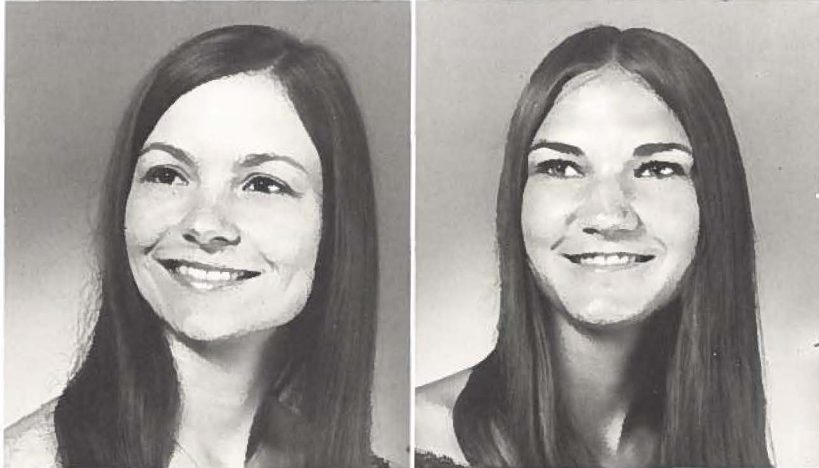
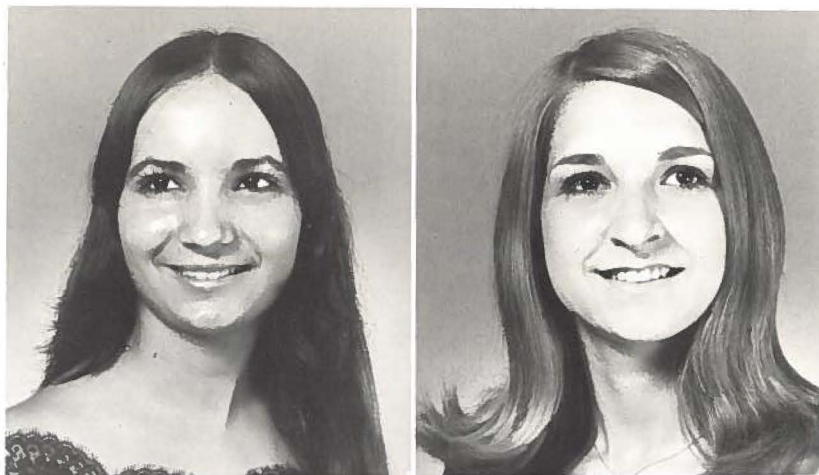
Incarnate Word Academy, established by the Order of the Sisters of the Incarnate Word and Blessed Sacrament in Corpus Christi, is the only private school for girls in the city. The aim of the school is the development of young women dedicated to their responsibilities toward God, society, and self. Emphasis is placed on the intellectual and moral virtues required to build a Christian character.

In their centennial year in Corpus Christi, the Sisters have re-dedicated themselves to the service of the Incarnate Word through their main apostolate of teaching. A statement of commitment to service drawn up at the close of the order's general chapter promises continued work in the South Texas area: "Strengthened by the traditions of the past, we move into a new era with hope and courage, recognizing the enormity of the task before us ... "

Students participated in a Centennial Salute to their teachers on April 28 with a special Mass and historical skit in the gym.



