors. "We have the best group of advisors, and I think all of our class agrees with that," she said. According to her, the advisors are an experienced group of teachers and counselors, who "understand what it takes to create a great class and make the officers' jobs so much easier." The senior class vice president also appreciates how the advisors have given her and her fellow officers opportunities to lead while also providing them with lots of coaching and support. Instead of giving up on class activities during the pandemic, the advisors took the time and effort to organize them and set up "a foundation for [the officers] to be involved and make an impact on the class."

One piece of advice from the advisors that has stuck with Maeda is this: "It's really easy to get mad when things don't go right or

when the class isn't really responding in the way that you planned. Instead of getting on them or talking as if you're an authority [figure], you have to speak to them as if they're your peers and lead in a positive way [so that] they can respond well to it," she shared. Maeda hopes that future council members will remember this insight when it is their turn to lead.

Senior advisor Sean Shiroma will also look back fondly on his time with the Class of 2023. He believes that the seniors have made an impact on HBA in their efforts to interact with and develop friendships with other grades.

At the same time, the class has gained some notoriety from their antics such as fishing tilapia out of the Nu'uano stream. "As much as it sometimes rubs me the wrong way, I do appreciate them just wanting to lighten the mood.... They make every day a unique day," Shiroma said.

As they depart from HBA and enter adulthood, Frontiera hopes the Class of 2023 does not lose their distinct spunk and positivity that they've kept since their freshman year. "When you go to your different colleges and communities, make a point to build community and gather people around you," he advised. "Don't just hole up in your dorm room and play infinite hours of video games or make your small group of friends. Try new things and explore. And still keep some of that joy, optimism, and enthusiasm that you guys have always had."

Commencement Address

Ryan Frontiera, Senior Class Advisor
(excerpt from his speech below)



...we are called
to life with grace...

The Parable of the Sower

Matthew 13:3-9

...“A farmer went out to sow his seed. As he was scattering the seed, some fell along the path, and the birds came and ate it up. Some fell on rocky places, where it did not have much soil. It sprang up quickly, because the soil was shallow. But when the sun came up, the plants were scorched, and they withered because they had no root. Other seed fell among thorns, which grew up and choked the plants. Still other seed fell on good soil, where it produced a crop—a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown. Whoever has ears, let them hear.”

“At HBA we’ve adopted a set of Expected Schoolwide Learning Results (ESLRs) of humility, curiosity, love, and commitment. These core values capture what we want HBA students to embody through their education here. I want to reread the way we chose to articulate the value of love:

*Love is our response to all people in light of God’s love for us.
With grace, we live, learn, and play together in community,
realizing that God designed us to be mutually dependent.*

This captures the messy, inconvenient, but totally generative and life giving nature of how we are called to interact with the world around us, and especially with each other. While life would be easier and simpler if we didn’t have to “deal with” other people, that’s not how we were created to exist. Instead we are called to life with *grace*—the undeserved and freely given mercy we share with others, because we have first received God’s grace. And the more you pour in, the greater the harvest you will receive.

I pray that as you leave HBA, you go and choose to see and love the world for what it is, and that you add to the communities that you encounter. May what you pour into your life lead to a vastly greater harvest and output than you could explain or expect.”



A crowd of 348 students, coaches, parents, and guests gathered at the annual event that recognizes all of the HBA students who participated in varsity sports during the past school year for HBA, PacFive, or other combination teams.

The varsity banquet is one of the few opportunities during the year to bring together the students, coaches, and parents from various varsity teams and sports, so it serves as a time of fellowship and closure at the end of each sports year.

This year eight teams were honored for winning their respective ILH Division 2 Championships. These were girls tennis, boys tennis, girls basketball, boys basketball, boys bowling, Pac-Five softball, Pac-Five girls soccer, and Pac-Five boys soccer.

Additionally, girls cross country won their ILH Division 1 Championship as that sport is all-inclusive at the league level (all students compete together, regardless of school enrollment). Over the past 30-plus years, 2019 and 2022 are the only years that a small school has won the ILH Division 1 title in this sport dominated by large schools. On both occasions, it was HBA who rose above all others.

Four teams won HHSAA Division 2 State Championships this year; boys cross country, girls cross country, Pac-Five girls soccer, and Pac-Five softball. HBA's boys bowling team and the Pac-Five boys soccer team finished as State Runners-Up.

How the Class of 2023 embraced an abnormal high school experience

Since January, HBA's track athletes had been training in hopes of competing in this year's state championship, which was hosted on Maui on May 6. The team returned with three medalists: Senior Shane Kawakami-Williams won the 100-meter and 400-meter state championship titles, senior Jordy Davenport took home the second place medal for the 400-meter dash, and senior Ashley Kodama won the bronze medal in both the 1500-meter and 800-meter dash.

