## What's New at JPIL

No school, no matter how good it may be, should ever rest on its laurels. Continuous improvement is the hallmark of any strong organization. Looking in the mirror can be a scary proposition, however it's the only way to see reality for what it is. This summer our leadership team took a hard look at our strengths and areas of improvement. Aided by surveys and other anecdotal data, we came up with a plan for making the 2023-24 school year our best ever. We concluded..."It's all about that Culture"...and that is where I will begin what's new at JPIL.

## The Warrior Way

A school is first and foremost defined by its culture. It's the way the school operates, the joy of its students, and the loving embrace of its faculty and staff towards those students. When you

walk into any school the culture should be palpable within minutes. Every member of a school community, from students and their families, the faculty and staff, as well as those who support the school, should feel a strong connection to the JPPII Family. Being a Catholic school, the faith life of our school must shine through in everything we do. It, more than anything, should define who we are and how we operate. While most will agree this to be true, it does not mean all do, and therefore our recommitment to culture is our #1 priority for this coming year.

As we have grown, welcoming over 300 new students in just the last three years, along with over 20 new faculty and staff in just the last two, we are reminded that culture can never be taken for granted. Each year, culture must be redefined and reinforced so that no change in leadership, no crop of new teachers, new students or parents, can hijack the culture into something we are not.

The **Warrior Way** is our culture, and we will be using that term over and over and over again, until perhaps y'all get tired of hearing it, to fully engrain the essence of what it means to be a member of our school community. Using our six core values as a starting point, we will focus on defining and embedding these values not only in our students, but for faculty and staff and parents as well. Over six months, beginning with Service in September, we will use the core values as a teachable moment. They will become the primary focus of our advisory program known as House.

The **Warrior Way** will also spill over into athletics as we all know the key role sports play in our school culture. Enter **Play Like a Champion**. Crafted by leaders in the fields of sports psychology, coaching education, Catholic theology, and moral development, Play Like a Champion Today is centered around the principles of justice, integrity, respect and leadership. The program is supported by research on character development and faith formation in sports. From its origins at the University of Notre Dame to collaboration across the country, Play Like a Champion is designed to bring the best athlete-centered practices to our JPPII Catholic athletic community. To implement this program we need 100% buy in from our student-athletes, coaches and parents. Everyone must be trained. We will have a trainer from Notre Dame traveling to JPPII on **Saturday, August 19 from 9:00am to 10:30am for a MANDATORY Parent Meeting**. While at least one parent per household is required, both parents attending is highly desirable. If your child expects to play a sport at any time during the upcoming school year, we expect to see you there. Even if your child might not play a sport you are welcome to check it out. This will be followed by a coach's clinic later that day. We will be training our students separately and even expect to be implementing a physical education curriculum for middle schoolers. ## **Campus Improvements**

If you've set foot on campus at any time this summer, and many of you have for sports, camps, summer school, etc., you noticed Phase I of our Campus Expansion Plan underway. Phase I includes four new modular classrooms, the construction of a security gate and guardhouse, a new parking lot and storage building, enhanced security cameras and access controls, and a new soccer game field. The field grass is coming in nicely and will be ready for play this spring, while the parking lot should break ground sometime in October. The two classroom modular building, a relic of Covid funding, is now gone. However, the cornerstone of the project is the front entrance. Besides creating one of the safest and most secure school campuses in the Lowcountry, the new wall, gate, fencing, lighting, and guardhouse will create a beautiful, collegiate-like entrance to our campus. Choate Construction is on schedule to complete by the start of school, with landscaping and lighting to occur shortly thereafter. Please pardon our appearance in the last few weeks of August as we complete this project. Trust me, the results will be worth it.

The modular classrooms are on site and in place. The electricity is up and running and we are now preparing the finishing touches and cleaning. They will be ready by the start of school. The new moduls are connected to the existing ones via an exterior deck. This will allow the 8 modular classrooms to function as a school within a school. The moduls will primarily be home to high school classes in social studies, English, math, and theology. By having them all connected as one unit, many high schoolers will only have to leave the "East Village" for their science, technology and art courses, and lunch. The security guard will be a mere 50 feet away. For those thinking the moduls are a step down from our school classrooms, think again. They are actually quite nice and preferred by many of our teachers and students.