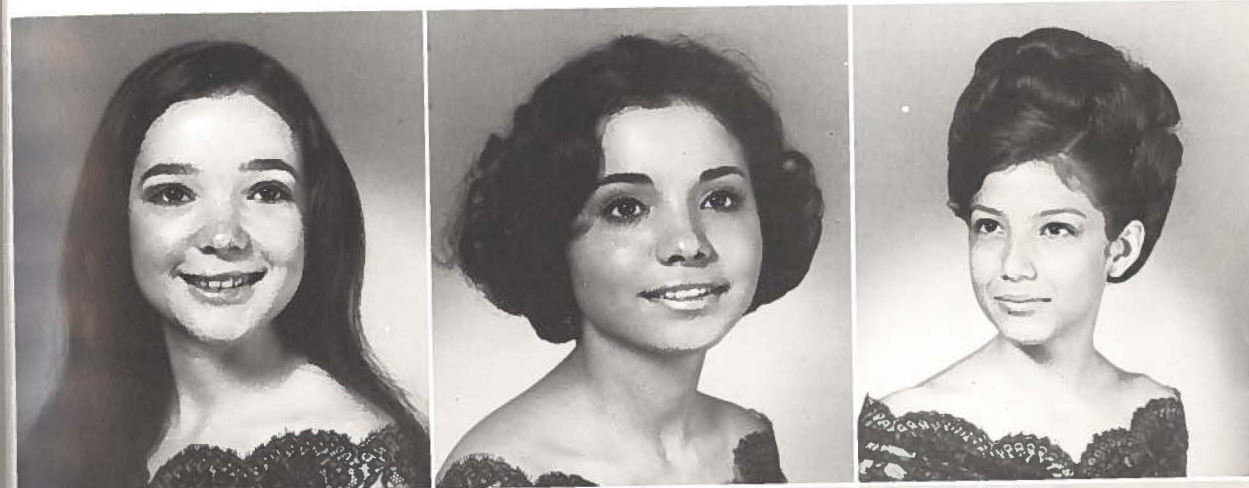

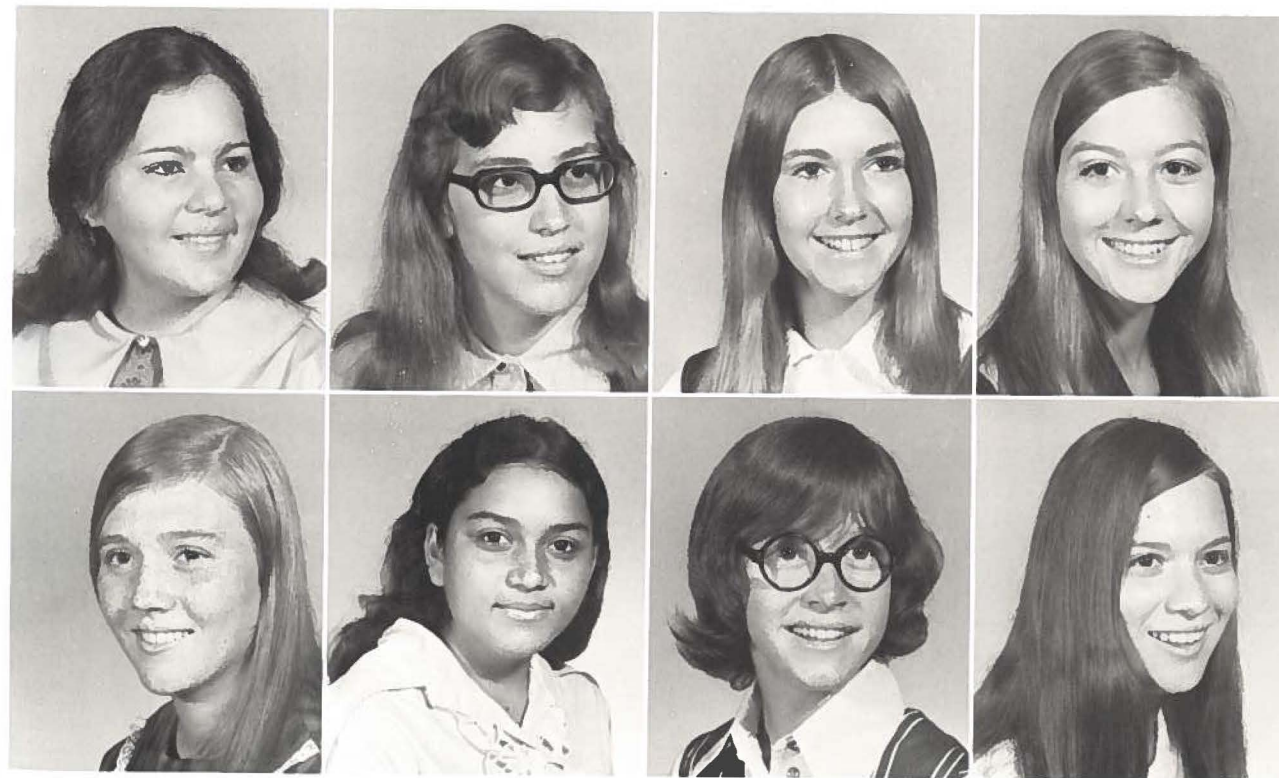

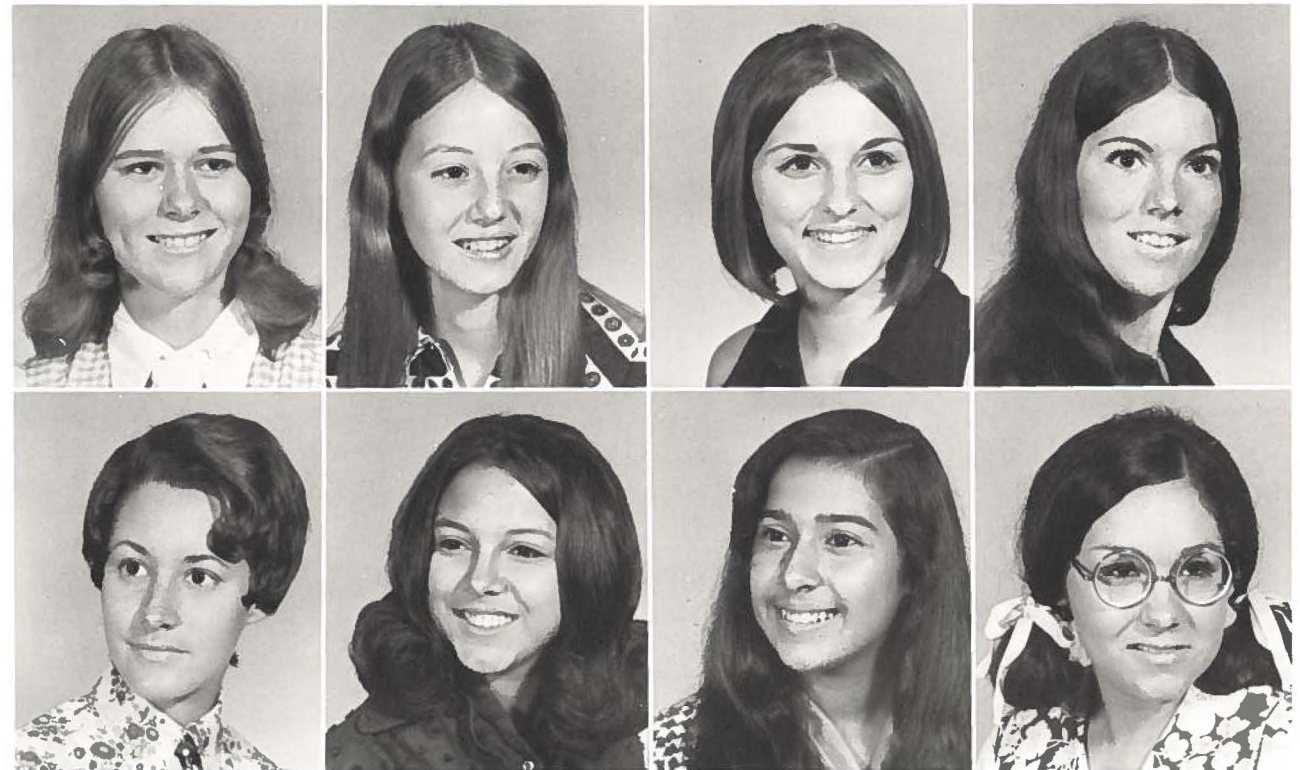
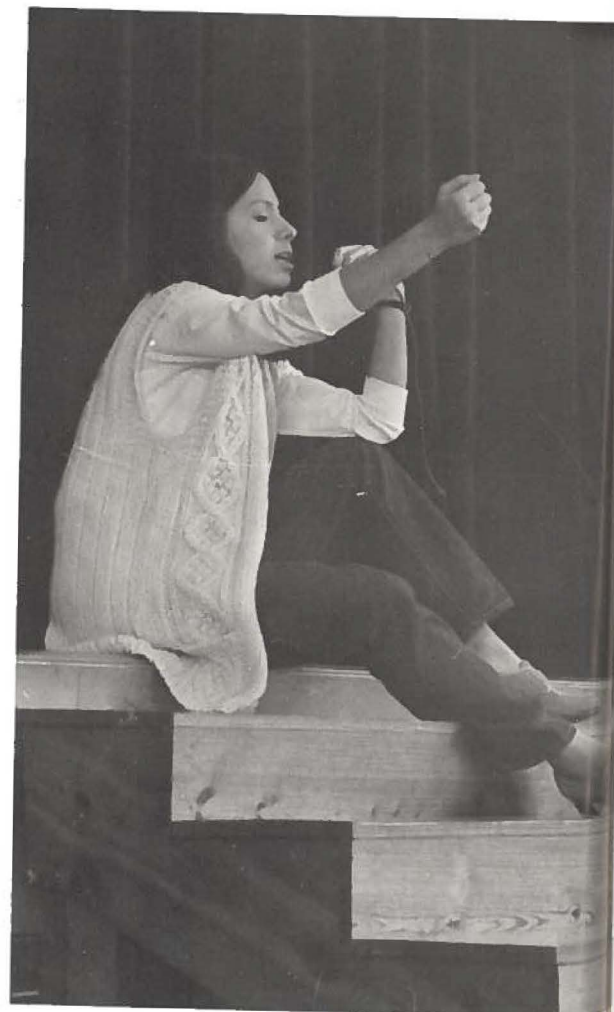
JUNIORS PARTICIPATE IN GOVERNMENT WEEK