The Eagles finished ninth out of 29 schools for the girls and eighth out of 29 for the boys.


Kawakami-Williams had his eyes on the state championships all season. "For the first time since I've been in high school, we get to have States on another island, so we get to go on a trip," he said at the start of the season. He and fellow senior Zachary Oka also competed in long jump during the regular season. HBA had not participated in a field event since 2018. Although neither of the boys were able to qualify for the event at States, they were very excited to try something new this season. "I really want to show to kids from HBA that maybe want to jump in the future that you can do anything that you put your mind to if you try hard enough. You don't have to be limited by what school you come from or what you know, just teach yourself," Kawakami-Williams said.

The track team trained six days a week, rain or shine. Practice ran from 3:30 to 6:00 p.m. and meets ran for five hours or more. Sophomore Jared Crestetto said he spent about 20 hours a week going to both practices and meets. He believes in being disciplined both inside and outside of practices. "Throughout the season, I generally try to get enough sleep each night and hydrate regularly to help with recovery and to prepare for workouts," he said.

For senior Ashley Kodama, last year's 1500-meter state champion and current third place medalist in the 1500-meter and 800-meter dash, injury prevention is also a very important part of a healthy runner's daily routine. "I usually also spend about 15 to 45 minutes before or after

practice to work on some prevention and recovery—rolling out, hypervolt, etc.,” she explained. Kodama also put a lot of effort into preparing for meets days in advance.

For these athletes, running is as much a mental game as it is physical. Crestetto appreciates how the competition makes him stronger. “I like to remind myself that there’s always somebody out there working harder than me right now, and telling myself that I don’t have to run- I get to run,” he said. Anxiety is another hurdle for these athletes. Senior Jordan Davenport, who won the 400-meter state title last year, shared that the achievement of winning became a burden she had to bear this year. Early in the season, she said, “I know that people will be watching me, especially at the state meet, and I’m scared to see how I’ll do. Everyone has gotten so much faster this season compared to last year, and I might not be able to win States again.” At this year’s state competition, Davenport finished second with a time of 58.84 seconds, a mere second

behind Tolani junior Mia Shepard, who clocked in at 57.13 seconds and set a personal record.

When it comes to the most enjoyable aspects of the sport, runners on the team consistently bring up the community feel of the track team. Although Kawakami-Williams competes in individual events, he said, “I don’t think

The competitive aspect of the sport is also a highlight. With the intermediate season behind her, eighth grader Rylee Sato reflected on her favorite parts, saying, “The best part about competing would have to be seeing who the competition is, and making friends from other schools... One day I think it would be cool to be one of those people that others are scared

freedom. Throughout this track season I have learned that running is my way of worshiping God. Every practice run and every race I compete in is ‘for Him.’ The best thing about racing is to run for God and trust his plan always,” she stated.

As the seniors end their high school running career, they have some advice for incoming runners. “Put in the effort. Many freshmen and sophomores turn to track to fill their second sport in getting exempt from P.E., but just because you run track for the P.E. credit doesn’t mean you have to slack or not give any effort to the workouts or races,” Davenport said.

Kawakami-Williams agreed, saying, “Stay consistent and go 100% in everything. If you really want results, you need to do more than just show up to a race. Take care of practice, take care of recovery, take care of races, and you’ll be fine.”

The HBA varsity golf team has achieved numerous accomplishments that have positively impacted HBA Athletics over the years. However, coming out of a successful 2021–2022 season, the varsity team saw many seniors graduate, with the boys team losing two players and the girls team losing three. While this may have felt like a blow to the team, freshman varsity golfer Jacey Kage has been a bright spark this season.

Kage is a first-year high school golfer but is already on the Varsity 1 team. She started playing golf at the age of five, and out of all the sports that she has tried, it is the only sport that she has stuck with. “I chose to play golf because I always seemed to excel at the sport, and I also picked up interest in the sport,” said Kage. “I was starting to really enjoy being out there on the golf course and [participating in] competitions.”

However, when Kage was younger, she did not always enjoy playing the sport. “I thought that it was boring and not useful, and [I] was thinking of quitting. With an average of 75, Kage was fourth overall

in scoring average for the ILH girls division during the regular season. She had the lowest scoring average out of both the HBA boys and girls Varsity 1 teams. “I have a few goals for the season, but one goal that I am going for is to place well in States, maybe top 10,” Kage said before the season ended.

