## Students

## Parent/Guardian Bill of Rights

- 1. Parents/Guardians have the right to know what their students are being taught:
  - The District will provide Parents/Guardians public access to the curriculum.
  - The District will provide Parents/Guardians public access to the latest version of the state's academic standards and learning benchmarks.
  - The District will provide Parents/Guardians timely notice of any school's plan to eliminate gifted and talented programs.
  - The District will provide Parents/Guardians public access to a list of books and reading materials available in the school library and online at the elementary, middle school, and high school grade levels.
  - All schools will make all supplementary materials used in the classroom available for public review.
  - All schools will provide Parents/Guardians timely notice on their website of any third party coming onto campus to present to students or host an event during the regular school day.
- 2. Parents/Guardians have the right to be heard:
  - The District will provide at least two in-person school meetings with Parents/Guardians each year.
  - Parents/Guardians will be allowed to address the Board of Education on issues impacting the education of students in the District.
  - The District respects the First Amendment right of Parents/Guardians to assemble and to have a say in their student's education.
  - The District should consider parental feedback when making decisions related to the education of students in the District.
- 3. Parents/Guardians have the right to protect their student's privacy.
  - The District will not give or sell student data for commercial purposes.
- 4. Parents/Guardians have the right to access information on the District's website regarding all of the following topics:
  - OUSD's adopted Local Control and Accountability Plan and Overview of Local Performance Indicators.
  - OUSD's adopted District Budget
  - How to opt out of comprehensive sexual health education.
  - School choice options.
  - Immunization requirements.
  - How to review statewide standardized assessment results.
  - How to qualify their student in gifted or special education programs.
  - How to inspect instructional materials, including curriculum materials.
  - How to participate in parent-teacher associations.

- How to opt out of any local educational agency-level data collection relating to their minor student not required by law.
- Student privacy policies and procedures.