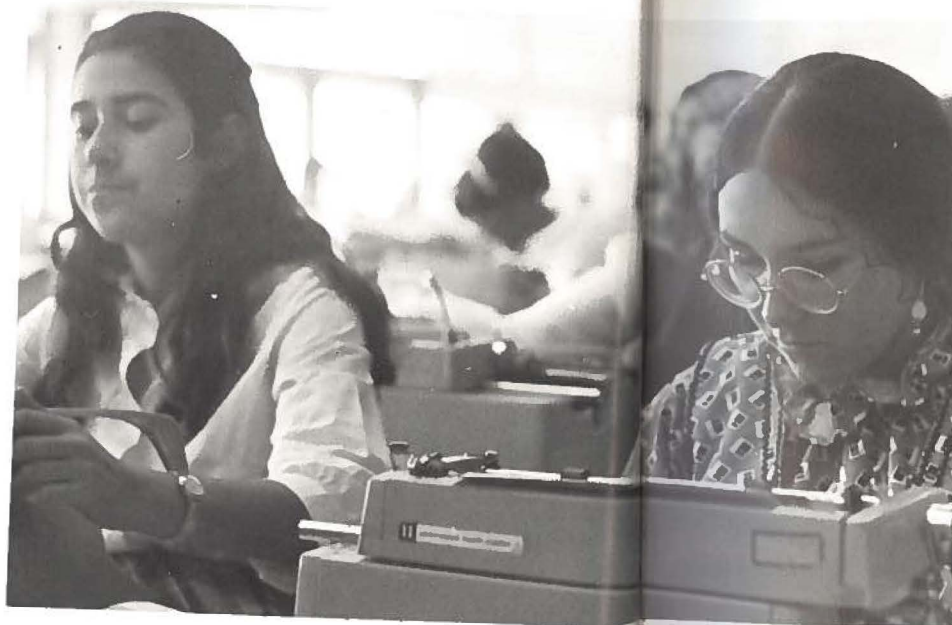

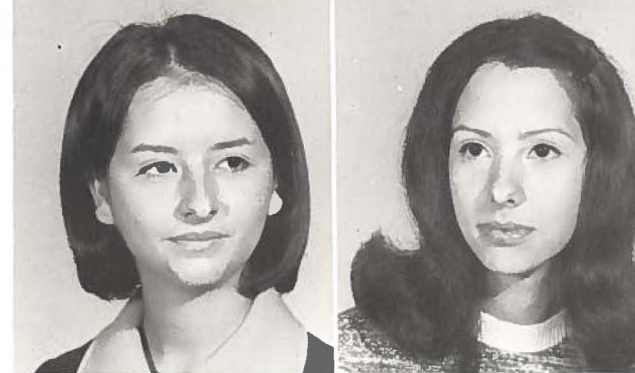

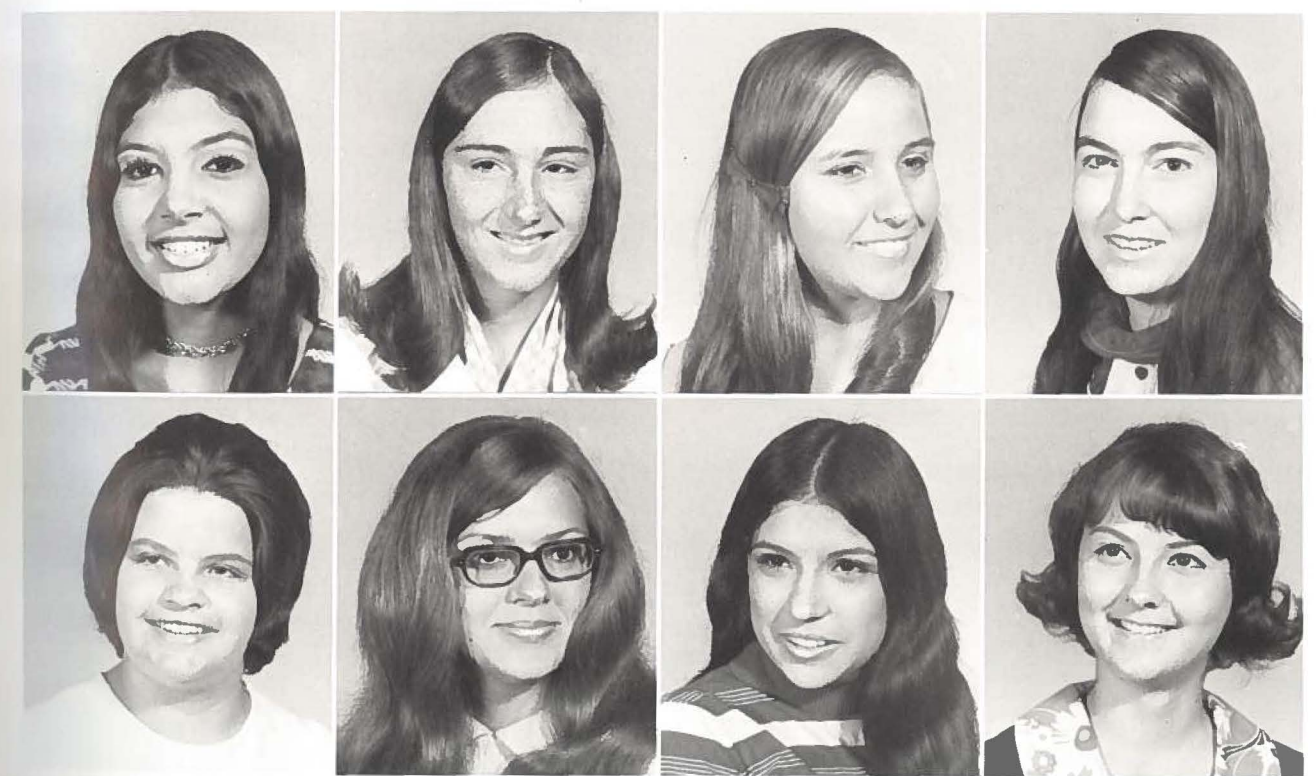


LIBRARY PROJECTS CONFRONT JUNIORS

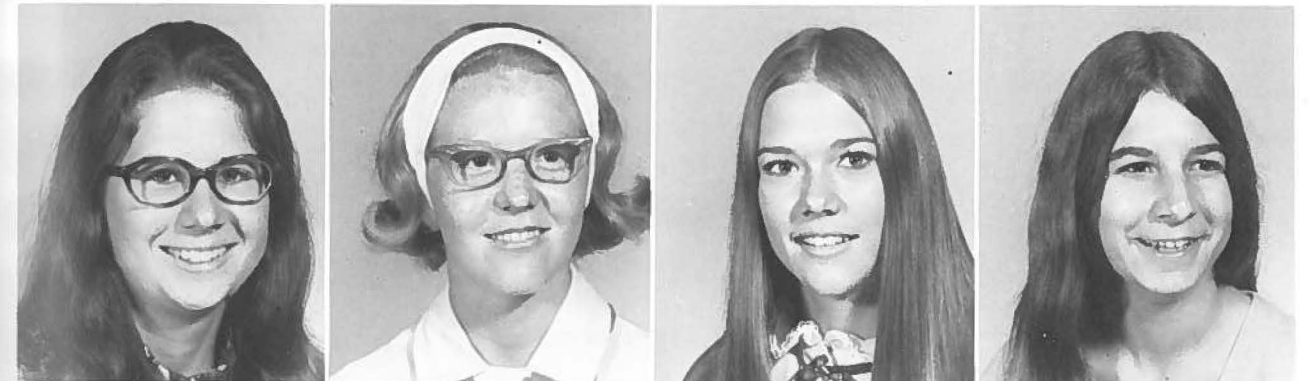