The boys and girls state championships were held at the Wailua Golf Course on Kaua’i in May. There were not enough girls to qualify for a team score for HBA, so Kage played for an individual score instead. She ended up shooting an 81 on the first day and a 79 on the second day to finish with a tie for 16th place.

While she did not achieve her goal to be in the top ten, Kage will have many more opportunities to showcase her skills in the next few years of high school. “What I hope for in future seasons is to do better than in previous years and to make a name for HBA and also myself in golf,” Kage said. “I enjoy the competitions and [meeting] other junior golfers. I also enjoy the different places that we get to travel [for] golf and the new experiences.”

Looking back on her first varsity season, Kage recalls many memorable moments off and on the course. She said, “Some of my favorite moments in the golf season were [playing] fun games with the team during practice and also winning one tournament for HBA.” Kage believes that she made the right decision to play golf and thinks that the sport has really helped her to grow. “Golf has taught me in so many ways. Funding Opportunities for Students

Financial Aid and Scholarships

Last year, Hawai'i Baptist Academy awarded more than **\$1.5 million** in financial aid, scholarships, and merit based scholarships. These scholarships are made available by the school and many generous donors who have established annual scholarships and scholarship endowments.

Hawai'i Baptist Academy offers several different types of scholarships annually:

EAGLE'S WINGS SCHOLARSHIPS

We have over 100 scholarships from various generous donors and other supporters of HBA, ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000. These scholarships are awarded in addition to the financial aid award offered by HBA. These scholarships are open to students who qualify for financial aid in the upcoming 2024-2025 school year. There is no GPA requirement to apply for an Eagle's Wings scholarship.

ENDURANCE SCHOLARSHIPS

We have over thirty scholarships ranging from \$1,000 to \$2,500. The selection committee considers scholastic achievement, artistic achievement, volunteer service, leadership and extracurricular activities.

These opportunities are open to all current and incoming HBA students meeting the minimum 3.0 GPA requirement (or elementary equivalent). These scholarships are merit based and not dependent upon financial need.

SENIOR SCHOLARSHIPS


There are several opportunities open to all current 12th grade HBA students. These merit based scholarships are available for graduating seniors to apply towards their college tuition. There is a separate application process that takes place in the Spring semester.

APPLYING FOR SCHOLARSHIPS

HBA will be announcing the Eagle's Wings and Endurance scholarship processes in August, with the deadline after fall break. This will allow students to work on their application during the fall break for the 2024-25 school year.

In addition to the email announcement, a Financial Aid tile has been created in the MyEagle parent portal, which provides further information regarding the financial aid process, including FAQs and further instructions of how to apply through our financial aid platform.

Students can apply for either the Eagle's Wings **OR** the Endurance Scholarship. The scholarships use a common application form and common reference forms (two reference forms are required). The process for both scholarship opportunities are exactly the same.



ABOUT FINANCIAL AID

HBA is committed to providing necessary financial aid support to all families who qualify. There are various factors that play a role when determining financial aid support, therefore we highly encourage **ALL** families to apply. All information submitted will be reviewed carefully and confidentially by a third-party verification system. Awards are distributed to students on the basis of financial need.

The financial need methodology takes into account many aspects of the family's financial situation: income, assets, core expenses, debt, family size, and number of children at tuition-charging schools.

In addition to financial need, HBA relies heavily on the four core values throughout this process: humility, curiosity, love, and commitment. Each individual family's situation is considered. Those who desire to continue receiving financial aid must reapply each year. Please note that one year's financial aid support does not guarantee the same amount for the following years.

Students applying and qualifying for the Eagle's Wings scholarship will automatically be considered for the Endurance scholarship if the minimum GPA or elementary equivalent is met, and vice versa if the family qualifies for financial aid.

Award decisions will be made in the spring to students enrolled for the upcoming 2024-2025 school year by a selection committee that will consider an applicant's qualifications for any scholarship that he or she may be eligible for. Only one scholarship will be awarded per student.

These scholarship awards, both financial need and merit based, makes a Christian college-preparatory education accessible to all students who desire one. The impact of a scholarship has an effect felt far beyond the student helped.

TIMELINE FOR CURRENT STUDENTS TO APPLY FOR BOTH FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS

Mid-August: Scholarship applications open for current HBA students for the 2024-2025 academic year.

Mid-October: Financial aid applications accepted for current HBA students for the 2024-2025 academic year.

October 20: Scholarship deadline for current HBA students.

December 1: Scholarship deadline for incoming applicants to HBA.

March 1: On or before March 1, the first round decisions will be emailed to current HBA students.

Early to mid March: First round financial aid decisions and scholarship awards will be emailed to new applicants to HBA Grades 6–12.

Mid to late March: First round financial aid decisions and scholarship awards will be emailed to new applicants to HBA Grades JK–5.

