2022-23 School Overview

District & School Profile

Coachella Valley Unified School District covers more than 1,200 square miles of mostly rural desert terrain, serving the communities of Coachella, Thermal, Mecca, Oasis, Indio, and the Salton Sea. The district currently operates fourteen elementary schools, three middle schools, three comprehensive high schools, one continuation high school, and one adult school. Coachella Valley Unified School District has a growing reputation for innovative programs and outstanding staff.

Peter Pendleton Elementary School provides instruction for students in grades TK - 6. During the 2021-22 school year, a total of 501 students were enrolled. The school's enrollment was comprised of 98.0% Hispanic students, 0.0% African-American students, 0.0% American-Indian students, 0.2% Asian and 1.0% Anglo-American students. During the 2021-22 school year, the 501 students enrolled included 92.0% socioeconomically disadvantaged students, 50.7% English Language Learners, 3.6% Migrant students, 10.4% students with disabilities, 2.4% Homeless Youth and 0.4% Foster Youth.

2022-23 Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Other Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Peter Pendleton Elementary School are being aligned to the Common Core State Standards. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On September 22, 2022 the Coachella Valley Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 2023-09 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social, science, and English/language arts, including the English language development component of an adopted program, 3) sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes, and 4) laboratory science equipment was available for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12, inclusive.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2022-23 school year, Coachella Valley Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

School Facilities & Maintenance:

The district takes great effort to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Peter Pendleton Elementary School opened in July, 1980. Ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate routine maintenance requests.

Every morning before school begins, the day custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. The custodians are responsible for:

- Cafeteria Cleanup/Setup
- Classrooms
- General Maintenance
- Emergency Custodial Needs
- Locker Rooms
- Moving Furniture
- Multipurpose Room
- Restrooms
- Special Events Preparations/Setups

Restrooms are checked regularly throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The assistant principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, yard duty supervisors are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas, the breakfast area and playground. During recess, teachers and Yard Duty Supervisors supervise playground activity. Yard Duty Supervisors monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, teachers monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure. Peter Pendleton Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

Condition of Facilities -

Schools are required to have facility inspections. State law requires that information from the facility inspection report be reflected on the SARC in accordance with EC sections 33126 and 33126.1. The Office of Public School Construction (OPSC) Facility Inspection Tool (FIT) or a locally developed instrument that meets the same legal requirements must be utilized during these inspections to determine if a school facility is in "good repair" and to rate the facility accordingly.

LEAs are to use the data collected in the school's most recent FIT report to populate the SARC regarding the school's facility conditions and the "good repair status" of the facility. The year and month of the most recent FIT report are also required to be provided on the SARC.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements

On an annual basis, Coachella Valley Unified School District will conduct a Facilities Inspection of each school and report on the status of necessary repairs in order to maintain a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. The inspection is designed to evaluate and verify that school facilities conditions are in "good repair" and that any deficiencies are accurately reported in the School Accountability Report Cards.

The Facilities Inspection for the 2022-23 school year has not taken place at the time of the 2022 SARC Publication. The 2022 SARC will be amended and re-distributed, once the Facility Inspection information is available. The most recent inspection data, from 2021-22, is reflected in the chart below. All repairs from the December 7, 2021 FIT Inspection have been completed.

Statewide Assessments

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

- Aligned with CA CCSS for ELA and mathematics;
- Available to students in grades 3 through 8, and grade 11; and
- Uniformly administered across a grade, grade span, school, or district to all eligible students.

Options

Note that the CAAs could only be administered in-person following health and safety requirements. Therefore, the 2020-21 data between school years for the school, district, state are not an accurate comparison. Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the following individuals are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas, the breakfast area and playground: the principal, assistant principal, teachers, and noon duty supervisors. During recess, the principal, assistant principal, and teachers supervise playground activity. The principal, assistant principal, and noon duty supervisors monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, the principal, assistant principal, teachers, and four crossing guards monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Peter Pendleton Elementary School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Safety Plan was developed for Peter Pendleton Elementary School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's 2022-23 safety plan was reviewed, updated, and approved by the SSC on January 31, 2022. It was board approved on March 10, 2022.