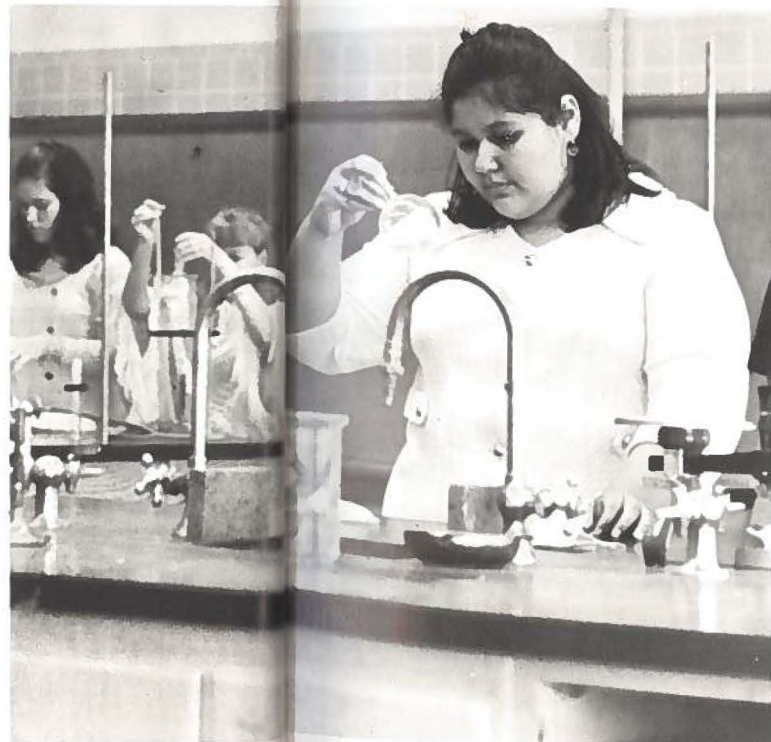

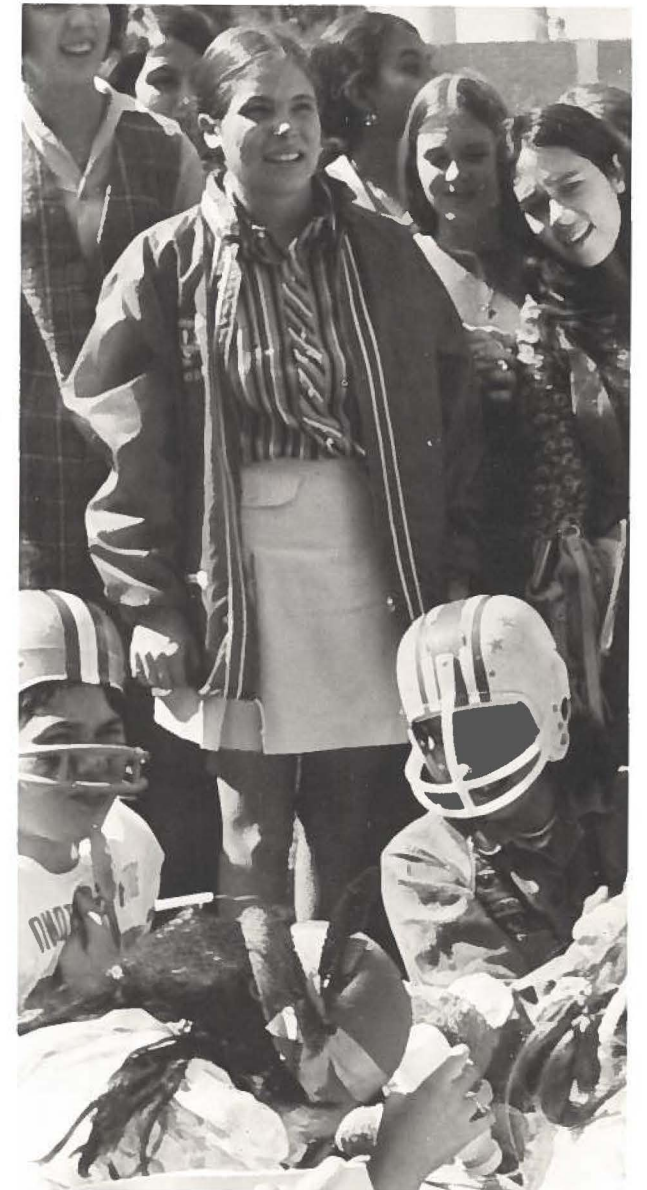

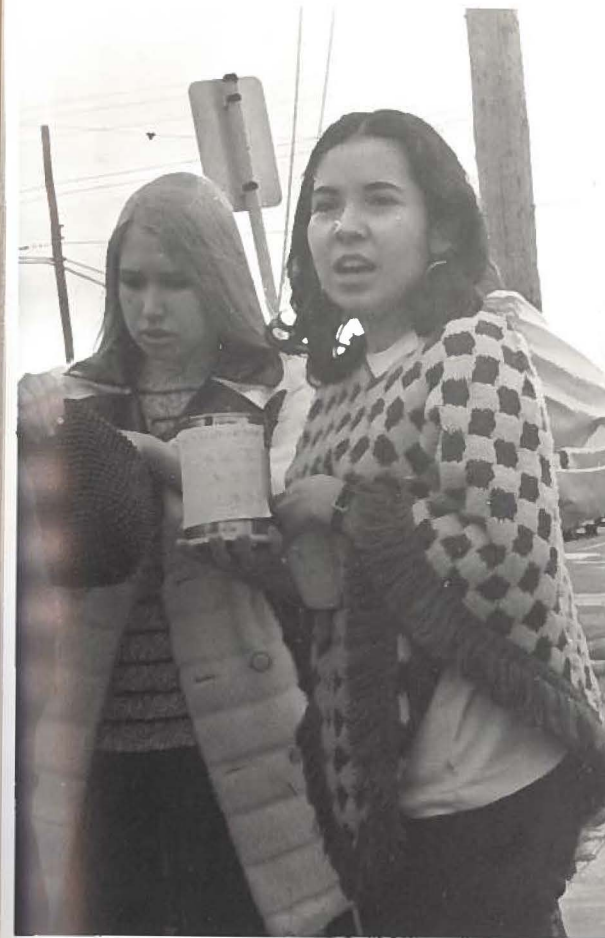

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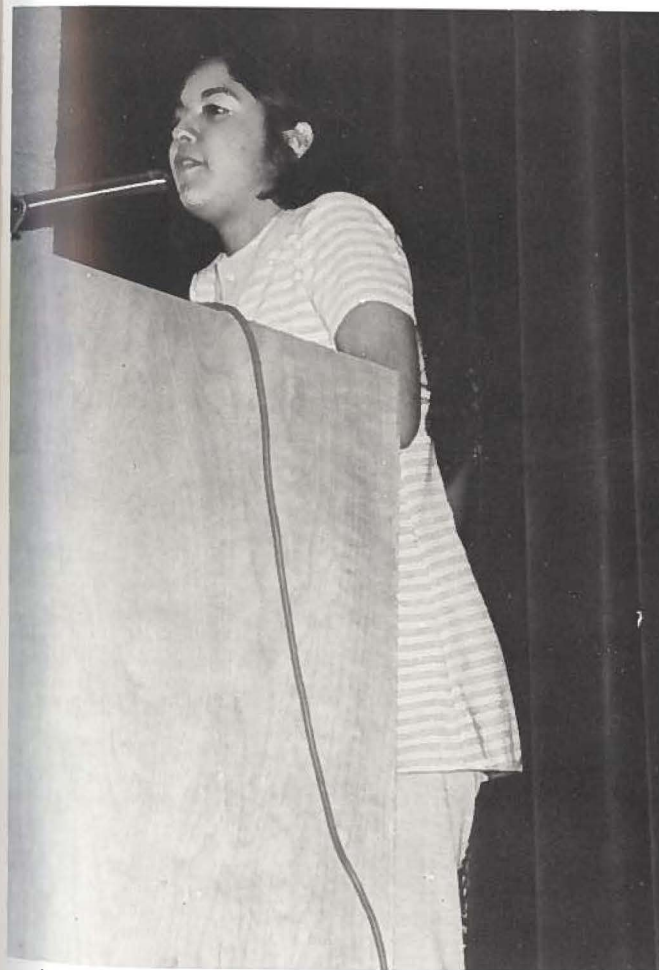