April to May: Scholarship awards will be emailed to current HBA students

May: Second round decisions emailed to current HBA students who missed the December 1 deadline.

Over the years, our family has been blessed by scholarship support from generous donors of HBA.

My dad, who recently passed away, raised us to give and to have a servant heart in everything we do. In hopes of continuing his legacy, I established a scholarship in his name. I want to honor my father and the way he lived his life: faithful, generous, and always bringing glory to God. Honoring my father and giving back to HBA goes hand in hand. As a multi-generational HBA family, I hope to instill those same values in my son, so that he may carry on his grandfather's legacy.

Faculty Spotlight

Ross Mukai

Excerpts from this year's 2022-2023 Yearbook Faculty Dedication

Proverbs 15:15 tells us that “the cheerful heart has a continual feast.” The person to whom the 2023 yearbook is dedicated brings such cheer to the HBA community that merely bringing his name up in conversation elicits genuine smiles.

ON THEIR FIRST DAY ON THE JOB, IN THE FALL OF 1996, a handful of new HBA teachers arrived in their best work attire and waited for orientation to begin. At the last moment, in ambled a young man in board shorts and slippers, conspicuously chewing gum. He may or may not have been wearing a towel around his waist—reports vary—but what is certain is that one of the first rules the principal made clear that day was “No chewing gum on campus.”

That young man ended up devoting his life to HBA. As his past and present roles attest, he is committed to living, learning, and playing together in community. He has served as class advisor for almost every grade from 7th through 12th, coached different sports, held the position of department chair, and played electric bass in the chapel praise band. His wife also taught at HBA for several years, and all three of his children have been enrolled at the school.

In some capacity over the past quarter century, he has taught a wide variety of skills, among them surfing, cooking, bridge-building, origami, water-balloon-launching, and one year, even sewing. However, most students will remember Ross Mukai best as a running coach or a math teacher.

Mr. Mukai started HBA's cross-country team in 2001. Popular from the get go, the team soon boasted over 100 students each year. With the help of a cross-country alumnus, Mr. Mukai later expanded HBA's running program to include track. Willing to go to great lengths to give his runners an edge, Coach Mukai experimented with water exercises; various physical therapies, mental training; and the perfect blend of powder, water, and syrup to make the daily after-workout “juice.” Hundreds of students have benefitted from the teams, which have also earned HBA a number of awards and honors. Although Mr. Mukai has now put aside his stopwatch to focus on being a dad, his legacy continues in the hands of several current coaches who were once his runners.

In a similar way, Mr. Mukai continues to pass down his passion for mathematics: at least four of his students have returned to HBA as math teachers. Students say Mr. Mukai is stern yet knows when to lighten the mood. Colleagues respect his versatility; he has taught almost every course in the department from middle school math to calculus and from algebra to AP Statistics. He even developed a class—Logic and Reasoning—to share his love of puzzles, games, and logic challenges.

Mr. Mukai, we admire your dedication, your generosity, your pragmatic outlook, and your ability to laugh. Thank you for showing us what it means to have a cheerful heart and to feast continually on the abundant life God has given us.

Often described as friendly, dedicated, and kind, Mr. Steve Louis served as a security guard at Hawaii Baptist Academy for 20 years. He was the first person to greet families, faculty, and guests with a smile, often putting others before himself. He had a way of welcoming students while at the same time making sure that everyone on campus was safe.

Mr. Steve grew up in New York. Believe it or not, he was the shortest of 13 siblings who were all extremely tall. His mother was 5'11", his father was 6'9" and his youngest sister (of 14 children) is 6'3" tall.

Mr. Steve served in the military for 17 years. He was stationed at Fort Bragg in California and served in the 82nd Airborne Division of the United States Army on combat tours in Afghanistan, Iraq and Kuwait. As a paratrooper, he made more than 119 jumps from aircraft with parachutes on specialized missions and served on a bomb squad. He was dropped into areas before troops arrived to make sure they were cleared of bombs. He truly believed in the “one for all and all for one” where the 240 personnel in his unit were family.

When Mr. Steve was asked what his favorite Bible verse was, without hesitation he said Psalm 7:1, “The LORD my God, I take refuge in you; save and deliver me from all who pursue me.”

He gives God credit for him being alive today as he knows that God saved his life several times when he served in the military.

After 20 years of service to HBA, Mr. Steve and his wife decided it was time to retire. In retirement he is looking forward to fishing, lots of football, a trip home to New York to visit family and maybe even a trip to Africa! We are honored to know you and are thankful for you, Mr. Steve Louis. Congratulations on your retirement!


HBA's Endurance Society