The gym floor was beginning to show signs of wear and tear so we took it down to the bare wood and redesigned the look. If you have not seen it yet, it is beautiful. It's definitely an added perk having an athletic director with an interior design background. Thanks to the design of Louise Sanders, assisted by Kefrin Woodham, JPII now has one of the most gorgeous high school gym floors anywhere. Expect to see a few added enhancements to the athletic center lobby to round out the new look.

## **Security Enhancements**

I recently saw a survey that indicated the number one reason why parents choose a school is safety. For the first time, school safety at 73% finished ahead of quality of teachers at 72%. While that may be a sad statement on our times, it is nevertheless our reality. We can either

choose to do nothing and hope the unspeakable does not happen here. Or, we can be proactive and take the necessary steps to prevent evil from entering the grounds. Not only will the gate control unwanted access, trained security personnel will man that gate from 7:00am to 7:00pm on days when school is in session. So not only during the school day, but while students are participating in afterschool activities. We are in contract negotiations with Coastal Security Services, Inc. of Hilton Head to provide this service. CSSI provides security for the Beaufort County Public Schools and will not only offer highly trained personnel but will tailor their guards to reflect our school culture. The gate is now the school's front door. Every student who drives to school will need to have a sticker on their vehicle. Parents will receive two stickers, one for each car if needed. This will prevent you from having to stop at the gate every time you arrive on campus. Expect more on security procedures in a future newsletter.

Safety does not just mean physical safety. It also means social and emotional safety as well. Drug use, bullying, harassment, etc. have no place in any school, and in particular ours. Last spring we installed vape detectors in all restrooms. These detectors not only prevent vaping, they alert us to a potential issue if voices get loud. Through our Warrior Way, we will be focusing on bullying and harassment and creating a sense of belonging. The diocese has a new policy and I was fortunate to be part of its creation. We need to be sure every student feels safe at all times and an equal member of our school community.

Every security camera in the school is being replaced and more are being added. All the access control is being reworked. The cameras were vintage 2012 and were pretty much useless. We have engaged a3 Communications for this project and it is now underway. Not only will we have added eyes all over campus, but the quality of our video feed and 24-7 coverage will be world class.

## **Instructional Change**

What makes JPII the premier school in Beaufort and Jasper County is the academic program offered and the quality of the teachers instructing it. Without them we are nothing. Finding and retaining high quality teachers today, and in particular in our area, is as challenging as it's ever been in my 25 years of hiring. Yet, it's the most important thing Mrs. Rembold and I do. With that said, I am pleased to introduce you to one of the biggest and best new crops of teachers JPII has ever hired.

**Erin Brienza** (Physical Education) – Mrs. Brienza comes to us from Pritchardville Elementary School in Bluffton where she was a physical education teacher for the past two years. With a B.S. from Long Island University in Physical Education and an M.S. in Elementary Education,

Mrs. Brienza brings over 7 years of experience teaching across New York and South Carolina, as well as coaching basketball, volleyball, and swimming among others. She is the mother of incoming 9<sup>th</sup> grader Madisyn Chase Brienza.

**Shayne Milligan** (Marian Center for Learning) – Mr. Milligan arrives at JP II as our new varsity head football coach and a teacher in our Marian Center for Learning program. Most recently, Coach Milligan has been a special education teacher at Concord (NC) High School. He has a total of 8 years teaching experience across two North Carolina districts. His coaching resume includes 10 years as an assistant football coach and 6 years as a head track and field coach. We look forward to him performing both roles at JP II. He has a B.A. in Sociology from Elon University where he played DI football, and an M.A. in Human Services Counseling from Liberty University. He has played professional football in the arena league. He is the father of incoming 7<sup>th</sup> grader Nathan Suda.

**Ava Hill** (Theology) – Welcome to the Lowcountry and to the teaching profession Ms. Ava Hill. A recent graduate of Benedictine College (KS) with a degree in Theology and Secondary Education, Ms. Hill has spent this past year learning her craft as a student teacher at St. Pius X Catholic High School in Kansas City. At JP II she will be teaching high school theology and assisting with our campus ministry program. A native of the Denver area, she will be making the long trek across country to her new home. Please welcome her to JP II.