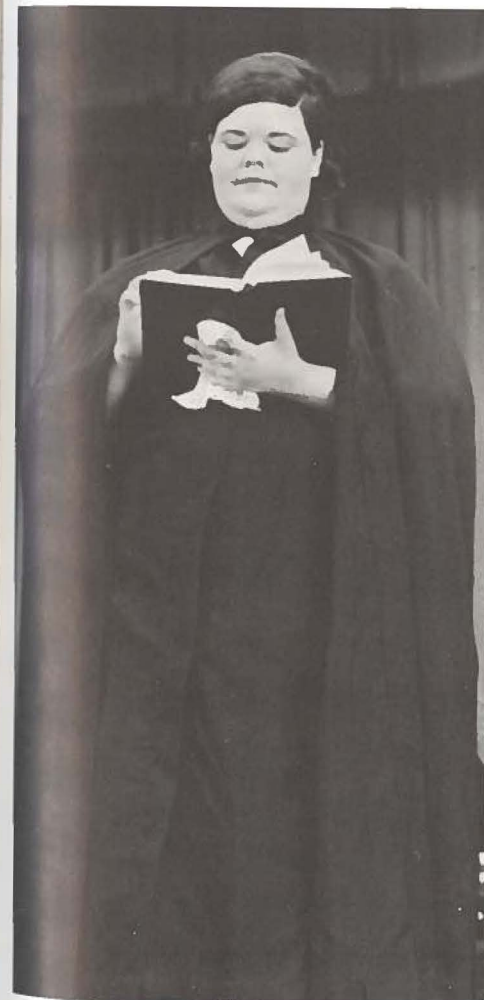

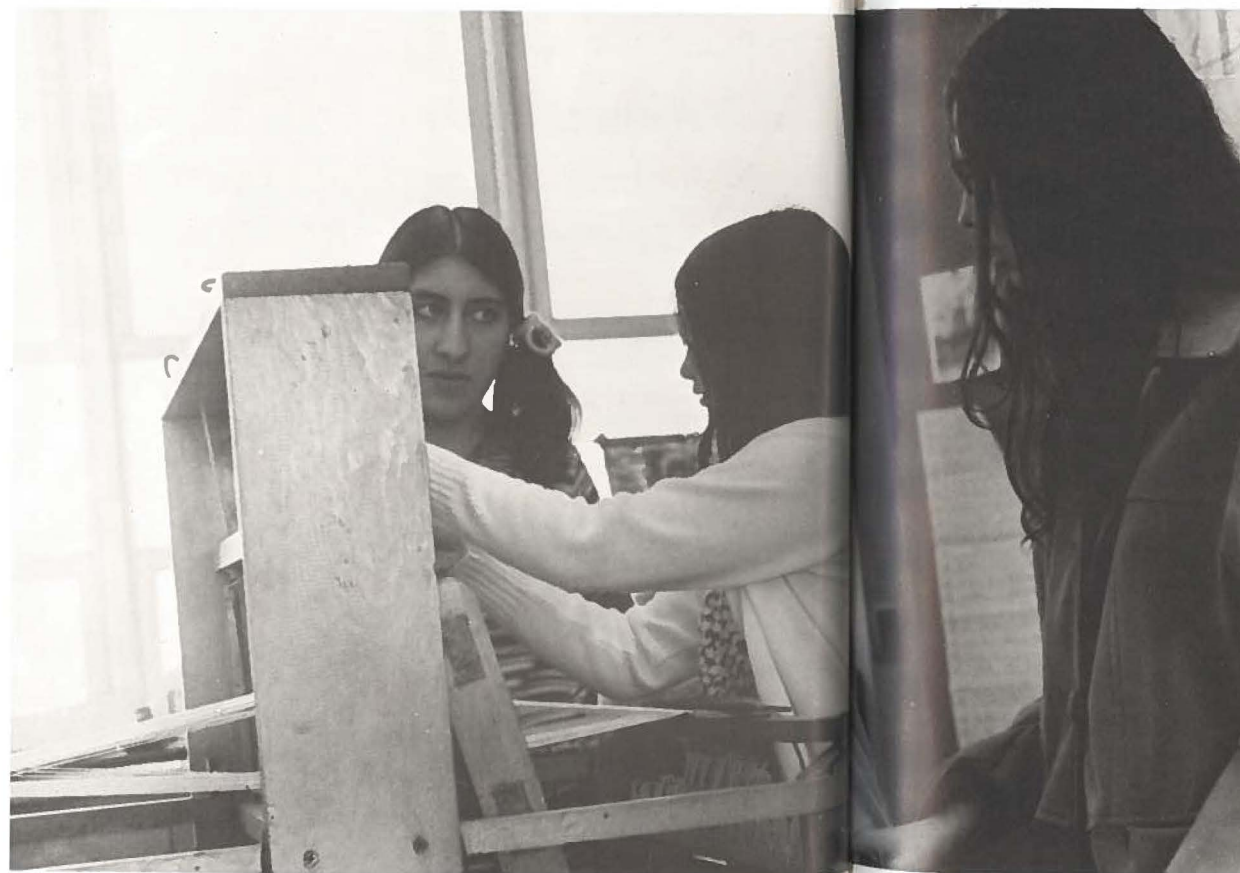
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Art I and II students learn techniques using different colors and designs. Throughout the year they work with oil painting, sketching, clay, calligraphy, and weaving.

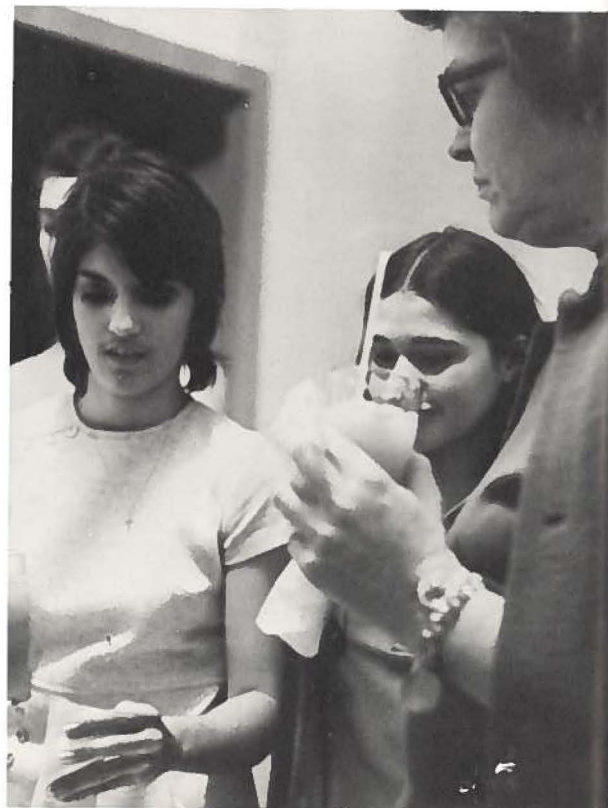

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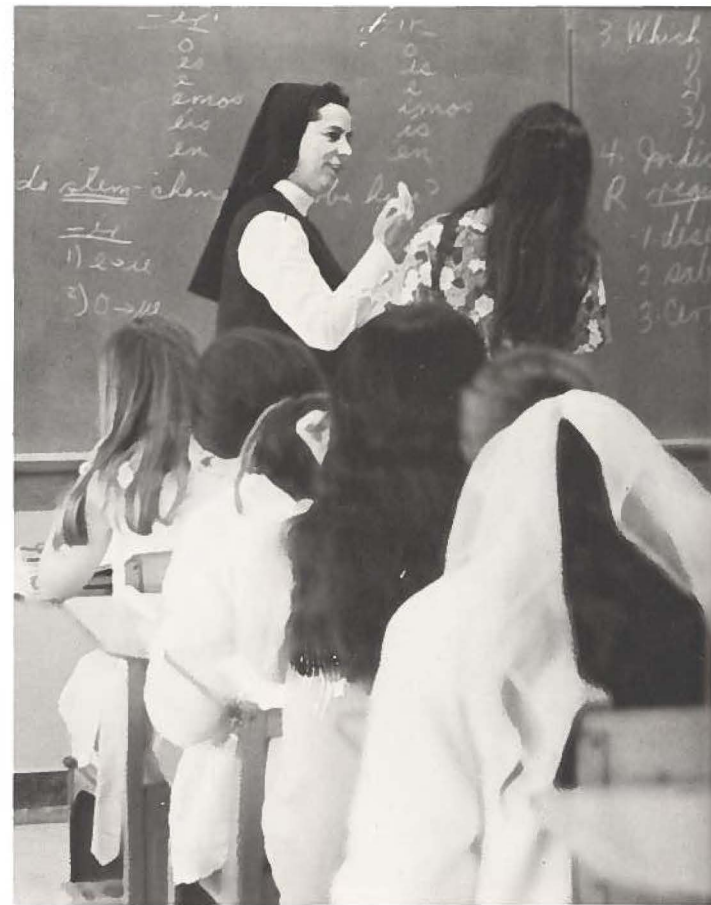
FOREIGN LANGUAGE, P.E. TAKE MENTAL, PHYSICAL STAMINA

