Dear Clinton Central School District Resident:

Once again, thank you for all of your support this year as we have emerged from the long and sustained challenge of providing the best possible educational experience for our students and families within the shadow of the pandemic. Special thanks go out to everyone who has helped our school community, especially our faculty, staff, administration, and Board of Education.

This is the time of year for the community's thoughtful consideration of our spending plan for the 2022-2023school year, and I am proud of the work we have accomplished together during the development of this budget upon which you will vote on May 17th. Again, this year we have developed a plan that I believe is educationally responsible to our students and fiscally responsible to our community. We also engaged in an internal process that required us to analyze all areas of our expenditures in order to find efficiencies, which allowed us to decrease costs, and reclaim those funds to preserve our vital programs and improve in areas identified as district-level and building-level strategic priorities. This was a bit easier this year given an increase in Foundation Aid and school improvement funds from New York State, and the wisely allocated use of COVID relief funds.

I do want to call your attention to the additional non-school related Proposition 3 involving proposed taxation by the Kirkland Town Library. This proposition is completely independent of the school district program and budget, and is part of this voting process by law with the school district acting only as a facilitator of the vote, and a pass-through mechanism to collect taxes on behalf of the library. Taxes would be collected from school district residents regardless of the town in which they live; therefore, school district residents are the deciding voter. Again, this is not associated with the school district.

I encourage you to read this budget newsletter and related articles in The Waterville Times newspaper to learn more, and you can also visit the school district website at www.ccs.edu to find access to additional resources that will help you make an informed decision on Tuesday, May 17th. You can also come to our budget hearing presentation on Tuesday, May 10 at 5:30 PM in the high school cafeteria or view a recording of it that will be posted on our webpage shortly thereafter.





WHAT HAPPENS IF THIS BUDGET PROPOSAL IS DEFEATED?

The Board of Education has three options under the law:

- Submit the same budget to the voters for a second vote on the third Tuesday of June;
- Revise and submit the budget for a second vote on the third Tuesday of June;
- Reduce the budget by eliminating the purchase of equipment and any amounts tied to the community's use of the school facilities, and declare a contingency budget without a second vote.

If the Board of Education adopts a contingency budget, equipment expenditures of \$326,322 will be removed and other items as required by New York State Education Department regulations.

CAPITAL PROJECT VOTE IN DECEMBER

Plans are underway for a new Capital Project that will include improvements to athletic fields, libraries, the elementary school kitchen, the middle school roof, and other incidental items. It is anticipated that the vote will occur on **Tuesday**, **December 13**, Please mark your calendars!

PROPOSITION 1

Resolved, that the Board of Education of the Clinton Central School District, Oneida County, New York, is hereby authorized to expend and there is hereby appropriated, the sum of \$29,800,950 estimated by it to be necessary for school purposes for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 2022 and to raise so much thereof as may be necessary by tax on the taxable property in said School District.

Proposition 2

Shall the sum of \$331,279 be raised by the anual levy of a tax upon the taxable property within the Clinton Central School District for the pirpose of funding the Kirkland Town Library?*

*Library tax is not school tax and is not part of the school district budget. When a school district is approached by a library regarding tax levies, the district does not have a choice with respect to whether to present the proposition to voters. Under Education Law section 259, a BOE must submit a library appropriation to voters if requested by a library's board of trustees.