**Kara Miletic** (English) – Mrs. Miletic will be our new middle school English teacher. She most recently was the 504 Coordinator and a teacher at the Pritchardville Elementary School. Prior to relocating to the Bluffton area, Mrs. Miletic spent 17 years across three New Jersey public school districts, at the middle and elementary school level. She is a graduate of Kean University with a B.A. in English/Education K-12, and a Masters in Teacher Leadership from Rider University. A former college soccer player, Mrs. Miletic has coached the sport in her past. She is the mother of incoming 6<sup>th</sup> grader Mason Miletic.

**Micah Heinz** (Science) – Mr. Heinz will teach middle and high school science. Mr. Heinz's teaching career spans both university and high school experience. He spent one year at Holy Trinity Classical School in Beaufort in addition to being a Graduate TA in Chemistry at the University of Texas at Austin. He has a graduate degree from the University of Texas and a B.S. from Hillsdale College in Chemistry and Music. A member of the U.S. Army Reserves, Mr. Heinz also is an accomplished pianist having won the Hillsdale College Concerto Competition.

**Wendy Lacombe** (English) – When Mrs. Williamson left to take a new role as principal in Alabama, we were left with big shoes to fill in our AP Capstone program. Enter the “big shoes” of Mrs. Wendy Lacombe. Recently retired as the English Department Chair at Beaufort HS, she is endorsed by the College Board to teach AP Language, AP Literature and AP Capstone Research, all of which she has taught before, and will be adding AP seminar to her repertoire. A graduate of St. Leo University with a Master’s in Education from the Citadel, Mrs. Lacombe’s 34-year career has spanned the states of Florida and South Carolina, including a stint at St. Peter’s in Beaufort. She is the mother of newly ordained priest, Fr. Paul Lacombe.

**Lauren Gehm** (Marian Center for Learning) – Mrs. Gehm is our second new hire in the Marian Center and will team with Mr. Milligan to form a very strong support team in the high school, while Mrs. Kim McNab slides into the newly created middle school spot. Mrs. Gehm is an experienced special educator having most recently been the Director of the Matthew Reardon Center for Autism in Savannah. Prior to that she was a Health Psychology Therapist at Kaplan Brain and Body in Manhattan, NY. She began her career as a 12-year special education teacher in River Dale, NJ. She has a B.A. in Psychology from Marist, a Master’s in Education from Gratz College, and another Master’s in Curriculum Development from the University of Scranton. Mrs. Gehm’s three sons, Jack (6<sup>th</sup>), Dylan (8<sup>th</sup>), and Thomas (10<sup>th</sup>) will all be transferring to JP II from Hilton Head Christian Academy. Welcome Gehm family.

**Emily Brown** (Music and Theatre) – We have been searching for a year to find the replacement for Ava Nixon, so enter stage right Mrs. Emily Brown. She was a professional choral singer and Cantor at the Cathedral of St. Matthew the Apostle in Washington D.C. along with being a Voice Class Instructor and Mentor for the National Children's Chorus. Her relocation to Bluffton to be closer to family was JP II’s good fortune. She has a B.M. in Voice Performance from North Park University and a Master’s in Voice Performance from the prestigious Cleveland Institute of Music. She has performed in chorale groups across the country and in 2012 was the Washington State Solo and Ensemble Winner in the Soprano Category. On the theater stage, she has performed in numerous musicals and operas.

**Anthony Rossillo** (Science) – Mr. Rossillo will be primarily a middle school science teacher. He brings 15 years of teaching experience across grades 5-12. Most recently he was a 5<sup>th</sup> grade math and science teacher at Hardeeville Elementary School. He has experience teaching at Thomas Heyward Academy, and began his teaching career at the legendary Saint Anthony High School in Jersey City, NJ. He has a B.A. from Montclair State and a Master’s in Education from St. Peter’s College. Mr. Rossillo brings an extensive coaching background to JP II and will be an assistant in the Warriors Football Program.

**Carl Boehm** (English) – Mr. Boehm will be a high school English teacher. He most recently taught English at St. Vincent’s Academy in Savannah for five years and teaches creative writing and film making in Southern New Hampshire University’s online program. He has 20+ years of teaching at the high school and college level, with 15 of those years spent in Catholic education. He is a published author and film maker. Mr. Boehm has a B.A. and two Master’s Degrees from Florida Atlantic University.