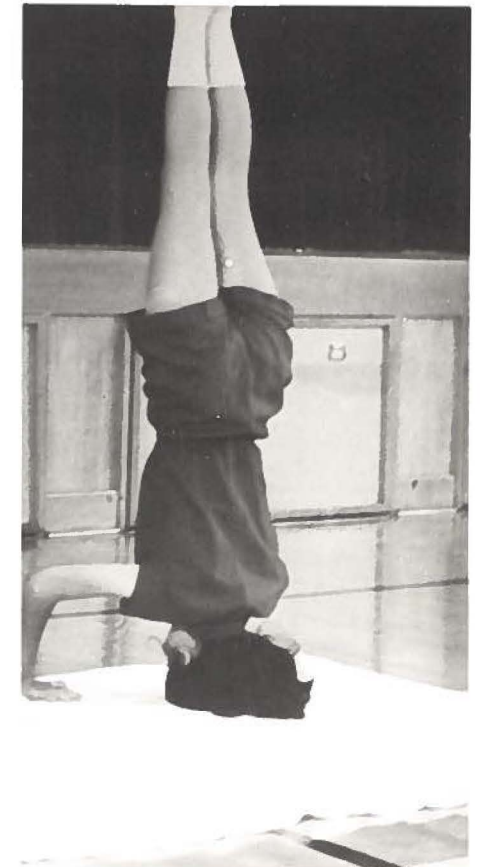
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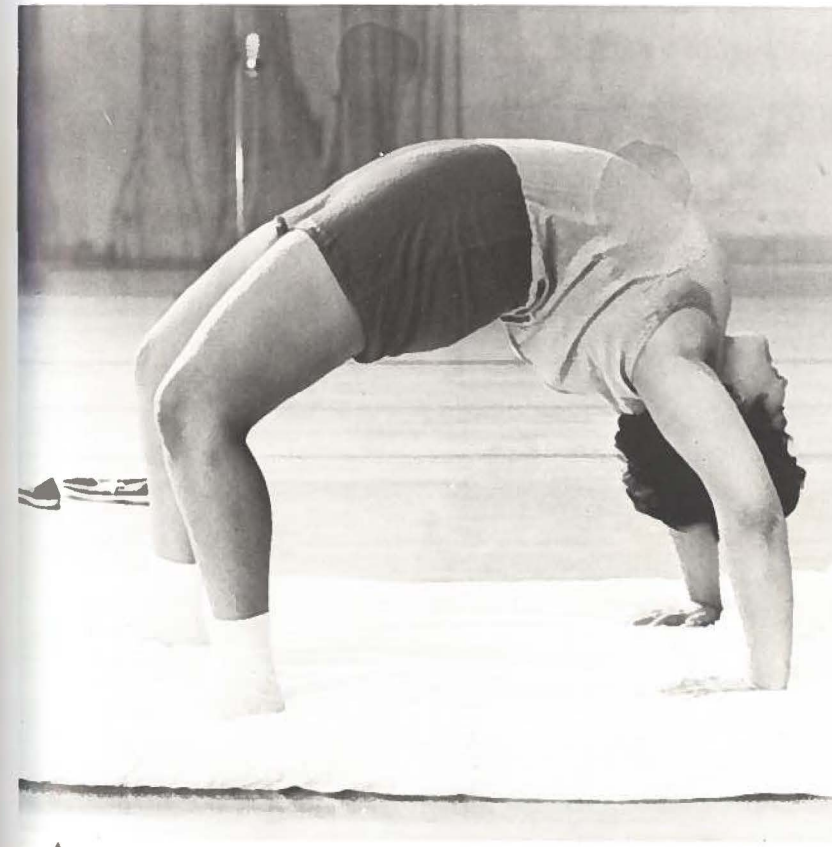

