And what a production: daringly staged through the middle of the building, bringing the action right to us, this promises to be an evening to remember. Forceful and relentless, dark and visceral: bring it on!

I always remember a Two Ronnies' sketch where there are two old farmers leaning on a fence and one turns to the other:


"You know if I were that multimillionaire Paul Getty fella, I'd be a lot richer than 'e." "How would you do that?"

"Well, I'd do a bit of window cleaning on the side."

Ridiculous of course, but it is the basis of consumerism and is the underlying success of advertising, to create a dissatisfaction with the present.

To achieve our ambitions, do the ends justify the means? *Macbeth* is an illustration of where they do not; compounding mistake upon mistake he falls 'into the sere, the yellow leaf, And that which should accompany old age, As honour, love, obedience, troops of friends, I must not look to have'.

The biblical quote 'For what profits a man if he gains the whole world but loses his own soul' was one that Shakespeare would have known. These principles are universal and timeless, as is this production. I've



not tried to squeeze the story into a particular period. Macbeth has a very vivid imagination that drives him on together with urging from an equally ambitious Lady Macbeth, It is


also imagination that brings them both sleepless nights.