**Zane Jernigan** (Theology) – Mr. Jernigan has a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Graphic Design from the University of Tennessee Knoxville and is completing his Master’s in Catechetics and Evangelization at the Franciscan University of Steubenville. He is currently the Communications Coordinator at The Citadel’s Swain School of Science and Mathematics. Prior to that he was the editor of the Catholic Miscellany for the Diocese of Charleston and Communications Coordinator for Catholic Charities of East Tennessee. Mr. Jernigan is an experienced professional photographer and spent time as foreign missionary in Latin America. He is an RCIA instructor at Sacred Heart in Charleston and for the Citadel cadets, as well as a First Degree Knight of Columbus.

**Evelyn Gomez Dominguez** (Spanish) – Ms. Dominguez joins the JPPII World Language Department as a native speaker from the Dominican Republic. She will be teaching high school Spanish. She is currently a teacher at the Chatham Academy at Royce in Savannah, as well as their ACE Coordinator. Prior to moving to Georgia she spent four years teaching in Texas. She was a college volleyball and basketball player and played for her home country, the Dominican Republic. She plans to help with our girls volleyball program. She has a B.A. in Criminal Justice and an M.A. in Spanish from Sam Houston State University.

## Schedule Changes

We have a couple of major schedule changes to discuss. In both cases I will discuss the rationale behind the change.

**Every Friday will now be a delayed opening as opposed to an early release.** We will start school at 9:00am on Friday. This will provide us the opportunity to meet as an entire faculty and staff one time per week for meetings and professional development. Under the previous Friday afternoon meeting schedule we had difficulty assembling everyone due to coaching and bus driving responsibilities. Meeting in the morning, as well as hiring additional bus drivers (in process), will provide our faculty and staff the opportunity to meet together every Friday. This will strengthen our school by providing more time for increased training in addition to growing our team's commitment to Mission. We will continue to run our House schedule on Friday; however dismissal will now be at the regular time of 2:40pm.

**What will this mean for students and parents?** First of all, we will keep the normal drop off time of 7:45am for those who need it. Students will assemble in the modular classrooms if dropped off early providing valuable homework time. This will be supervised by substitute teachers. Buses will continue to run on the same schedule, Monday – Friday. The only difference, for those who are able, arrival at school will be at 8:50am. This will provide an extra 30 minutes of sleep for some, always valuable for a teenager.

**The entire school, grades 6 – 12, will return to block scheduling.** Last year we tried an eight-period schedule for middle school. Due to the number of crossover teachers, those that teach in both the middle and high school, we had no choice but to return to a block schedule for the entire school.

**What does this mean for students?** Essentially there is no change for high school. Blocks will be 80-minutes, Monday, Tuesday and Thursday. Wednesday will continue to be mass day with blocks approximately 70-minutes in length. Friday blocks will be 60-minutes to accommodate for the delayed opening and House time. Middle schoolers will now follow the exact same schedule as their high school counterparts. Days will rotate for all students. Blue Day will consist of Blocks A-D. Gold Day will be E-H.

We are confident these changes are in the best interest of our students and teachers and we look forward to the impact they will have on our instructional program.



## Celebrating our Students and Faculty

This past May, **107 JPII students**, representing 53% of JPII's 9-12 enrollment, took at least one Advanced Placement Exam. The **total number of exams taken was 205**, with **65% of the scores on these exams averaging 3 or higher** out of a maximum score of 5.

This is a wonderful commentary on the willingness of our students to take advantage of these rigorous courses as well as the dedication of our hard-working teachers both AP and those who prepared our students for them.

In addition, 35 of our test-takers were recognized based on the following criteria. We applaud their achievements.

<b>AP Scholar</b>	Granted to students who receive scores of 3 or higher on three or more AP Exams
<b>AP Scholar with Honor</b>	Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.25 on all AP Exams taken, <b>and</b> scores of 3 or higher on four or more of these exams
<b>AP Scholar with Distinction</b>	Granted to students who receive an average score of at least 3.5 on all AP Exams taken, and scores of 3 or higher on five or more of these exams
<b>AP Seminar &amp; Research Certificate</b>	Granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in both AP Seminar and AP Research.
<b>AP Capstone Diploma</b>	Granted to students who earn scores of 3 or higher in AP Seminar and AP Research and on 4 additional AP Exams of their choosing.