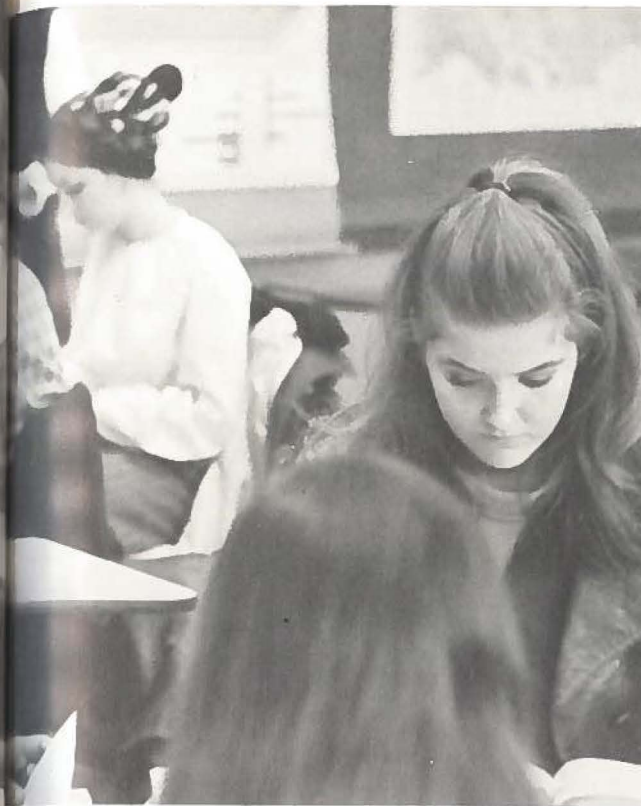

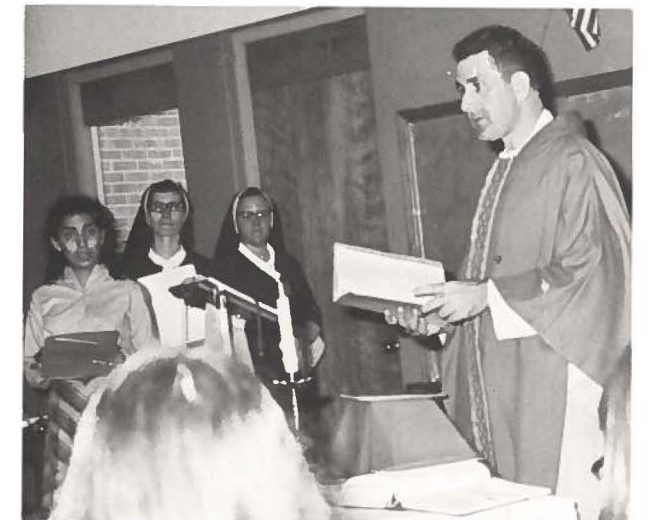

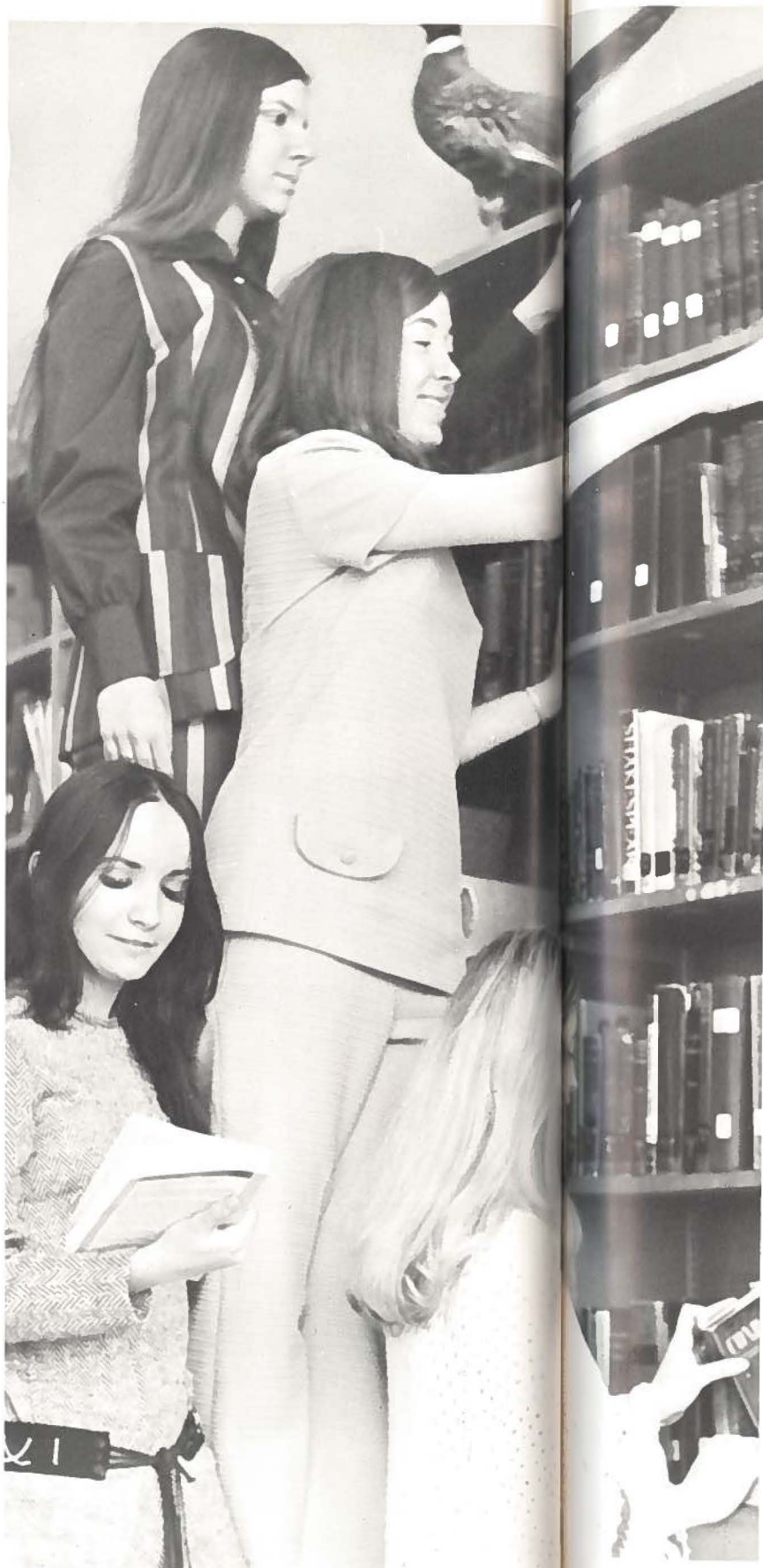

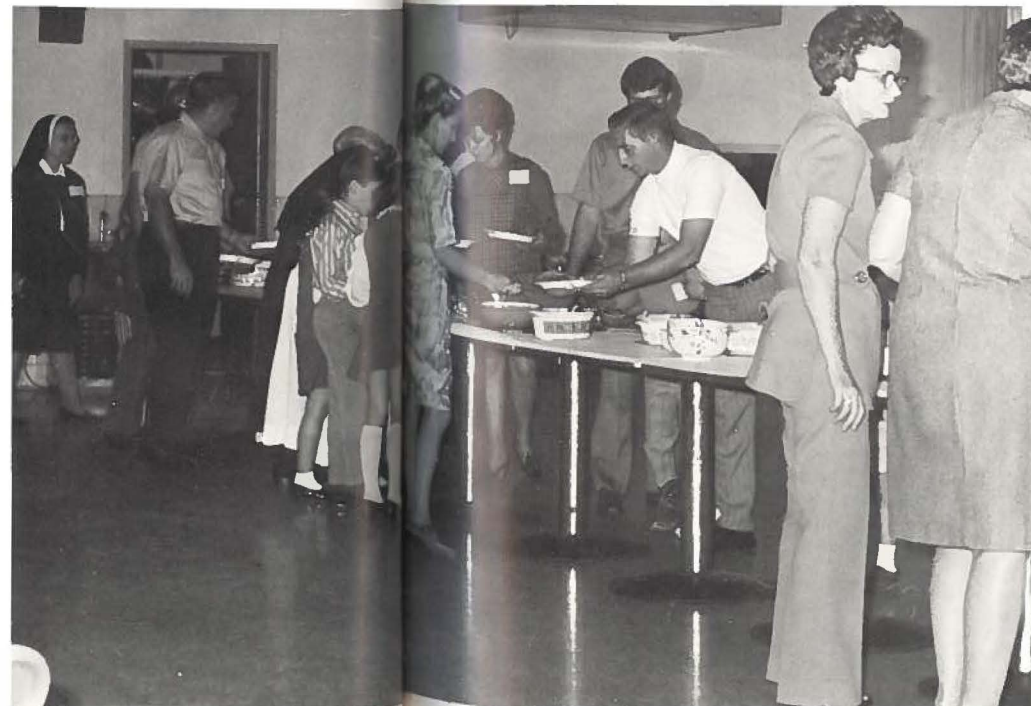
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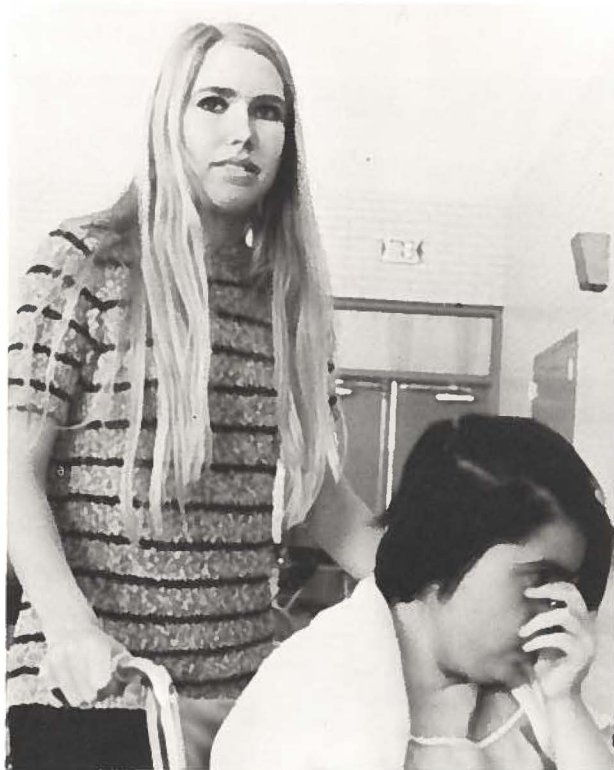


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CONFRATERNITY PROVIDES TEACHERS

