What is the Personal Statement?

- Holistic Review
- Common Application (and perhaps some scholarships)
- Your chance to share information in YOUR OWN WORDS with colleges you are interested in
- Gives the admissions committee insight into your personality, interests and experiences







- Common App Prompts (650 words max)
- Individual College Essays (word limit depends on college/prompt)
- · Some have very specific topics, while others are more open-ended



- Choose the essay topic that appeals to you the most and lets you tell your authentic story.
- There is no right or wrong answer.
- It's not about what you think an admission officer wants to hear,
 but what is most important for them to know about you!



- While there is no right or wrong, some essay topics that are overused and you want to be careful about:
 - → Winning or losing the big game
 - Death of a pet
 - → Friendship problems
 - → Religious, political or philosophical epiphanies
 - → Simple solutions to world problems
 - → Essays in poor taste, employing bad language
 - → Parent-bashing cynicism almost never plans well



Getting Ready to Write

- Narrow your topic and try to be as specific as possible
- Brainstorm + Outline

- Draft, read, review. Draft, read, review. Draft....
- Ask yourself: Have I focused on the topic? Have I answered the question? Is it specific and detailed? Have I written in my own voice? Have I reflected on why this is important to me?



Essay DOs and DON'Ts

DO

- Keep essays positive and upbeat
- > Answer the question
- "Show" more than "tell"
- Watch writing style
- ▷ Adapt essays
- ▶ Follow all the directions
- ▶ Proofread essays

DON'T

- □ Talk GPA or SAT's
- Be afraid to write about your identity/experience
- Write essays with simple solutions to world issues
- Be too opinionated
- Sound like you consulted a thesaurus for every other word.



Words of the Wise

- Be sure your essay is about something you care strongly enough about to elaborate and wax eloquent or passionate about.
- Think of your essay as a camera lens.
- Use details to draw the reader in.

• Employ all the senses to convey your ideas to the reader: sight, sound, taste, touch, and hearing.



Words of the Wise

 If you can get 2-3 ideas or drafts for essay, then you should have enough content to be able to answer most college essays or scholarship prompts