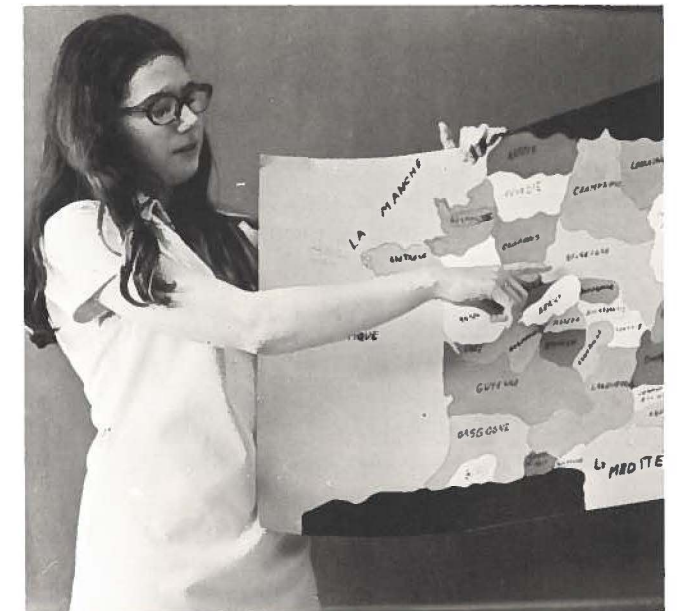

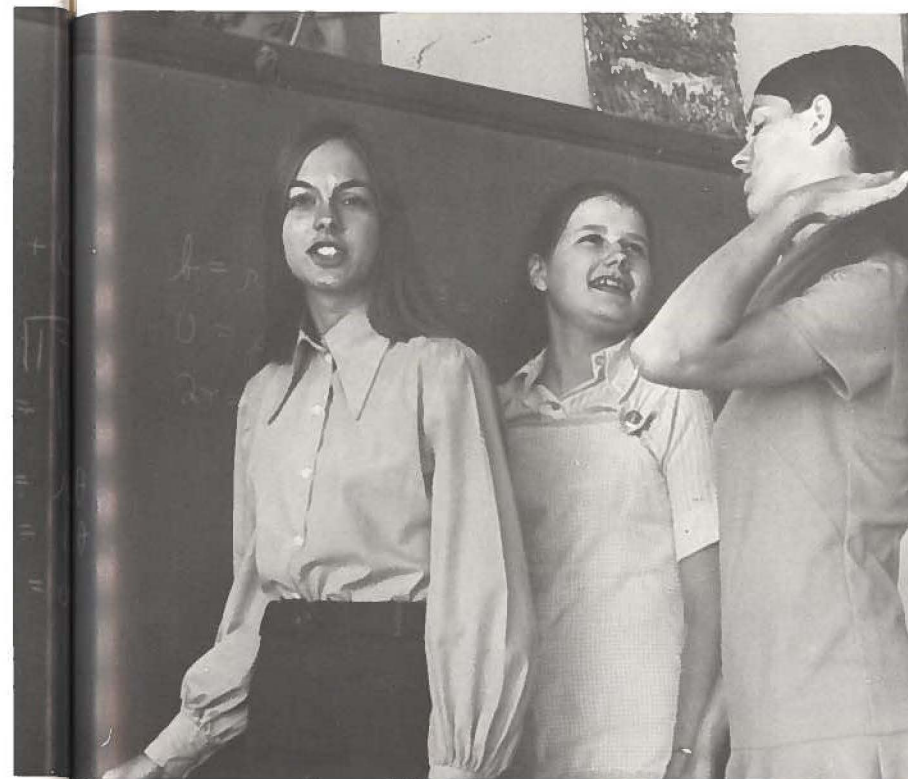

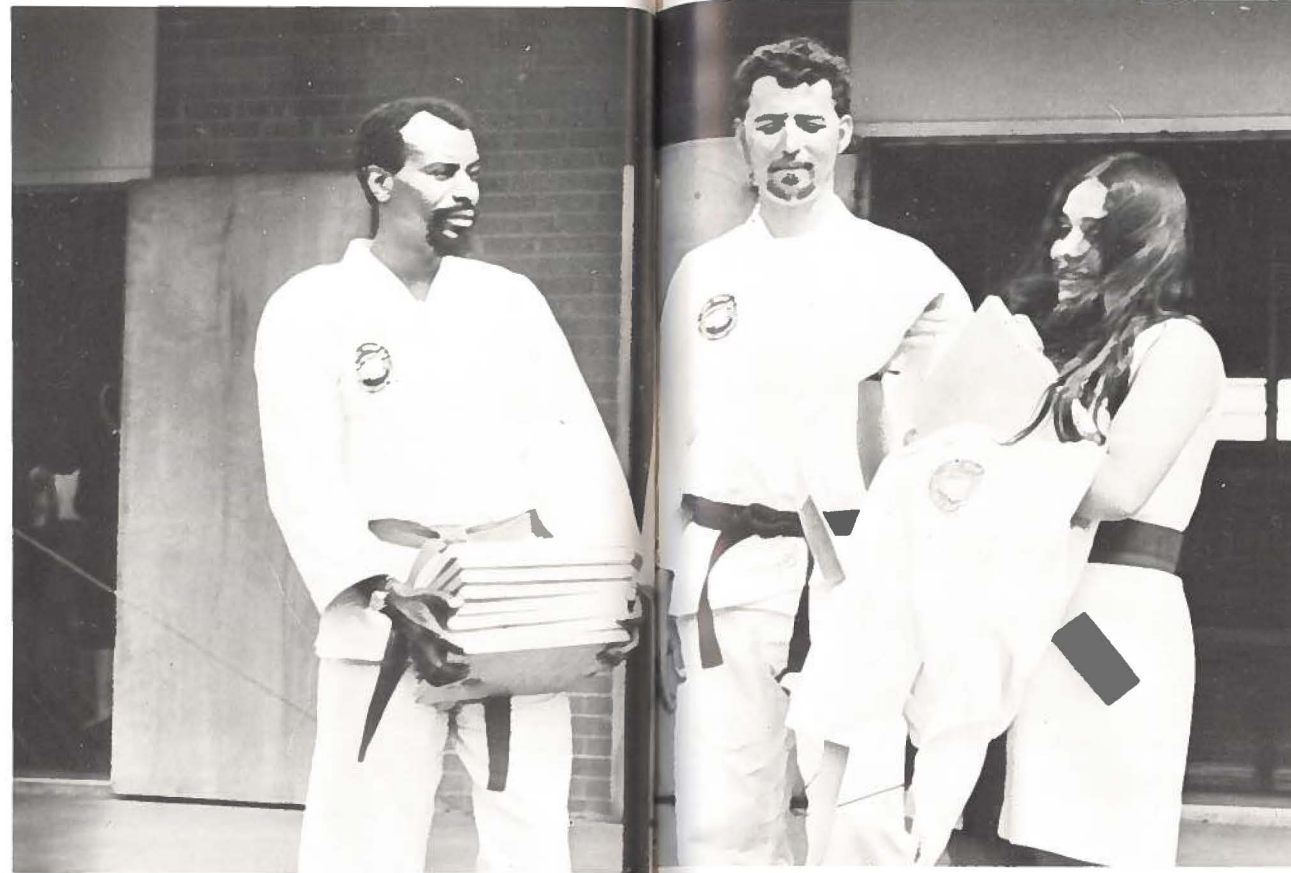

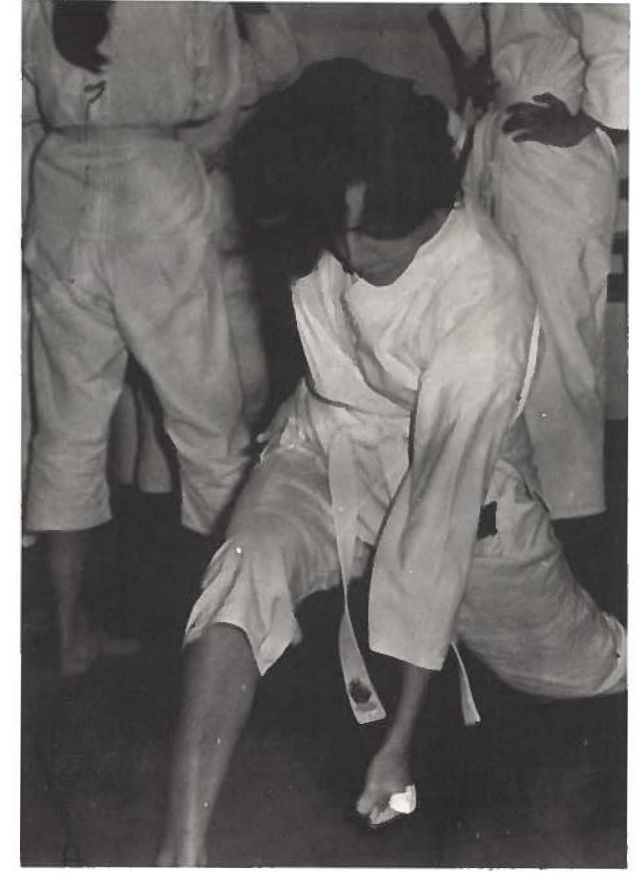

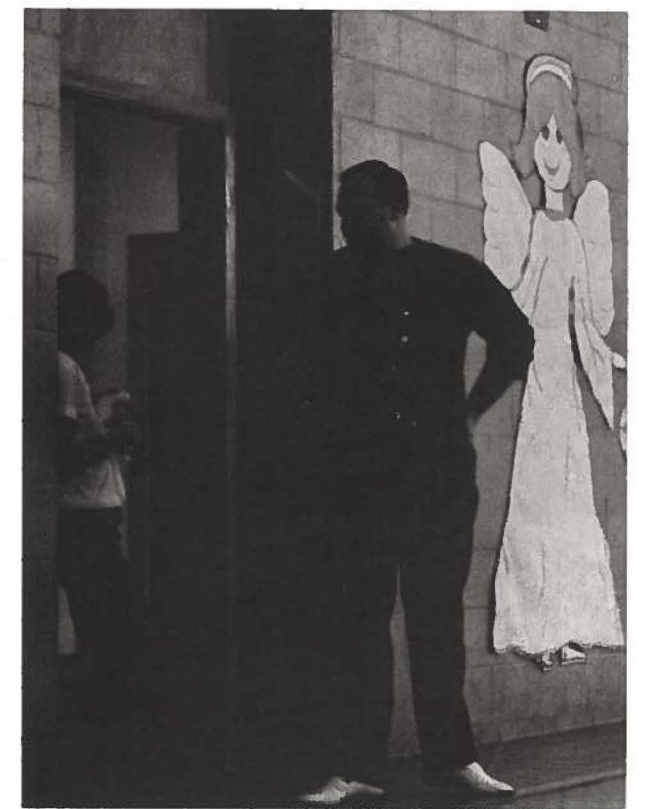

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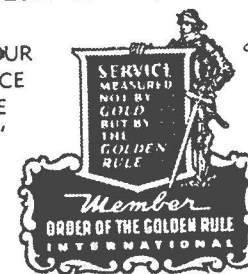

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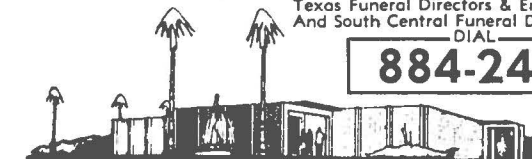
